## AD-LIB-BEN

At long last (after almost six years) the machinery is in order to build the dams which can keep Bronte from flooding as it did in 1953 and again in 1957. We are not optimistic enough to say that the dams are as good as built, for undoubtedly, there will be many obstacles before the structures are actually catching surplus water which falls on the Kickapoo watershed.

We firmly believe now, however, that the dams will be built, and hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages will be saved in the future. We would like to recommend that for once, everybody who is going to have a part in building these dams, lay aside his personal desires for gain and seriously consider the good of all the people of the area. A little cooperation can make this project much easier and make its accomplishment speedier.

We've had quite a little bit of comment on the contents of this column last week — favorable, too, we might add, for the most part. So maybe the sewer issue isn't completely dead after all. Our own personal wishes for a sewer system have greatly increased this week after about eight hours of labor were spent trying to dig a drain line for The Enterprise septic tank. Everywhere we dug, we ran into our neighbor's drain lines, and we are exactly where we started. The only benefit was to show us where not to dig to lay a line.

It was reported Wednesday morning that Burt Drilling Co. No. 1 Sam Seay, located east of Bronte was sand fracturing the hole. The well, on a drillstem test, surfaced gas in 6 minutes and oil in 52 minutes. After setting casing, the well failed to break through mud after being swabbed.

## Construction Job To Abilene Firm

A contract for 6.5 miles of construction of FM Highway 2333 in Coke and Runnels Counties has been awarded to an Abilene firm. It was announced in Austin last week by the State Highway Commission.

E. M. Bailey, Contractor, Ltd., submitted the low bid of \$108,055.39 on the project. Construction of grading, structures, base and surfacing from US 277 at Tennyson to 8.0 miles north of FM 1692 is expected to take 110 working days, according to J. A. Snell, District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

C. C. Stroud, Resident Engineer at San Angelo, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

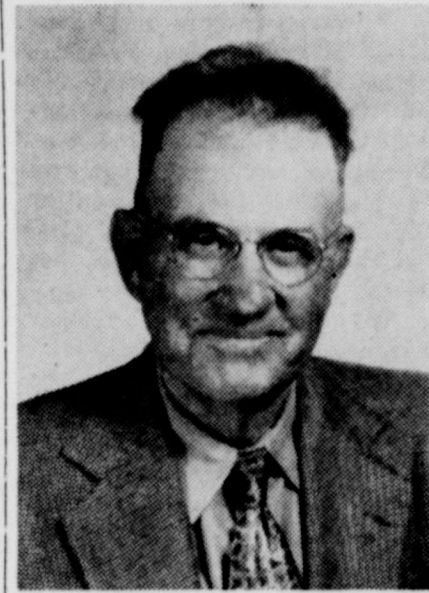
## Kickapoo Water District Officers Elected at Tuesday Meeting

The organization of a water control and improvement district on the watershed of the Kickapoo Creeks was completed Tuesday when directors met at Robert Lee. F. S. Higginbotham was elected president of the district, with D. K. Glenn named vice president, and J. A. Percifull, secretary. Preston Davis and Austin Sandusky are directors.

A bill creating the water district was passed by the Texas Legislature on the last day of its first special session. Governor Price Daniel signed the bill into law last week.

The organization Tuesday climaxed a campaign which has been in progress with varying degrees of intensity for several years. Interest in an organization of this kind was first evidenced in 1953 following a flood which

did millions of dollars damage to farm and ranch land and improvements, as well as to structures in the city of Bronte. At that time, the United States Depart-

## Rain Just Right On Fields Here

Another earth soaking rain fell over the Bronte area last Wednesday night. Up to 2½ inches fell in the area, while only 1½ inches fell here in town.

Farmers and ranchmen are highly elated over crop and range prospects for the area. One ranchman told The Enterprise that he had never seen as much rain in June as has been received this year. Pastures are making a rapid comeback following the long drouth which damaged many of them. Field crops are giving promise of a bumper crop also.

ment of Agriculture was paying only half the cost of such projects; so after several meetings and a general loss of interest in the project, it was more or less forgotten until Oct. 13, 1957, when a second flood swept the area drained by the Kickapoos.

On Dec. 6, 1957, following the October flood, a steering committee sponsored by the Bronte Lions Club was named to study and guide work toward creation of a water district. Higginbotham was named chairman of that committee and has served as its head since that time. Other members named at that time were W. D. McDonald, Noah Pruitt, Sr., Austin Sandusky, J. A. Percifull, Preston Davis and Edward Rawlings.

After many meetings and much work, the group got papers drawn up stating the purpose of the district and outlining its boundaries.

A petition was circulated asking Coke County Commissioners Court to create the district. After three hearings, the commissioners decided that they should not create the district. Following this setback, the committee decided to try getting the district set up by legislative action. Rep. A. J. Bishop and Sen. Dorsey Hardeman were able to get the bill through the legislature, despite the fact that the lawmakers were in special session for the sole purpose of working on a tax bill.

Coke Commissioners have already allocated \$18,500 to pay for the advance planning expense. Secretary Percifull told The Enterprise Tuesday that the planning party is expected to arrive here and be ready to go to work some time in August. This planning party will study the watershed and make recommendations on placing dams and determine other data necessary to planning the overall project.

### ACCIDENT SUMMARY GIVEN FOR THIS AREA

Lt. W. M. Howell of the San Angelo sub station of the Texas Highway Patrol, released Coke, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Kinney, Maverick, Runnels, Schleicher, Sterling Sutton, Tom Green and Val Verde Counties' Rural Traffic Accident Summary for June 1958.

The Highway Patrol in this area investigated a total of 55 accidents with the following breakdown: Property damage 36, Personal Injury 18, and Fatal Accidents 1. Lt. Howell reported a total property damage of \$66,485.00 with 28 persons injured and 1 killed. This is a decrease of 8 accidents and 1 death for the same period of June 1958.

During June the Patrolmen in the above counties made 458 arrests for the following violations: D. W. I. 5, Speeding 296, Improper Passing 6, Wrong Side of Road 13, Defective Equipment 23. All other violations 90.

To date this year in the above counties there have been 19 fatalities compared to 33 for the same period last year.

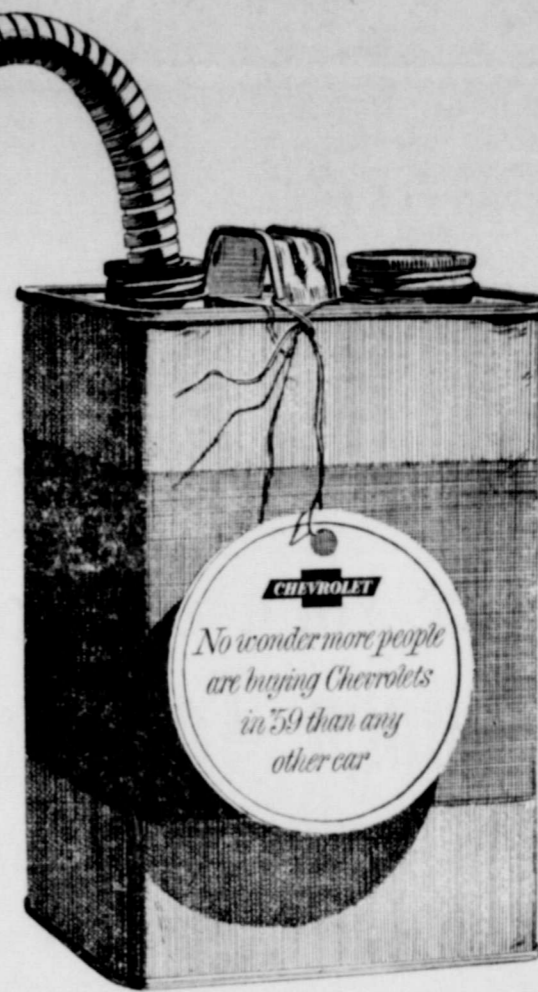

## NEW LAW SETS TEXAS PRIMARY ELECTIONS 2 MONTHS EARLIER

In 1960, earlier than usual, eyes of Texans will turn to politics. The State Democratic Committee has outlined some important new changes in the election laws.

The Legislature passed, and the Governor signed, a bill moving the primary elections and conventions from July and August to May and June. Main portions of the 1960 political calendar will look like this:

Filing Deadline: Monday, Feb. 1  
First Primary and Precinct Conventions: Saturday, May 7

County Conventions: Saturday, May 14

Second Primary: Saturday, June 4

State (Presidential) Convention: Tuesday, June 14

State (Governor) Convention: Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The State Committee staff is in the process of preparing a political calendar which will list the dates of various Committee meetings and other administrative changes affecting the Executive Committees on local and state levels.

The new law provides that delegates elected at the May County Convention shall be delegates "for all state conventions held throughout the remainder of the year." This means that the Presidential State Convention delegates in June will also be the delegates attending the subsequent September State Convention.

### PARTY AFFILIATION

Your "ticket" for admission into next spring's precinct conventions will be your stamped poll tax receipt, or a certificate showing you participated in the primary.

The fact that your name is on the poll list for your precinct does not entitle you to attend your precinct convention, as has been the case for several years.

A new "party affiliation" law, passed by the 56th Legislature with the support of the State Committee, makes voting in the primary a prerequisite to participation in precinct conventions. The law is designed to strengthen party integrity and is in line with provisions of the Democratic Platform adopted at the San Antonio State Convention.

Under the law, a person becomes affiliated with a political party by voting in that party's elections. He can not, within the same poll tax year, thereafter participate in another Party's convention activities.

Primary election judges stamp the voter's poll tax receipt with the words "Democrat" or "Republican" at the time he votes in the primary. Provisions are made for certificates to be issued in cases where a voter isn't required to have a poll tax receipt, or when affidavits of loss are executed.

The new law specifically pre-

vents those who don't vote in the primary from participating in convention affairs or being elected to party offices.

Although little publicized, a most significant bill designed to curb abuses in absentee voting was passed by the Regular Session. The bill authored by Rep. Harold H. Coley of Conroe and amended in Committee, the Senate and House Floor, specifically changes the methods of voting by mail — where most abuses have been uncovered.

Only sick and disabled voters will now be able to receive absentee ballots by mail within the county of their residence. This will eliminate the "solicitation" of absentee ballots. Voters absent from the county can still vote by mail provided they make application from outside the county of their residence. However, if they expect to be within the county during the period of absentee voting, they are required to vote in person at the Clerk's office.

Another important change assures more secrecy of the absentee voter's ballot by mail. Now, the voter himself will detach the signed stub, seal his ballot in a plain and unidentified envelope, then place the stub and the sealed ballot envelope in a larger envelope. The sealed ballot envelope would then be deposited by the election judges in the ballot box and would not be opened until the time for counting the ballots.

**County Agents News Column**

By **STERLING LINDSEY**

A little moisture at the right time can certainly make a difference in the fields, pastures and people's outlook for the future. During the past couple of weeks the pasture and field crop situations have undergone frequent discussions and studies. One rancher stated that his pastures are the best he has seen them at this time of year. Another operator voiced the opinion that his place is in the best shape he has ever seen it. Other persons have made similar favorable comments.

Conditions have improved vastly, but we hope the recent drought years will not be forgotten. Now that conditions have improved and the pastures are making a comeback, it is hoped that they will be given an opportunity to continue to improve. A sudden reversal in the moisture situation and/or drastic increases in stocking rates could more than offset the improvements obtained. Allowing the present grass plants to develop and make some seed normally enhances chances of good range conditions in the future, and the cured grass may be a big help this winter.

In summary our prosperity may be false or shortlived if we fail to give nature a chance to make the necessary repairs. Employing one or more range management practices such as deferring, control grazing, rotation grazing, cross fencing, or brush control will give nature the assist she needs.

The spring pig crop averaged 6.9 pigs per litter over the State. This is less than last year's average of 7.1 pigs, but with 170,000 sows farrowing, 36 per cent more slaughter hogs are expected to hit the market this fall than were marketed last fall. Likewise, the national output is up 12 per cent.

The heavy marketing period is expected to be in late September and October. Chances are that the price of hogs will be depressed during the fall particularly during that period when the heavy marketing occurs. Economists are recommending that hog feeders either push their animals to beat the rush or market them light. The extra weight gained may be offset by the expected decrease in market price. Or if the pigs are young feed them slowly and

market after the heavy fall marketing.

Wheat growers should keep in mind the date for the 1960 wheat referendum. July 23 is referendum day. J. E. Quisenberry, County ASC Office manager, will keep you posted on the matter.
