> Cotton insects and their control have received considerable discussion of late. Prospects for a better than normal crop have improved with the rains and so have the insects in many cases.

> I have checked several fields in the last week over the county finding light to heavy infestations of and grasshoppers are common in numerous insects. Fleahoppers practically all the fields in varying numbers. Bollworms, weevil punctures, army worms, chinch bugs, cabbage loopers, thrips, aphids and even square borers have been noted in the fields checked.

The question in most operators minds is whether or not to spray or dust to control insects. In answer, every field must be considered separately. Most fields of cotton are making rapid growth at the moment, and are making many squares. If you have some moisture to continue this growth and production then spraying or dusting, if hte insects are present in your cotton, should allow your cotton to hold its fruit and may avoid a heavy build up of insects that could continue to plague your

I checked one field that was sprayed prior to the week of rainy weather. It had stalks with as many as seven forms on some of the lower fruiting branches. The fleahoppers were controlled temporarily and the plants made use of the favorable conditions. That crop of cotton as well as the others in the county is a long way from the gin, but the amount of fruiting found certainly was encouraging.




