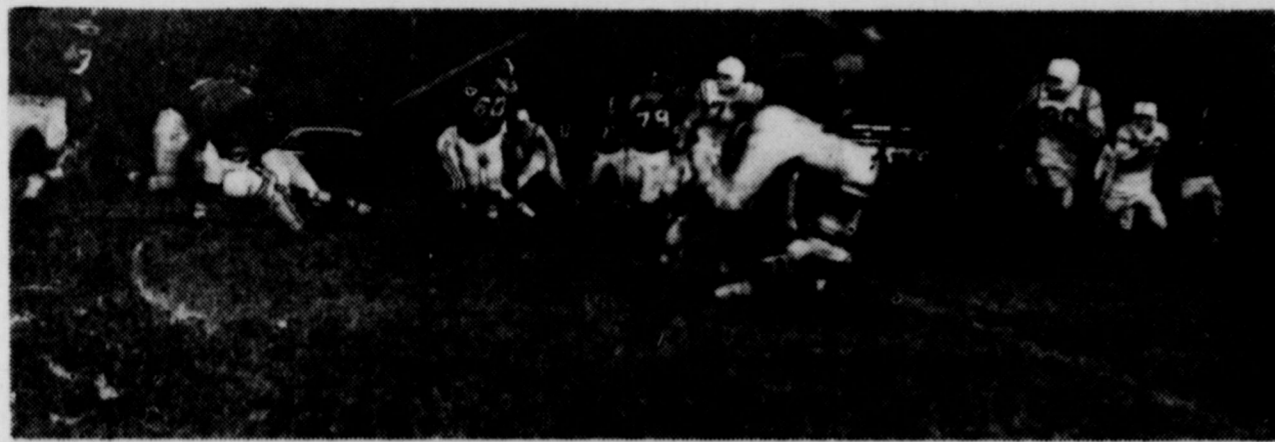

Longhorns Trounce Eldorado 34-0 to Keep Perfect Record

The unbroken winning streak of 1959 for the Bronte Longhorns advanced another notch last Friday night when the local team trounced the Eldorado Eagles 34-0 in an important District 6-B contest.

The victory over Eldorado was Bronte's third district win and its eighth season win this year.

The Longhorns won the toss and elected to receive the kickoff. Pat Preston kicked for Eldorado to the 10 yard line where it was taken by Larry Robinson and returned to the 20. Benny Corley and Dee Arrott alternated carrying the ball, making good yardage in most all their tries, and 11 plays later the pigskin rested on Eldorado's 1 yard line. Corley took it over on the next play. Lanny Denman kicked the conversion, making a score of 7-0.

Corley's kick went out on the 5, so he kicked again and it was taken by Donny Holden who ran it out to the 29.

Eldorado's fast fullback, Carl Parker, took the ball and picked up 8 yards, and H. A. Belk added 2 more for a 1st down. In the next 3 plays Parker was able to make only 8 yards, so he kicked to Dee Arrott on the 15. Arrott ran the ball all the way back to Eldorado's 32.

Mickey Black went 4 yards up the field and Arrott added 2 more. Corley, in the next two runs, made a 1st on the 21. Arrott lost 2, then hit Jerry McCutchen with a pass for 7. Corley's pass to M. Black hit the ground, but Arrott made 6 yards and a 1st down on the 9. Arrott made one more run for 5 yards before the first quarter ended.

2nd Quarter

On the first play of the 2nd period Arrott went over for a TD. Denman again kicked the extra point to make the score read, Bronte 14, Eldorado 0.

Corley's kickoff was taken on the 1 and brought out to the 20 by Donny Holden. Parker and Holden gained 10 yards in 3 plays, giving

the Eagles a 1st on the 30. John McGregor's pass to Jerry Johnson made 9 and Parker added 9 more for another 1st down on the 48. Eldorado was unable to gain on the next 2 plays and Holden picked up 5 on the third down, making a punt necessary for the Eagles. The punt rolled dead on the 18 yard line in Bronte's end of the field.

Corley and M. Black each made 3, then a 5 yard gain was celled back and Bronte was penalized 15 yards. Arrott made 2, but Bronte was still short of a 1st down. Corley kicked to the 40 where Parker called for a fair catch.

Eldorado got off 2 plays for a net gain of 4 yards, then McGregor fumbled and Bob Wrinkle recovered from the Longhorns. Corley made 6, then a pass from Arrott to Kenneth McCutchen fell incomplete. It was made up, however, on the next play when Arrott connected with Mickey Black for a gain of 19 yards on the 18.

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Bronte-Trent Game Set for Friday Night

The Bronte Longhorns should have a fairly easy time of it Friday night when they journey to Trent to take on the Gorillas in a District 6-B contest. District standings have the Longhorns at

the top of the race, while the Gorillas are next to the cellar position.

Bronte has won all of its district games while Trent has been able to defeat only the Robert Lee Steers. They played that contest last week and beat the Steers 8-6.

Third in Area

The Longhorns are still rated as the No. 3 Class B team in this area by the Abilene Reporter-News. The Abilene paper places Rochester and Knox City of District 10-B in the two top slots.

Benny Corley, Bronte's star back, also maintained his place as the No. 4 scorer in this area of West Texas. He has made 99 points for the Longhorns, running across 16 touchdowns and making three extra points.

In other District 6-B action this Friday, Loraine will be at Robert Lee and Eldorado will play at Hermleigh.

A large delegation of Longhorn boosters is expected to follow the team to Trent Friday night. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

Mr. Eubanks died Saturday, Oct. 30, in Cherry Hill, Arkansas.

He was born May 26, 1881 in Polk County, Arkansas. He moved to Texas in 1886 and lived and farmed in Coke County until 1955, when he returned to Arkansas, where he resided at Cherry Hill until the time of his death.

He was married July 26, 1904 to Miss Jimmie Effie Samford, who died in 1943. He was remarried on Aug. 30, 1955 to Bertie Leonard at DeQueen, Ark.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Ellis Eubanks, Robert Lee and Mack Eubanks, Bronte; one daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Crisp of Midland; 12 grand children and five great grandchildren. Three sons and one daughter preceded Mr. Eubank in death.

Taxes Coming in

The three tax offices to which Bronte area residents pay their taxes each year have been busy during the past month and collections have been good.

The City of Bronte had collected \$3,399.97 up to Nov. 1. Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city tax collector and secretary, said this is the highest amount of taxes to be paid during October since she has been working at the city hall.

B. D. Snead, Bronte school tax collector, reported that \$16,895.88 had been collected up to the first. The school district still has a long way to go, as Humble Oil & Refining Co., the district's big tax payer, still is to come in. Humble's school taxes this year amount to \$74,000.

State and County Tax Collector Paul Good's office reported that

over a half million had been collected up to Nov. 1. This figure represents nearly 90 percent of the county taxes, since a 3% discount is allowed on state and county taxes during the month of October.

Snead said that school taxes will amount to some \$47,000 more this year than for 1958, due to the tax rate increase which was voted recently. The district's rate now amounts to \$1.90 per \$100 compared to \$1.25 last year. The district's valuation is down about \$210,000 below last year, with the oil property valuation being down and other property being up slightly. This year's total taxes due is \$146,520.12, compared to \$99,020.13 for last year.

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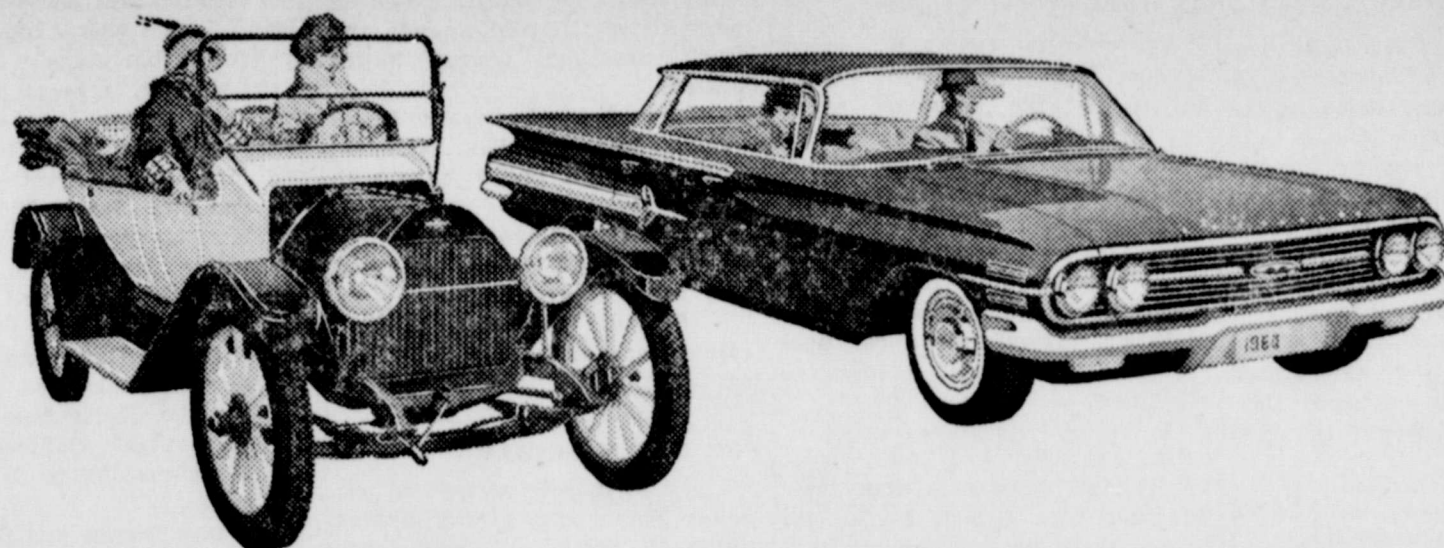

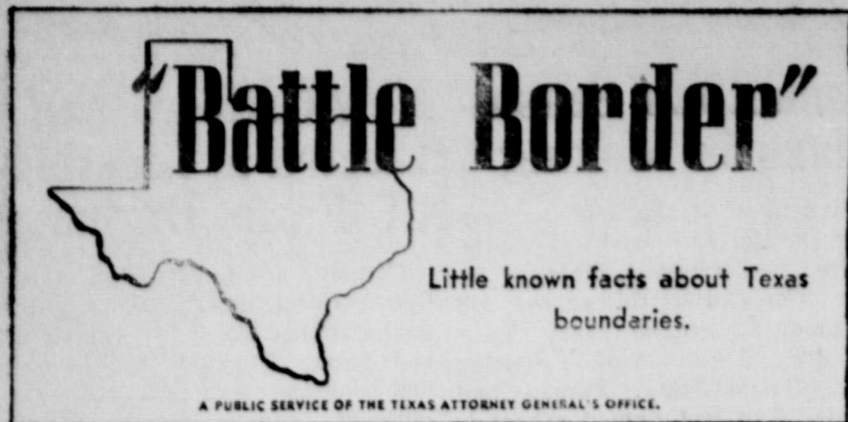

"Texas sent a county judge to take possession of Santa Fe but the U.S. colonel kicked him out," Will Wilson said.

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

The Republic of Texas wanted annexation in 1837 but was re-

jected by Congress. Sam Houston withdrew the offer and dreamed of a new republic stretching westward from Texas to the Pacific including the northern tier of Mexican states, plus present day New Mexico, Arizona and California. Attorney General Will Wilson,

a great admirer of Houston, points out how skillfully Houston incited the jealousy of the United States.

"Sam Houston stoked the fire under the pot of jealousy by ignoring the United States and dicker with France and England, both known to want Texas independent.

"Houston's vision of a large competitive nation between the U. S. and Mexico caused Washington to run a fever."

Annexation followed, resulting in the 1848 War with Mexico in which the Western one third of the present United States was acquired. During this war, Gen. Stephen W. Kearny led U. S. troops overland from Dodge City, Kansas, to capture Santa Fe and remain in possession.

Senator Benton in Congress immediately put the Santa Fe territory into a boiling caldron of debate over slavery by demanding that possession of Santa Fe not be delivered to Texas because Texas was a slave state.

A full dress rehearsal of the coming tragedy of civil war began.

Texas sent Spruce M. Baird as county judge to take possession of Santa Fe, but Colonel John M. Washington kicked him out. Texas also sent Robert S. Neighbors as county judge at El Paso.

Since there were no federal troops in El Paso Judge Neighbors successfully established a beach-head and took possession for Texas.

Governor Bell of Texas called a special session of the legislature to organize 3,000 mounted volunteers to capture Santa Fe from the federal troops. The legislature gave Bell an out by providing that the troops be used only if the United States refused to buy the disputed territory.

This brought on another bitter division and debate in our national congress, compromised by fixing the present boundary between Texas and New Mexico and

paying Texas ten million dollars for surrendered territory. Texas kept El Paso because she had possession, but Texas lost most of what is now New Mexico.

Historian Will Wilson says Texas got short changed again.

Texas had money in the treasury but her northern and western boundary had been pushed down more than 100,000 square miles.

"The United States bought that real estate for 15 cents an acre!"

Corley's kick carried the ball to the 8 where H. A. Belk took it and ran it out to the 21. Parker made 6 and Belk added 6 for a 1st on the 33. Belk on 3 successive carries made 4, 2 and 6 for another 1st on the 45. An incomplete pass was the last play of the 1st half.

3rd Quarter

Bronte's kickoff from Corley's toe sailed the football into the end zone where Holden took it and made yardage out to the 15. Parker carried three times and made yardage sufficient for a 1st down on the 30. Belk made 1 and Parker 9 for another 1st on the 40. Holden lost 1, Belk made 5, and Parker threw a pass but it was intercepted by Kenneth McCutchen on the 46.

Corley made 9 and then ran for 5, but a fumble gave the ball back to the Eagles and they ran the ball to their 40. McGregor lost 3 and then threw a pass, but Corley beat Jerry Johnson to it and Bronte took over the ball. A penalty against Bronte set the Longhorns back 15 yards.

The Eagles lost ground on the next 2 plays, so Parker got in punt formation. Jerry McCutchen found a hole and got through the line, blocking the kick, and it went only to the 37 yard line.

Corley's pass to Arrott was no good. Corley then made 8 and 6 on 2 carries, good for a 1st on the 24. The Longhorns bogged down on the next series, losing yards, and then having to give up the ball on a fumble. Eldorado took over.

The coming series of downs took the Eagles on their most serious threat of the ball game. They racked up 3 1st downs with Parker, Belk and Holden doing the ball carrying chores. Starting on the 21, they were unable to move beyond the 18 in 4 tries, and Bronte took over at that point.

Corley made 12 and a 1st on the 30. Then he made 13 more and another 1st on the 43. Corley recovered his own fumble and Bronte was penalized 5 yards. On the next play Mickey Black connected with Jerry McCutchen for a long one which gave Bronte a 1st down on the Eagle 23 yard line. Corley made 4, then threw a pass to M. Black for the touchdown. Bronte was penalized on the extra point try, and it was no good.

Corley kicked off to the 10 and Johnson brought it out to the 20. Parker made 11 and Belk lost 1. Eldorado was making a last minute passing attack, all to no avail, when the final gun sounded. The scoreboard on the west side of the field read: Bronte 34, Visitors 0.

slightly over last year. The taxable valuation for 1959 is \$1,172,414.50, compared with a 1958 figure of \$1,118,084.00. Total city taxes due amount to \$11,724.14. This figure is based on a \$1.00 tax rate.

The \$545,000 collected in state and county taxes was a big part of the \$636,800 due. Sun and Humble are the big taxpayers in the county and paid almost half of the total amount.

Good's office reported that 218 poll taxes have been issued to date. Deadline for paying poll taxes is Jan. 31.
