Church of Christ Installs New Heating Equipment

Two 100,000 B. T. U. winter air conditioners have been installed in the local Church of Christ the past week.

The units are fully automatic and thermostatically controlled. The units are installed in storage rooms to the rear of the auditorium and the forced warmed air will enter the auditorium and return to the heating units through grills located in the front of the auditorium. The units are expected to give comfortable, even heat over the entire auditorium area even in extremely cold weather.

Santa Anna Falls to Longhorns; Colorado City 'B' Here Tonight

The Bronte Longhorns took a victory from Class A Santa Anna last Friday night on the opponents' field. Final score was 26 to 12 in favor of the Longhorns.

This week the local lads meet a "B" team from Colorado City here on Thursday night instead of the usual time on Friday night. Coach Bob Howard urged all fans to come out to the game, as it promises to be a good one, and the Longhorns need the support of all local school patrons.

Lanny Denman, Kenneth McCutchen and possibly Mike Luttrell will not see action against Colorado City, because of injuries.

Howard announced that fans who wish to go to the other side of the field may do so without going around the outside fence. Members of the FFA chapter are building gates which will make this possible.

In the game with Santa Anna, Bronte received the opening kickoff and Buddy Walker carried back to the 38. On the first play from scrimmage, Larry Robinson carried to the Mountaineer 49 and a 1st down. Eddie Spjiller and Robinson carried a couple of

downs for small gain and an incomplete pass brought up 4th. Bennie Corley punted to the 22.

Santa Anna tried twice for no gain, then Eddie Hartman made 8, but was short of a 1st. Tommy Stewardson punted to the 47. On the next series of downs, Bronte was besieged with fumbles and unable to make a first so Corley punted to the 34. Santa Anna was unable to gain and the Mountaineers punted to the 7, where Mickey Black took the ball and ran it back to the 48.

Spiller picked up 3 and Robinson's pass was incomplete. Corley quick kicked to the 21 yard line, with no runback.

A couple of plays later Hartman passed to Randy Brown, who went all the way to set up the first figures on the scoreboard. Extra point try failed, so the score was 6-0, Santa Anna.

Jimmy Neill kicked off and Reyes Olivas ran the ball back to the 32. Dee Arrott made 4 but the Longhorns were unable to make the necessary yardage and Corley kicked to the Santa Anna 23 as the 1st quarter ended.

2nd Quarter

Santa Anna was able to move

the ball only two yards in three plays and Bronte took the punt on the 49. Arrott made 5 and Corley added 2 more. Arrott then picked up 17 for a 1st down on the 25 yard line. On the next play Corley went across the double stripe to tie up the score. Corley's extra point kick was no good.

After Corley's kickoff, Santa Anna put the ball into play on their 20. In the next seven plays, the Mountaineers were able to make 2 first downs and place the ball on their 47. In the next try Hartmann passed to Lynn Cockrey who made it all the way to pay dirt and again placed the Longhorns behind 6 points. Extra point try failed, leaving the score 12-6, Santa Anna.

Niell kicked and Robinson took the ball on his 20 and ran it back to the 40 before he was brought down. Robinson, Mickey Black and Corley carried the ball and picked up good yardage, but failed to make 10 before Santa Anna recovered a fumble on the 40.

The next series of downs failed to make the required yards and Santa Anna kicked. Corley passed to Black for 17, and a 1st on the 37, then Arrott hit Black for 17 and a 1st on the 37, then Arrott hit Black with another aerial for another 1st on the 25. Corley ried 2 passes but they were incomplete, and the 1st half ended, with Bronte on the short end of the 12-6 score.

3rd Quarter

Corley booted the ball into the end zone to open the second half and Santa Anna put it in play on the 20. On the 2nd play from scrimmage the Mountaineers fumbled and Kenneth Caulder recovered on the 28 yard line. Corley made 5, but Arrott's pass to Olivas was intercepted and Santa Anna took the ball on their 20.

Failing to make 10 yards, the Mountaineers punted, but Caulder went through their line and blocked it, giving Bronte the ball on the 20. On the first play Corley made the 20 yards and crossed the double stripe. Arrott ran two extra points, making the score 14-12 in favor of the Longhorns.

Corley's kick was taken on the two by Brown who ran it out to the 25. Four plays later Santa Anna was on the 31 which brought up a kicking situation. They punted to the 41 where Bronte took over. Arrott carried to the 25 for a 1st. He carried again for no gain, then passed to Jerry McCutchen for 6. Carrying again, Arrott made a 1st on the 11. Corley picked up 5 in each of two tries, making another first down close to the 1 yard line. Arrott carried the ball over on the next play, to put the Longhorns further ahead with a score of 20-12. Don Andrews ran for the extra points but didn't make it.

Corley's kickoff was taken by Brown almost on the goal line. He brought the ball back to the 20. Santa Anna was able to make a 1s on the 36 before the quarter ended.

4th Quarter

On the 1st play in the quarter the Mountaineers made another 1st on the 47. Four plays later they were forced to kick and Black brought the ball out to the 27. A penalty against the Longhorns set it back to the 12. Corley lost 3 on a fumble, but gained 8 on the

been completely re-styled. The interiors are roomier and offer new ideas in upholstery and sidewall treatment.

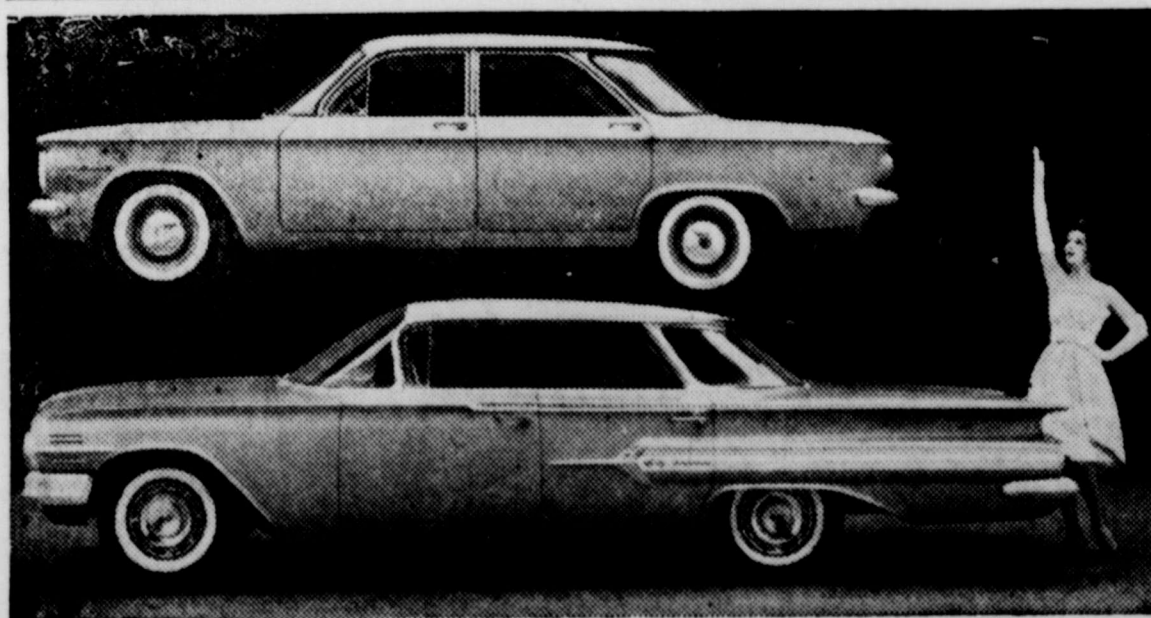
