Clift Duncan, 21 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Duncan of Robert Lee, is a recent victim of polio. Both legs are paralyzed and he is being treated at the polio ward in Shannon hospital at San Angelo.

The child had been given two shots of Salk vaccine and was due for its third shot right away.

Mr. and Mrs. Duncan and their children were in Dallas on a business trip last week, when Clift's illness was noticed. They returned home Wednesday and the child was admitted to Bronte hospital. His ailment was definitely determined as infantile paralysis by Friday when he was removed to the polio treatment center.

The Duncans have two other children. Donna is three years old, and Darrell, born April 9, Donnie is a former Robert Lee high school football star and his wife is the former Wanda Tomlinson of Bronte.

New State Law Requires Boats To Be Registered

AUSTIN, TEXAS — State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said today that registration of boats would go into effect in October. The new boating act requiring registration was recently passed by the Legislature.

Greer assured boat owners that no penalties or convictions will be involved for this delayed registration date, particularly in view of the fact that final boat-registration date is March 1, 1960. Other features are now in effect.

Greer explained that boat registration was a little foreign to the ordinary function of the Texas Highway Department, but that the Department was already well experienced in handling this type of operation.

"We have been registering motor vehicles for more than forty years. Nearly four and a half million motor vehicles were registered by the Department this year. The Texas Legislature, cognizant of the experience of the Highway Department, gave us the job in order to take advantage of existing operations and to cut cost. The Texas Highway Department deals solely with registration in this boating bill; we have nothing to do with the safety aspect," Greer said.

The appropriation bill passed last week provides funds after September 1. These funds enable the Texas Highway Department to print the necessary forms and place into operation the procedures invested in the Highway Department by the act.

Greer estimated that the registration forms and blanks would be printed and in the hands of boat dealers, county offices, Highway Department offices, and other public offices in October. Ample public notice will be given when these forms are available.

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors —

Survival of sorghum alnum is better than results of earlier inspections indicated it would be. Stands that appeared to have only 8% to 10% survival early this spring now show 40% to 50% survival. Good rains and the fact that sorghum alnum makes a late start may have made the difference.

Local Soil Conservation Service technicians have been making clippings in the count to secure some estimates of the production of range and pasture land in this area. These clippings supply only an estimate of the total production but are of interest as such. These are the results from clippings made so far presented in the form of pounds per acre dry eight. Second year sorghum alnum on Tom Wiginton's place — 8,000 lb.; third year sorghum alnum on Otis Smith — 10,000 lb.; third year blue panic on Charles Sims, — 8,500 lb.; third year Blue panic on C. D. Stewart estate — 5,800 lb.; and third year Blue panic on D. K. Glenn — 4,500 lb.

A clipping made on rangeland, sandy loam silt, showed a yield of

2,670 lbs. per acre, dry weight. The fall seed crop of native grasses is often the one that produces the most and best seed, so now is the time to plan on resting one of your pastures this fall to allow for a good seed crop. A grass cover on the ground is like money in the bank. It's there when you need it and draws interest in soil protection and lower soil temperatures.

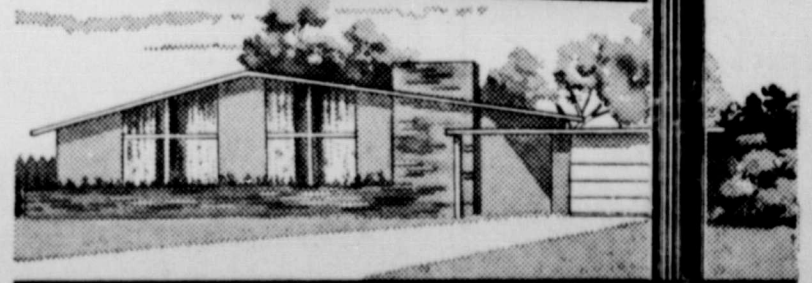

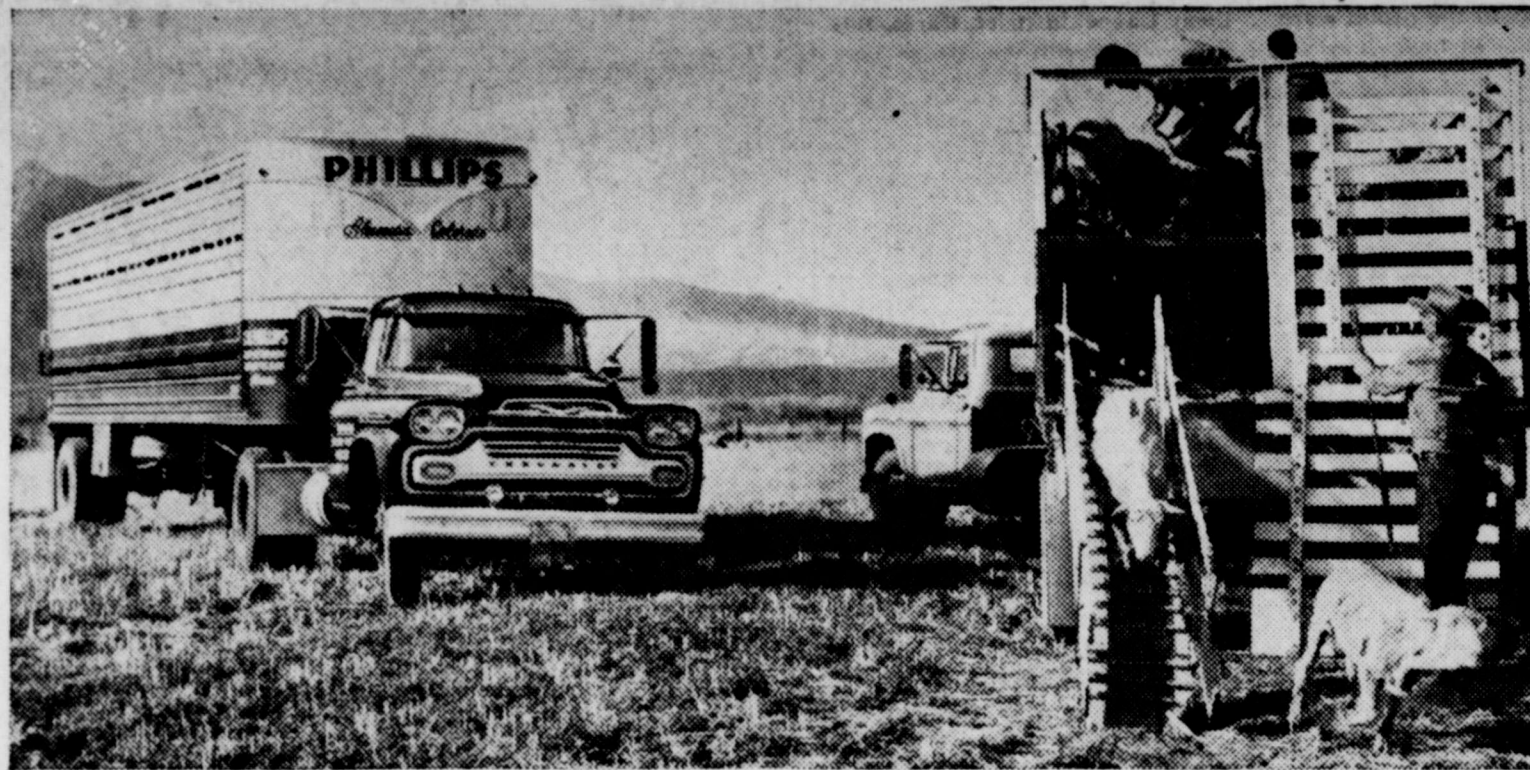

FHA Cuts Number Of Texas Employee Of Texas Workers

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas this year with 117 fewer employees than it had a year ago at this time according to a statement this week from Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director. Since the break of the drouth, the agency, statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued seven of its field offices on a full-time basis.

Insofar as the employees who lost their jobs, McKay said that in practically every case the training and experience they gained during their employment with Farmers Home Administration enabled them to step into jobs with banks, PCA's and other private and cooperative credit institutions—many of them at salaries better than they had with the Government.

In connection with the services available to farm families, there will be no change according to McKay. He said that during the past three years more than 12,000 farmers and ranchers paid their loans in full to Farmers Home Administration, and for the most part had reached or regained a position where private and cooperative sources can now handle their credit needs.

Farmers Home Administration will continue to make loans to eligible applicants for farm and home operating expenses; for the purchase of livestock and equipment needed to put their farm programs on a sound basis and to finance farm real estate purchases and improvements.
