Work Begins on US Highway 277 South of Bronte

The Texas Highway Department has begun construction on the Highway 277 project from Bronte south to the Tom Green county line, a distance of approximately 14 miles. The construction will consist of drainage structures, grading and surfacing of the entire section. Collins Construction Co. of Austin has the contract and the work is expected to be completed by October 1960. Construction was scheduled to start last Tuesday, Nov. 10.

C. C. Stroud, senior resident engineer of the Texas Highway Department of San Angelo, explained that, except for a few short sections where traffic will be routed through construction, traffic will be routed on paved detours over the entire route.

Stroud pointed out that adequate barricades and warning signs will be prominently displayed, but warned motorists to be extremely cautious as the area will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.

Speed limit in the construction area will be 45 miles per hour except for crossing the Colorado River, where the speed limit will be cut to 30 miles per hour.

Highway Department officials asked cooperation of the public in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs and speed zones.

Mrs. Landers New Route 1 Carrier

Mrs. Marvin Landers will start her new duties as route 1 mail carrier Saturday morning. She will replace A. E. Bell, Jr., who recently transferred to route 2. J. T. Liles, substitute carrier, has been making the route 1 run since Bell transferred.

Mrs. Landers has served as clerk in the Bronte post office since June, 1956. From that date until May, 1957, she was classified as a substitute route carrier and temporary clerk. On May 7, 1957, she started working full time as a clerk, but was still classified as temporary. She received her appointment as a career clerk in February, 1958.

Mrs. Landers, the former Maurine Bell, is married to Marvin Landers and they have one daughter, Paula Janes, who is a first grader in the Bronte Schools.

It was pointed out that a member of the Bell family has been the regular route 1 carrier out of Bronte for 40 years, since 1919. Mrs. Landers' uncle, the late A. E. Bell, Sr., started in that year and carried the route for about four years. Then her father, B. A. Bell, who is now retired, was route 1 carrier for 35 years. When he transferred over to route 2, he was succeeded by Mrs. Landers' cousin, A. E. Bell, Jr., the present route 2 carrier.

Mrs. Louis Buckalew, substitute clerk, will take over Mrs. Landers' duties in the post office until a regular appointment is made.

Bronte and Robt Lee To Tangle on Gridiron

The Bronte Longhorns will go up against their traditional football rival, the Robert Lee Steers, here Friday night at 8 o'clock. By all the rules of football and season averages, Bronte should win this game by a healthy margin. However, these two bitter gridiron rivals sometimes do strange things, and many times the unexpected can be expected.

So far as season records go, Bronte has won nine games while Robert Lee has won one. In district play, the Longhorns have won all four of their contests,

while the Steers have been unable to win a game. Scorewise, the Longhorns have stacked up a total of 278 points to their opponents' 46, while the Steers of Robert Lee have made 89 points to their opponents' 190.

Bronte cinched a berth in bi-district playoffs last week when they defeated the Trent Gorillas 47-6. If the Longhorns lose to Robert Lee, they will be tied for the district championship with Loraine, provided the Bulldogs defeat Eldorado's Eagles this Friday. However, the Longhorns defeated Loraine, which would automatically make them the district representatives. The Longhorns will play the winner of the Wink-Rankin game, which will be played Friday night.

Extra Activities

In addition to the exciting football game, Friday night's schedule is full of special activities. The 1933 Longhorns football team, last Bronte team to go through the season undefeated, will be special guests at the game. The Football Sweetheart and Homecoming Queen will be crowned prior to the kickoff. Homecoming festivities will be held earlier in the day. OTHER GAMES

In other District 6-B games this Friday, Loraine plays at Eldorado and Trent plays at Hermleigh.

Benny Corley, Bronte's big tailback, moved up a notch in area scoring, as compiled by Abilene Reporter-News. He is in third place this week, moving ahead of last week's third place man. Corley has made a total of 117 points for the Longhorns this season. His record is exceeded only by Charles Lipsy of Cisco and Larry White of Knox City.

53 Accidents in District in October

Lt. W. M. Howell of the San Angelo Sub Station of the Texas Highway Patrol has released the Rural Traffic Accident Summary for October. Counties included in this report are Coke, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Kinney, Maverick, Rannels, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton and Tom Green.

The Highway Patrol in this area investigated a total of 53 accidents with the following breakdown: Property damage 33, Personal injury 18, and fatal accidents, 2. Lt. Howell reported a total property damage of \$49,375 with 24 persons injured and 2 killed. This is a decrease of 6 accidents and a decrease of 2 deaths for the same period of October 1958.

During October, patrolmen in the above counties made 527 arrests for the following violations: D. W. I. 9, Speeding 345, Improper Passing 9, Wrong Side of Road 13, Defective Equipment 40, and all other violations, 111.

Bronte Beats Trent, Wins District

Despite a 6-0 lead attained by the Trent Gorillas during the opening minutes of the game, the Bronte Longhorns roared back to defeat the Trent eleven 47-6 and win the District B title in a game last Friday night. The contest was played at Trent and the weather was bitter cold. In spite of the unfavorable temperatures, a large delegation of Bronte fans followed the Longhorns to the game.

1st Quarter

Bronte had to kickoff and the ball went out on the 35 where Trent elected to put it in play. The Gorillas failed to net yardage on the next three plays and punted to the Bronte 40 yard line where Mickey Black took the ball and ran back to the 49 yard line.

Black made a nice 20 yard run on the next play, but a 5 yard penalty was called against the

Longhorns. Black then picked up 5, and on the next play Trent recovered a Bronte fumble.

Trent was destined to make its only bid of the evening during the next few minutes after recovering this fumble. They were unable to make the necessary yardage for a 1st down, and kicked, but the cold hands of the Longhorns again fumbled the ball and Trent recovered. Urban Bright picked up a yard, then Johnny Heatly carried for 4 and Adry Wheeler added 4 more. This brought up a 4th down, but the Gorillas decided to run for the needed yards. They made sufficient yardage for a 1st down on the 29.

Heatly made 5 and Don Jones picked up 4 more. Johnny Swinney tried a quarterback sneak, giving the Gorillas a 1st down on the 11. Bronte was penalized 5 yards, putting the ball on up to

ward the goal line. Four plays later Heatly went over the double stripe to draw first blood of the contest. Extra point try failed, leaving the Gorillas ahead 6-0.

Trent's kickoff was taken by Reyes Olivas on the 16 and returned to the 34. Benny Corley on 2 plays made 8 and 11 to give the Longhorns a 1st on the Gorilla 47. Dee Arrott made 14 for another 1st down on the 33. Corley lost 2, then gained 3. Arrott tossed a pass intended for M. Black, but it was incomplete. Arrott then made a 31 yard run for a 1st and goal to go on the 1 yard line. The 1st quarter ended with this play.

2nd Quarter

On the first play of the period, Corley carried the ball over for a TD. Lanny Denman added an extra point with his kick, to place the Longhorns out in front 7-6.

Corley kicked off to the 10 and Heatly carried the ball out to the 30. An incomplete pass, a gain of 1, and a loss of 9 on 3 tries by Heatly brought up 4th, so Trent punted. Dee Arrott was ready for it, took it on the 44 and ran all the way back to the Gorilla 15. Corley added better than 10 for a 1st on the 4 yard line. Arrott went over on the next play. Denman kicked the extra point and the score was 14-6.

Corley's kick went to the 13 and was carried out to the 23. Don Jones made short yardage and Heatly picked up 14 yards for a 1st on the 38. The next series netted only 1 yard gained and Trent punted to the 39. Corley made an even 10 for a 1st on the 40. On the next play the Longhorns fumbled again and Trent took over. Jones lost 6 and Heatly made 16 on 2 tries for a 1st down on the 34. Swinney's pass was intercepted by Douglas Rogers and Bronte lined up on the 45 with 1st and 10 to go. Dee Arrott tossed a pass and Jerry McCutchen sacked it for a 30 yard gain and a 1st down on the 15 yard line. Corley made 4 and then Arrott went the rest of the way for the TD. A miscue from center to the holder made Denman's try for point no good. Score: 20-6.

Minutes after Corley's kickoff, Kenneth McCutchen intercepted a Trent pass to give the Longhorns possession on the 46 yard line. On the 1st play of the series, Eddie Spiller tossed a pass to Mickey Black who went all the way for another counter.

Denman's kick was good and Bronte extended its lead to 27-6. Trent made no run back on Corley's kick to the 30. On the first play of the series Neil Black caught a Trent fumble in the air, and ran with it for 5 yards, to end the first half.

3rd Quarter

Trent's kickoff was short and was covered by Jerry McCutchen on the 44. Six plays later, with Corley and Arrott alternating on the carrying chores, Corley went across from the 9 for a touch down. Extra point try failed, giving the Longhorns a 33-6 lead.

Kenneth McCutchen kicked off to the 10 and Jones ran it out to the 28. Trent made a total of 7 yards in three plays, and Jones punted to the 45 where M. Black took it and gained a couple of yards. Corley threw a pass to J. McCutchen which gave Bronte a 1st down on the 26. Trent was penalized 15 yards at this point, placing the ball on the 11. Arrott ran for 5, then tossed a pass to K. McCutchen for 5 more and a 1st down on the 1. Corley carried it over the stripe and Denman's kick was good. Bronte was out in front 40-6.

McCutchen's kick off went to the 5 yard line where Swinney was able to stop it but got no run back. Jones and Wheeler in 3 plays moved the ball out to the 18 for a Trent 1st down. Then to end the quarter Heatly made an even 10 for another 1st on the 28.

4th Quarter

Trent was on the move and made 3 first downs before Bob Wrinkle recovered a fumble on the 18 yard line and took possession of the ball. On the first play of the series Wrinkle switched to the backfield from his guard play Corley lost yardage and completed a pass to Arrott good for 47 yards and a 1st down on the 26 yard line. On the next position and made 9 yards. Corley then a pass from Arrott intended for Mike Luttrell was knocked down. A sensational run by Neil Black after taking a lateral, took the ball across the double stripe on the next play, and Denman booted the ball between the posts to give the Longhorns a 47-6 lead.

Kenneth McCutchen kicked off to the 43 and Trent was able to make a first down before the final whistle blew.

The Longhorns tried out some new plays during this tilt with the Trent Gorillas. Part of them worked well, but some looked as though they needed more practice.

Deer and Duck Seasons Set To Begin Soon

AUSTIN, Nov. 10 — Two major hunting seasons will get under way in Texas within the next ten days, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The duck hunting season will open noon, November 13. The bag limit will be four ducks daily, but not more than one can be a canvasback or redhead. The duck inventory in Texas at the present time is very good, according to waterfowl biologists, who have been making surveys throughout the State. Many of the ducks are young ones, however, indicating the late hatch in the nesting grounds.

Goose season already is underway, having opened at sunrise, October 26. The duck season will end January 1, and the goose season will end January 8.

Waterfowl hunters are required to have a \$3 Federal duck stamp, which can be bought at the Post Office.

The white-tailed deer season will open in most counties in Texas November 16. The mule deer season will open December 1 west of the Pecos. There will be deer seasons in many other counties in Texas under regulatory control. It is advised that you check with your local game warden on these areas.

The basic bag limit is on two bucks. However, doe shooting will be permitted in a number of Texas counties again this year, which will permit hunters to take either bucks or doe.
