Pony League **Team Being Formed Here**







The pecan nut casebearer has made its appearance in a haphazard pattern. Some trees in Robert And Brenda Corley Wed First Baptist Church of Abilene Lee had a heavy infestation of eggs, others had only a few. The same condition existed in the Bronte area on trees checked. Also, the eggs hatched into larva, or grubs, in the same pattern. As early as Monday larvae were found feeding in the second nut while on other trees, the first eggs had not hatched.

If you still have not sprayed, or if you sprayed one day last week, spraying would be in order. Make sure you use ample spray pressure to wet the nutlet cluster thoroughly. Fogging a tree will wet the tree, but will not penetrate effectively to the cluster where the casebearer does his feeding.
