Council Calls Election On Sewer Bond Issue

the city council to issue \$85,000 in revenue bonds, to mature in not less than 30 years and to bear interest not exceeding 6 per cent. The second proposition would authorize the council to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$50,000, payable over a period of 30 years and bearing interest not exceeding 6 per cent. The No. 1 proposition specifies that the \$85,-000 bonds would be retired only from revenue earned by the sewer system. The No. 2 proposition authorizes the city council to levy a tax to pay it off.

At previous meeting of the council to discuss the sewer bond vote, a bond issue of \$130,000 was discussed, but the group decided to increase the amount to \$135,000 to insure having sufficient funds to build the proposed system, if approved by the voters.


