New Highway Open to Traffic; Plans Are Made for South Part

Once again U. S. Highway 277 is open to traffic north of Bronte. The road has been under construction for several months, with traffic being detoured around the north part of Bronte and alongside the highway from the edge of town on to the Y nine miles north of here.

Plans call for rebuilding and widening the highway south of Bronte on into San Angelo as the next part of the program in this vicinity. Reports have been heard that a portable bridge will be constructed across the Colorado River south of town, for use while a new bridge is being built. Right-of-way for the section south of here has been secured and most of the fencing done. No major changes in location are planned, it was reported.

The contract with Strain Bros. also included an overpass at the Abilene-Sweetwater Y.

vantage of the GI Bill loan provisions since June 22, 1944.

The law allows an additional year, until July 25, 1961, for processing and actual closing of loans, but applications must be made during the ensuing year under present legislation.

These dates do not pertain to Korean veterans who have until January 31, 1965, to make loan applications. World War II veterans who also served in Korea are considered Korean veterans for loan purposes.

In all, 35 percent of the eligible World War II veterans have taken advantage of the loan program, Mims said. He pointed out that an exceptionally low record of defaults has won the approval of the nation's financial leaders and that an extremely high percentage of the loans have already been repaid in advance of the final due dates.

Through May 31, 1959, a total of 4,955,300 World War II veterans have made GI loans for a total face value of \$39,220,608,200. Of this total, 4,657,100 loans were made for homes, 228,400 for business ventures and 69,800 for farms and equipment.

A good turnout was on hand for the preliminary meeting last Thursday night. Considered the most logical site is the city-owned 200 acres one mile east of Robert Lee.

Cumbie Ivey Jr. says Dick Turner, golf pro at the San Angelo Country Club, will come here prior to the Thursday night meeting and make a tour of the city property and give his opinion as to whether or not it would be suitable for a 9-hole layout.

This property has two lakes and a good water well, a highly important factor if grass greens and good fairways are to be maintained.

A suggested membership of \$100 will likely be required to build the course. Everyone agreed that such memberships would be bought back by the club if a member moved from the community.

Another matter getting unanimous approval is to establish the golf club as a county-wide project. Since Coke County has a small population it will be necessary to obtain members from Bronte, Silver, Robert Lee and all other sections of the county.

Everyone interested in getting a golf course for the county is urged to attend and take part in the discussions Thursday night. If there is enough interest, steps will be taken to go ahead with an organization. Otherwise the matter will be dropped.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

In my lifetime I've saw Government agencies git control of roads, rents, prices, production, power, pork, credit, and crops. It's beginning to look like there ain't nothing worthwhile left to control but the hereafter and I figger Congress will git started on that at the next session.

In fact, they've already got one foot in the door on controlling the hereafter by making funeral homes git a license and bury a feller according to rules and regulations set up by law. They've got so much red tape to it that St. Peter must have a hard time gitting it unravelled when the departed arrives up yonder.

The reason I mention it is on account of this piece in the paper about a feller in Richmond, Virginia, complaining because the funeral parlor boys is joining a labor union. I can't see how a few more complications like this is going to make any difference.

Back when I was a boy they buried a man in a sheet, and a woman in a sheet with lace trim. The departed was laid out on a cooling board while the neighbors built the coffin. The village blacksmith always kept handles made fer the box and he was usually the first one notified after the preacher. They always held a wake fer the departed, and the clocks in the house was stopped and the mirrors draped. The departed was laid with feet to the east and head to the west so he'd rise facing the morning sun.

They carried the corpse by wagon to the church, where a long sermon was preached, sometimes lasting fer two hours or more. Then when they got to the grave they would sing songs fer another hour.

I can't see that they've made but one real improvement since them days, Mister Editor. Now they don't devote more'n a ten-minute sermon to the departed.

But like buggy whips and corsets, the old fashioned funeral ain't in demand no more. The relatives is in to big a hurry to git home and divide up the loot. And as cars git faster, things will git worse. The relatives used to have a day or two warning but in the next generation natural death will be mighty uncommon.

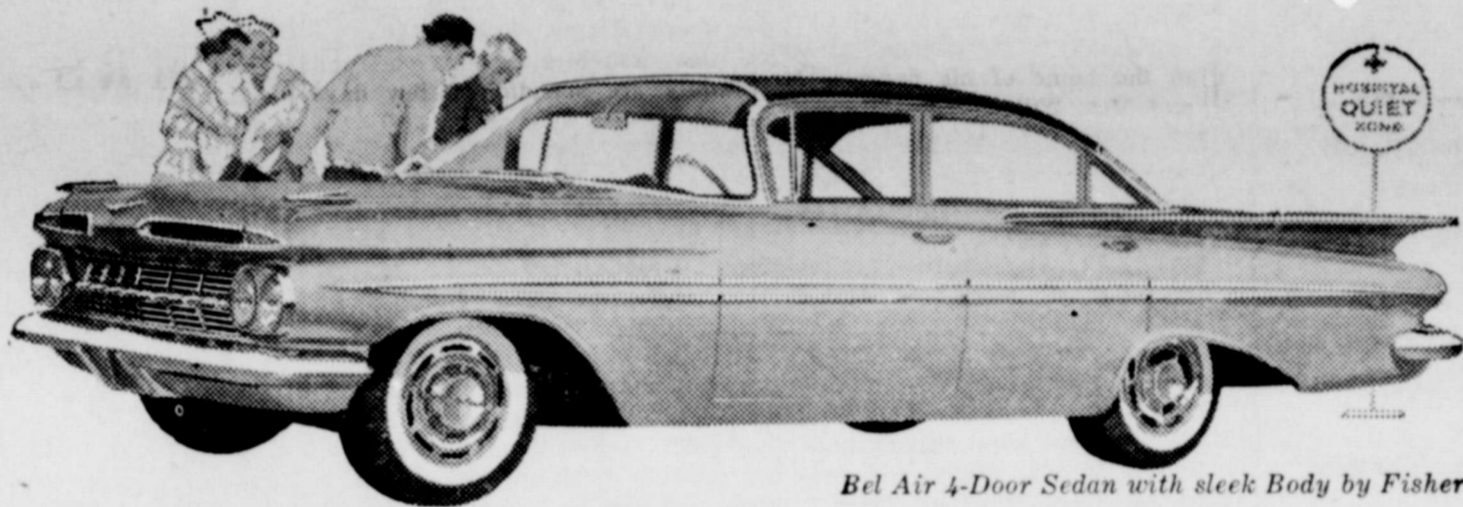

vantage of the GI Bill loan provisions since June 22, 1944.

The law allows an additional year, until July 25, 1961, for processing and actual closing of loans, but applications must be made during the ensuing year under present legislation.

These dates do not pertain to Korean veterans who have until January 31, 1965, to make loan applications. World War II veterans who also served in Korea are considered Korean veterans for loan purposes.

In all, 35 percent of the eligible World War II veterans have taken advantage of the loan program, Mims said. He pointed out that an exceptionally low record of defaults has won the approval of the nation's financial leaders and that an extremely high percentage of the loans have already been repaid in advance of the final due dates.

Through May 31, 1959, a total of 4,955,300 World War II veterans have made GI loans for a total face value of \$39,220,608,200. Of this total, 4,657,100 loans were made for homes, 228,400 for business ventures and 69,800 for farms and equipment.

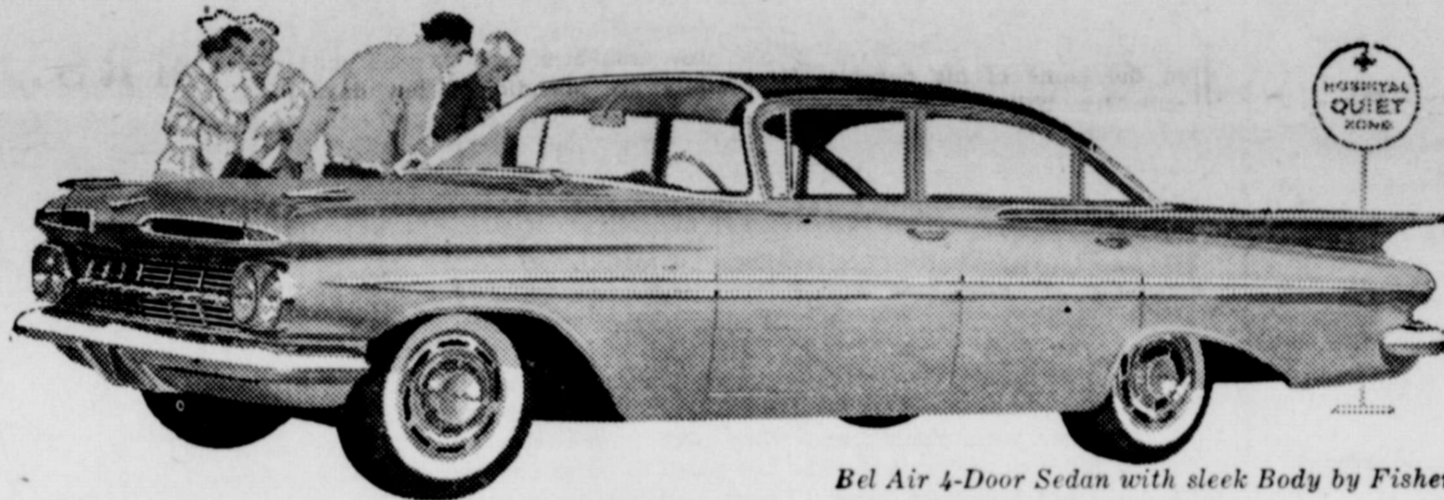

More Payments Provided By Social Security

September 30, 1959, can be an important date for dependents of certain disabled workers, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security Administration office.

The 1958 amendments to the Social Security Act authorized monthly benefit payments to dependents of a worker who is receiving disability insurance benefits Ellington explained. He added, however, that as in the case of other types of social security payments, retroactivity is limited to twelve months from the date a claim is filed. Thus, since the amendments became effective with September 1958, an application must be made no later than September 1959, in order to avoid the loss of one or more months' benefits. Of course, no payments can be made for months before September, 1958, the month the law was amended.

The changes permit payments to all the following classes of dependents formerly eligible only as dependents of a retired or deceased worker:

1. Unmarried children under age 18.
2. Disabled children over 18 if the disability began before age 18, and they are unmarried at the time of application.
3. A wife over 62 years of age.
4. A wife of any age, provided the wife has in her care a child entitled to benefits.
5. A dependent husband age 65 or older.

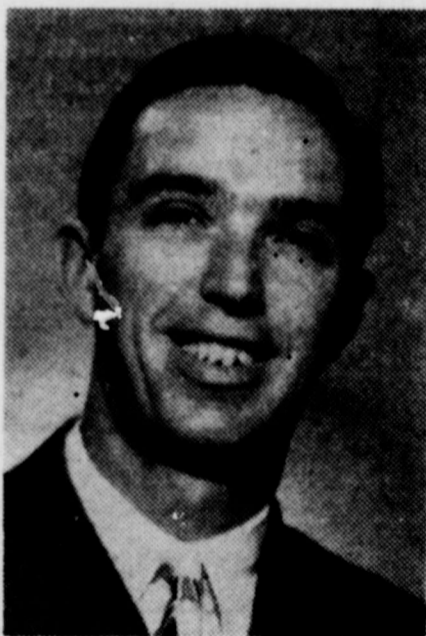
