Carolyn Kemp Signs Contract For Part in Casa Manana Show

Miss Carolyn Kemp, 19-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Kemp of Bronte, has signed a contract and reported for work as a member of the ensemble for the summer musical at Casa Manana in Fort Worth. Miss Kemp was chosen as one of the six-member ensemble after auditions for the singers were held at various places throughout the United States.

A junior student at Trinity University where she is majoring in music, Miss Kemp is a soloist with the Trinity Acapello choir, the Trinity University choir and the Alamo Heights Presbyterian church choir in San Antonio.

She is a 1957 graduate of Bronte high school. While attending school here she was 1957 state winner in senior declamation and was a soloist with the San Angelo Symphony orchestra for its youth concert. She also worked with the San Angelo Community Theatre group.

A former voice student of Mrs. E. R. Kreyer and Dr. Eric Sorantine, she is currently studying under John Seagle at Trinity University.

Summer musicals at the new Casa Manana open June 1 with "Wonderful Town." Other summer productions will include "Silk

Stockings", June 22 - July 4; "Where's Charley", July 6-18; "The King and I", July 20-Aug. 1; "Student Prince", Aug. 3-15; and "Annie Get Your Gun," Aug. 17-29.

During the past two years, national publicity has focused on the Casa Manana and it has been featured in Life, Time, Variety and other leading magazines as the first permanent musical-arena theatre in the United States and the only musical-arena theatre in the Southwest.

Oscar Renshaw Is Bronte's New Nightwatchman

At a special meeting of the city council May 25, Oscar Renshaw was named city nightwatchman. He succeeds Rome Richards, who resigned effective June 1. Renshaw took over his new duties Monday night. He is well known to local residents, having lived here many years. He and his family moved into town from the farm this year.

In another special meeting of the council on May 28, an ordinance was passed setting up regulations for the storage of petroleum products in the city limits. The new ordinance spells out the rules for constructing storage tanks, specifies their size and fixes a penalty for violation of the ordinance.

A regular meeting of the council is set for this Friday night. Members of the council are Mayor J. A. Stephenson and Councilmen H. A. Springer, C. E. Bruton, Bill Thomas, Bill Luckett and Royce Fancher.

P. J. O'Connell Named Principal Of Grade School

P. J. O'Connell, who has served the past two years as superintendent of schools at Wellman, was named principal of the Bronte elementary school at a recent meeting of the board of trustees.

O'Connell will succeed Norman Porter, who resigned his position as grade school principal and head football coach.

The new principal has had ten years teaching experience and is a graduate of Howard Payne College at Brownwood. Prior to his heading the Wellman school the past two years, he was superintendent at Starr for one year and elementary principal at Goldthwaite three years. He is currently working on his master's degree and lacks only completing his thesis.

O'Connell is married and is the father of five children.

1.5 Inch Rain Falls In Area Wednesday

She was born July 8, 1901, in Coke County and married Cross in January 1951. She formerly was Mrs. Henry Escue. Mr. Escue died in 1950.

Mrs. Cross operated a rest home at 2025 N. Magdalen in San Angelo the last 12 years.

Barney Carter of Tyler is the operator on the Youngblood and Gray tests while the E. B. Clark Drilling Co. is operator on the well on the Black place.

A workover rig has been in use this week on the Youngblood well and casing was being run on the other two tests.

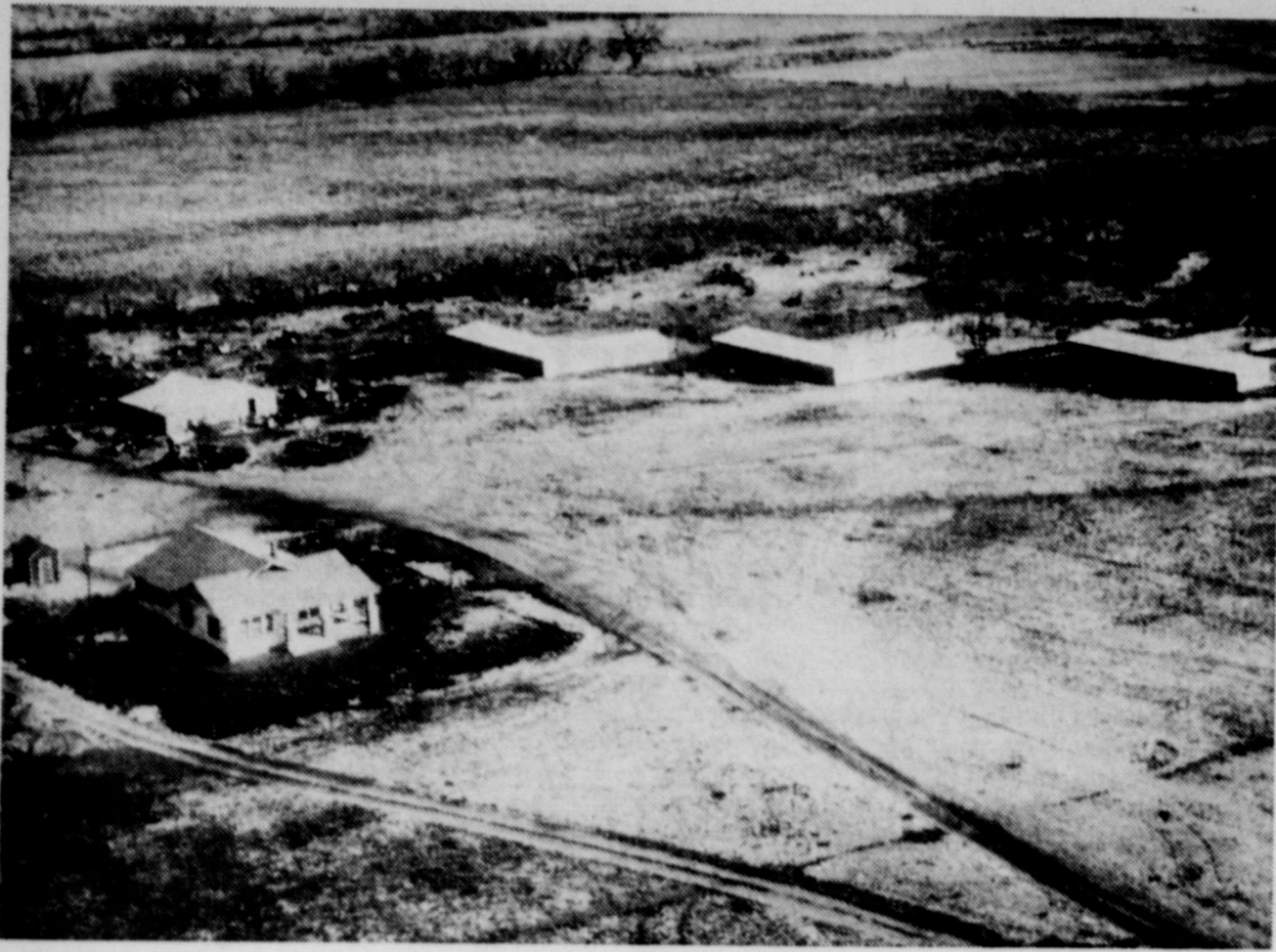
Who Lives Here?

A Great Plains Conservation Program plan has been prepared on the Preston Davis stock farm near Fort Chadbourne. The plan included brush control, pasture planting, deferred grazing and net wire diversions.

The Small Watershed Program is a nationwide movement in which local communities are organizing to combat their soil and water problems. In each of these local programs, rural and urban people work together to prevent floods and save soil by bringing an entire valley's water under control.

Practices and structures are established to hold more of the rainfall in the upland soils and in stock ponds and reservoirs—while releasing run-off at a safe rate. In general, they make running water walk . . . so that more and better water is made available for constructive use. People downstream benefit from flood prevention and more dependable water supplies.

The top two teams from each of the 12 districts in the State will be vying for honors in the 25 judging and team demonstration contests. The Coke County soil judging team was first in this district contest and three team members were the high individuals in the contest. Eddie Glenn, Kenneth Wink and Donald Spiller placed in the order listed.

The team will leave for College Station on June 9 and will return following the contests on June 11. They will be accompanied by the County Agricultural Agent.

GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

Word of grasshoppers in various spots in the county continues to come in. Damage has been light thus far, but the hoppers are still small. If favorable conditions abound and if expansion of the pests is not controlled, they could do extensive damage to cotton and other crops. As they tend to overgrow and overpopulate their present feeding grounds, coupled with the growth of field crops, they will migrate to the fields.

Grasshoppers are more easily controlled while they are small and while they are still in the hatching areas, such as borders, fence rows, draws or other areas with heavy growth and dead organic material or straw.

Several insecticides have proven effective in controlling hoppers. Aldrin, dieldrin, toxaphene and heptachlor are recommended. Dusts, sprays or baits can be used.

Several operators in the County have sprayed weeds in the past couple of weeks. The period for effective control of pasture weeds is about over except in isolated cases. Sun flowers, cockle burs and other field weeds can still be controlled, but rag weeds, and similar weeds that are reaching maturity and are not growing rapidly will not respond readily to treatment. Also, cotton is up and would be killed by volatile ester sprays.

If you do spray in the future, be sure to use a low volatile ester or an amine. High volatile sprays will volatilize too readily in hot weather. Also, if you are spraying in young tender grass plants such as sudan, do not add soap or a detergent as a wetting agent. You could burn the plants.
