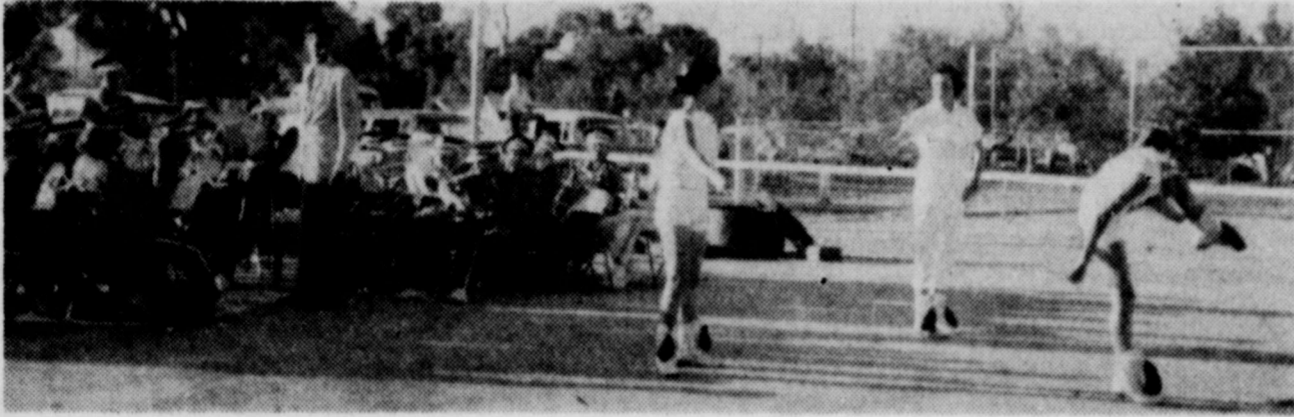

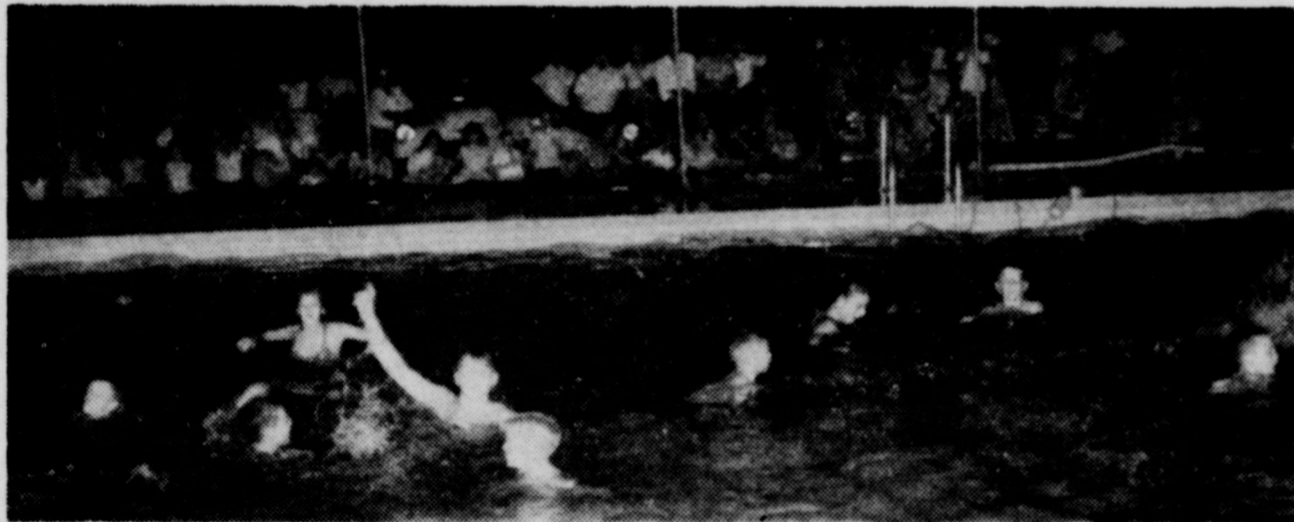

## Party to Plan Dams Coming

The planning party which will make surveys in this area for dams on the Kickapoo Creeks are scheduled to arrive here about Sept. 21. F. S. Higginbotham, chairman of the board of direc-

tors of the water district for the project, said this week that the party had been in communication with him concerning their plans.

Higginbotham asked the Enterprise to announce the coming survey, so that landowners in the area affected will be expecting members of the planning party. He asked for the cooperation of all landowners in making the work as easy as possible.

The work of this group will be the beginning of a project which was started several years ago after two disastrous floods did widespread damage to Bronte and the surrounding country. Much work was done by individuals, the Bronte Lions Club and finally by a steering committee in getting the water district created which will have charge of the construction.

## Longhorns Defeat Eden Eleven, 18-6

The Bronte Longhorns handily defeated the Eden Bulldogs here last Friday night in a non-conference game. Score was 18-6.

Eden kicked off to the Longhorns. Reyes Olivias took it on the 32 and made small yardage. Dee Arrott made 7 and Mickey Black picked up another 2. Arrott had a pass knocked down, but the

Longhorns decided to run on the 4th down. Benny Corley carried for 4 and a 1st down on the 47 yard line.

On one play with Arrott carrying and three carries by Corley the Longhorns were in scoring position. Corley made 13 yards and a touchdown. Lanny Denman tried kicking for the extra point, but it was no good.

Corley kicked the football 70 yards for the kickoff to Eden. After several plays by the Bulldogs, they were forced to punt. Bronte received the kickoff on their 35, but fumbled and Eden recovered. A series of plays by the Bulldogs put them down on Bronte's 12 yard line when the first quarter ended.

At the beginning of the second, Bronte's line tightened up and after four tries by the Bulldogs, the ball went over on downs to the Longhorns on their own 6 yard line.

With the ball in their possession again, the locals were ready for another touchdown march. Arrott picked up 4, then Mickey Black made a sensational 39 yard run to set up a 1st down. Corley picked up some good blocking and advanced 28 yards further down the field to the 21 yard line. In 2 tries the Longhorns picked up 8 and 5 yards for another 1st. Black then carried the ball the remaining 6 yards for the tally. Again, Denman's kick was no good, and the Longhorns were ahead, 12-0.

Mrs. Harwell died about 7:30 p. m. Monday, Sept. 14, at the home of her daughter, Miss Myrtle Harwell, in Roscoe. She had been in ill health for several years and seriously ill for some time.

She was born May 31, 1877, in Travis County and was married in 1896 to the late Mr. Harwell, prominent Coke County ranchman and cattleman and one of the county's early settlers. The family owned and operated a large ranch 14 miles southeast of Bronte. Mr. Harwell died in 1951. Mrs. Harwell had lived with her daughter in Roscoe the past nine years.

She was a member of the Baptist Church.

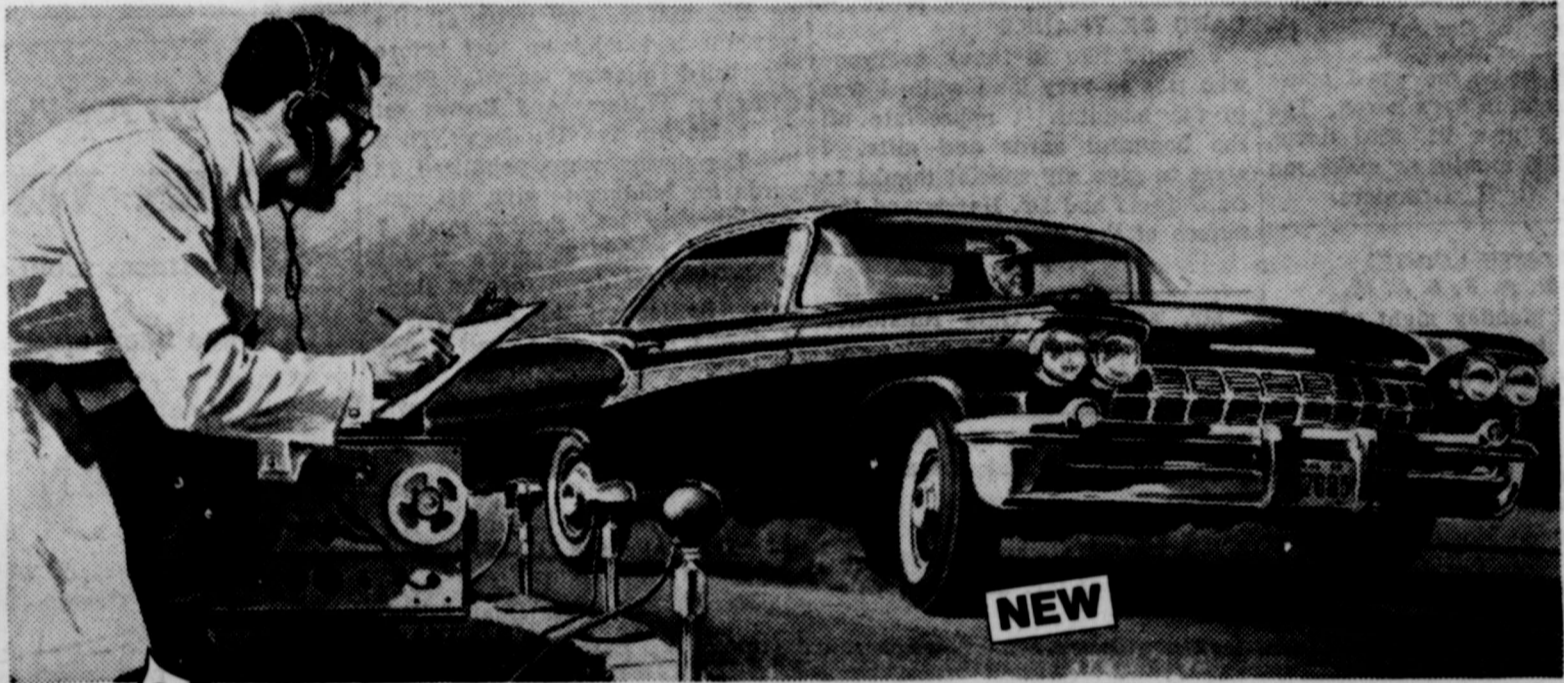

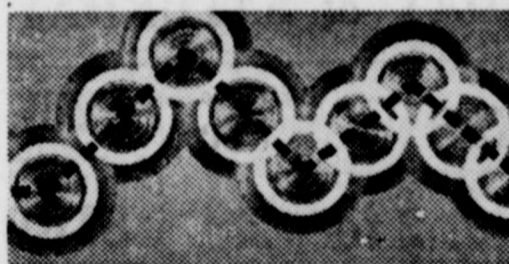
