## Bronte Downs Steers, 23 to 8; Eden Bulldogs to Be Here Friday

In their second game of the season and first on the home field, the Bronte Longhorns will take on the Eden Bulldogs Friday night at 8 o'clock.

Following their victory last week over Robert Lee, the Longhorns will be in good shape to tackle the Bulldogs. Coaches said they feel that Bronte can beat the visitors, but it will be a tough battle. Eden has one of the most outstanding fullbacks in the area and the whole team has a lot of speed. Eden's team averages about 155 pounds. The Bulldogs lost their season opener to Junction, 16-6.

School officials have announced a few new rules concerning activities at football games on the Bronte field.

One of the most important is that fans are being asked to stay off the field, that is on the outside of the fence. Only coaches, players, doctors, officials and press representatives will be allowed inside.

All tickets will be sold at the ticket booth. Cars carrying mothers with small babies, elderly people or persons who are ill will be the only vehicles allowed inside the fence. Tickets for persons occupying these cars must be bought at the ticket booth.

Members of Bronte's Volunteer Fire Department will police the game, helping to enforce the regulations and assisting in other ways.

Admission price for Friday night's game is \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for student. Game time is 8 p. m.

Corley made 5 and then threw a long aerial to Black, but it was incomplete, even though some Robert Lee fans thought it might have been a fumble. Corley then completed a pass to Jerry McCutchen for a first down and Arrott made another, going to the Steer 41. The next two plays failed to gain as the first quarter ended.

On the first play of the second period, Corley surprised the Steers with a quick kick which set the ball down on Robert Lee's 5 yard line. After making a first and then three unsuccessful tries for another 10 yards, the Steers punted to Mickey Black, who made his sensational 50 yard run for the first touchdown of the game.

Lanny Denman place kicked the ball between the uprights for an extra point and Bronte was ahead 7-0.

Bronte's second touchdown of the game came soon after. After the kickoff, Kenneth McCutchen intercepted a Steer pass on their 34. Corley picked up a first on the 15, then Arrott went to the 3. Corley plunged over for the tally, and Arrott carried around end for two more points, making the score 15-0.

The remainder of the second quarter was marked by an exchange of fumbles, a punt block by Neil Black and a pass interception by Tinkler of the Steers. At this point a 15 yard penalty, first of the game, was called against Robert Lee, nullifying a 15 yard pass which was completed. Before the end of the half, Robert Lee picked up two first downs.

Sims took the kickoff for the Steers as the second half got underway. He was thrown for a 10 yard loss and punted to the Bronte 40. Corley gained 7 and Arrott connected with Black for 20 and a first down on the Steer 38. Bronte drew a couple of penalties, setting them back 20 yards. Corley fumbled on a punt attempt and Robert Lee had the ball on their 45. The Steers failed to make their 10 yards and punted to the Bronte 30. Richard Sims intercepted a pass on the Bronte 44. He picked up 9 and Kinsey went to the 32 for a first. Sims to Wink netted another first or the Longhorn 15 and then the Sims brothers carried the ball to the 4 on a couple of tries. Kinsey made 2 and Richard Sims went over for the score. Ronnie Sims carried the ball over for two extras making the count 15-8 in favor of Bronte.

After three plays failed to make a first Bronte punted and Ronnie Sims fumbled. Bronte recovered on the Steer 20.

Bronte was penalized 15 early in the fourth, but managed to get down to the 2 for a first. Corley plunged over, making six more points, and Arrott converted for 2 more, making the score 23 to 8.

After the kickoff, Jerry McCutchen intercepted a Steer pass. The Longhorns failed to gain and punted to Kinsey on his 34. After a couple of unsuccessful passes, Tinkler made a first at midfield. 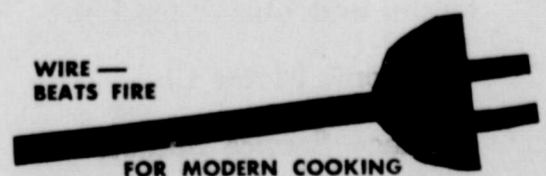
