Legislature Approves Kickapoo Water Dist.

The water control and improvement district on the Kickapoo watershed was virtually assured this week when a special bill was passed by the Texas Legislature creating the district.

Rep. A. J. Bishop, in a telephone interview Wednesday afternoon said the bill passed the House of Representatives on Monday. Bishop also reported that Sen. Dorsey Hardeman got the bill through the Senate late Tuesday. "All it

needs now is the Governor's signature," Bishop said.

Last Rites Held At Blackwell for Mrs. D. T. Hunt

Funeral services for Mrs. D. T. (Laura E.) Hunt, 82, long time resident of Blackwell and widow of the man who helped give Blackwell its name, were conducted at 5:30 p.m. Monday at the First Methodist Church in Blackwell. The Rev. Jerrell Sharp, pastor, was in charge.

Mrs. Hunt died Saturday night in the Bronte hospital after a short illness.

She and her late husband moved to Nolan County near where the town of Blackwell was later established in 1901, the date the Orient Townsite Co. put lots up for sale.

The couple moved to Blackwell in 1906 and operated a drug store and dress and hat shop in the early days of the community. In 1907 Mr. Hunt was named the first postmaster there.

He handled mail delivered by stagecoach until the railroad came a year later. Then Mr. Hunt, it is related, turned a joke with a friend into a name for the town.

The post office department at first refused to accept the first name offered for the town, James, because another post office in the state already had the name. Mr. Hunt was ordered to submit a list of 20 names to the department. As he was about to compile a list a friend named Blackwell came into the office. They joked and put Blackwell's name at the top of the list. The post office department accepted it.

After Mr. Hunt's death in 1934, Mrs. Hunt remained active in town affairs. She helped light the fight to incorporate the town in 1952. She was a charter member of the Blackwell Methodist Church.

Mrs. Hunt was born Laura E. Palmer in Holly Springs, Miss., on Nov. 29, 1876 and moved to Texas with her parents when she was a small child. The family settled at Goldthwaite in 1894 and she was married to D. T. Hunt there. Later they moved to Nolan County.

Survivors are two daughters—Mrs. D. T. McDonald of Blackwell and Mrs. Irene Ellis of Glendale, Calif.; two grandchildren—Davis Ellis, Glendale, Calif., and Dan McDonald of Calgary, Canada; six brothers—Ben Palmer of Blackwell; Talmadge Palmer of Albany, Joe Palmer of Goldthwaite, Ed and Henry Palmer of Fort Worth, Will Palmer of Calgary, Alberta, Canada; two sisters—Mrs. Barney Carter and Mrs. Katherine Parker, both of Tyler.

STATE JUDGING CONTEST

The 4-H club soil judging team placed 8th in the State Judging Contests held in College Station, on June 10th. Two members of the team, Kenneth Wink, Sanco, and Dee Arrott, Tennyson, were 8th and 9th high individuals of the contest. They were awarded \$50.00 wrist watches for their achievements. Eddie Glenn, of Bronte, was the third member of the team attending the contest. Donald Spiller, of Bronte, was unable to make the trip to College Station. Twenty two teams took part in the contest.

COTTON FIELD INSECTS

Thrips and Fleahoppers, along with the grasshoppers should be checked for in the cotton fields. Both can cause heavy damage to cotton if they are present in large numbers. Thrips slow up growth primarily, while fleas sting and make the cotton plant throw off the small squares.

If your cotton has uneven height, leaves that are cupped or crinkled on the edges, or leaves with a silvery appearance, chances are that thrips are sucking on the plants. Fleahoppers sting the young squares and terminals, causing them to turn black and fall off. Later the cotton plant will be tall, stringy and free of fruit on the lower branches.

Both insects do the most damage on young cotton, from four leaves up to knee high. If they are in your cotton, controlling them will mean foster growth, more bottom cotton and earlier maturity in the fall.

We have an ample supply of bulletins showing pictures of the various insects most commonly found bothering cotton and also of the bulletins listing the recommended cotton insect control measures.

TIPS ON SPRAYING

Some of you have used your sprayer lately to apply a weed or brush killer. If you have, make sure that you clean your sprayer well before using it to apply some insecticide to vegetables, field crops or ornamentals. Herbicides tend to stick to the container and you may damage some other plants later if the sprayer is not washed properly. Also, weed killers are corrosive and will damage the pump, pressure regulator or nozzle if the machine is not cleaned.

A cleaning system that has proven effective in cleansing sprayers is to wash the sprayer in a solution containing household ammonia at the rate of 1 quart to 30 gallons of water. Allow the above solution to stand in the sprayer for a few minutes, then remove it and rinse the machine using a solution containing 6-8 ounces of liquid detergent in 30 gallons of water. Follow this with a rinse using clear water. Be sure to dry your sprayer and if possible pump through it on automobile radiator rust inhibitor. It will add life to the parts of your machine.
