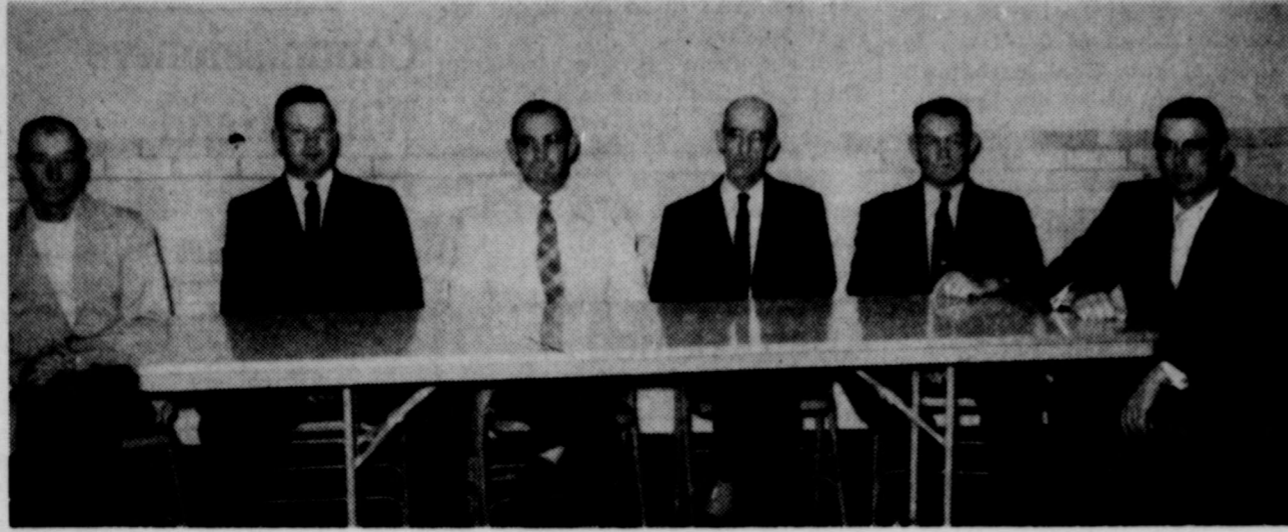

## AD-LIB-BEN

We have been told this week that many people in Bronte are going to vote against the sewer system bond because they think that as soon as the job is completed the city council will pass an ordinance requiring everybody who can be served to tie on to the sewer.

Of course, we cannot predict what future city councils of Bronte would do concerning this matter, but they are elected by you, so it should be fairly simple to control.

We have talked with present council members, and they are against compulsory sewer service. They have faith enough in the service they hope to provide to believe that enough Bronte residents would voluntarily tie on to make the system a paying proposition.

Competition has developed in both city and school trustee elections. We were glad to see it, for opposition in any kind of elective office is a healthy situation. When the voters have no choice there is little interest in local politics; and no interest on the part of the people can only lead to unhealthy conditions in the offices concerned.

This is Public School Week. School officials have invited patrons and others to visit the school during this week, and if you haven't already done so, go by and visit your child's class today or tomorrow.

The dinner, planned by the local Lions Club and Masonic Lodge, in observance of Public School Week, was called off Tuesday night because of bad weather. It will be held at a later date, although one has not yet been set.

## Icy Glaze Covers Area First of This Week

Another hard freeze gripped the Bronte area Tuesday night but a warming trend was indicated for today. Freezing mist Monday followed the cold front which entered the area Sunday. An icy glaze covered the area Monday and by early Tuesday, the mercury had dropped to the low 20s.

Bronte schools were dismissed Tuesday due to the icy condition of school bus routes but resumed classes Wednesday morning.

Hazardous driving conditions slowed traffic Tuesday morning to a snail's pace, but by early afternoon most of the ice on highways and streets had melted. Weather forecasters reported that the temperature rose to near 32 Tuesday afternoon.

No serious wrecks had been reported by Wednesday and no serious falls have occurred, though several persons have slipped on

the icy glaze. Bronte Hospital reported that no one had been admitted for treatment because of injuries.

Forecast called for slightly warmer temperatures Wednesday, with the mercury rising to 34 degrees. Weathermen said the unseasonable weather of this week was caused by collision of warm air and cold air, the cold mass being pushed in by a high pressure area in the Rocky Mountain area and the warm air being pushed in from the Gulf by a low located east of here.

## Bob Wilson Put On Ballot for School Trustee

A petition requesting that Bob Wilson's name be placed on the ballot for school trustee was filed with the county judge this week. The petition was signed by five qualified voters.

Wilson's candidacy leaves the school trustee race with four candidates for the three vacancies. Other candidates, all placed in nomination by petition, are Conda Richards, Joe Rawlings and Marvin Landers. Both Rawlings and Richards are serving on the board now. L. F. McCutchen, the other trustee whose term expires this year, did not seek re-election.

Date set for the school trustee election is Saturday, April 2, at the Bronte city hall and at Tennyson. Deadline for filing was Wednesday, March 2. D. K. Glenn will be election judge for the voting box in Bronte.

## Five Candidates On Ballot for Councilman

The coming city election became more interesting this week when another candidate's name was placed on the ballot for city councilman.

A petition signed by five local residents requested that Cecil Kemp's name be placed in nomination.

Others who had previously filed for the city jobs were H. A. Springer, Matthew Caperton, Charlie Boecking and C. E. Bruton. Bruton and Springer are presently serving on the council and are seeking re-election.

Incumbent J. A. Stephenson is opposed by Dr. John R. Harris for mayor of Bronte.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 5, at the city hall. Candidates have until Saturday, March 5, to file for the city offices.

## Annual Red Cross Drive Now Underway; Workers Needed

The annual Red Cross drive started all over the United States on March 1. Cecil Kemp has been named chairman of the fund campaign for Coke County. He said some volunteers have been secured to work on the drive, but more are badly needed. Coke County's quota for this year is \$932.

H. A. Springer, chairman of the Coke County Chapter of the Red Cross, said that he is hopeful the drive can get underway with full momentum as soon as the weather clears.

"The bad weather slowed us down right here at the start," he said, "but we expect to make it up in the next week or two."

The Red Cross, which exists under charter of the U. S. Congress, is charged with assisting both the civilian and military population in times of disaster. Representatives of the organization are always among the first to arrive when disaster strikes. During the 1954 flood many Bronte families received aid from the Red Cross.

## Much Interest In Sewer Bond

Much interest in the coming sewer bond election has been in evidence here this week. Both pro and con groups can be found most any time discussing the question.

Last week the city council called the sewer bond election, with two propositions to be decided by voters on March 19. The propositions give voters a chance to vote for or against the issuance of \$85,000 in revenue bonds and \$50,000 in general obligation bonds for the purpose of building a sewer system in Bronte. A legal notice giving complete details of the election can be found on another page of this newspaper.

Several persons who have discussed the matter with The Enterprise publisher say they need a lot of questions answered before they will be for voting the sewer system bonds.

Complaints have been heard on the lines not being available to some local residents, and others have expressed themselves as wanting some assurance they will not be forced to tie on, once the system is built. Still others have voiced the opinion that the disposal plant should be further away from town than the site now called for in the plans.

Members of Bronte's city council have indicated they are in favor of holding mass meetings, at which the public will be invited to ask questions on the matter.

The council has a regular meeting Friday night and members are expecting to try to work out some of the details and make plans for presenting the question to voters of Bronte.

Jack Brown, who is handling the bonds for the city, provided they are voted, has told the council on two occasions that he believes the bonds, both revenue and general obligation, can be retired from revenue from the sewer system. However, he urged them to set up the bond issue partly as revenue bonds and partly as tax bonds, so they will have the authority to levy a tax if necessary. Tax money can be spent only to retire the general obligation bonds, as the election order provides that tax money cannot be used to retire the \$85,000 revenue bond. He figured that the general obligations could be retired with a 35 cent tax levy with present valuations, if the entire \$50,000 had to be paid from taxes.

Brown told the council that with 300 users, the city should be able to operate the sewer system, pay off the revenue bond payments, and have enough money left to take care of the general obligation bonds. He said that 300 users would contribute in excess of \$10,000 a year into the sewer revenue fund. He said the \$2.50 proposed as the monthly charge for regular users and a heavier charge for larger users should bring the revenue up to better than \$10,000.

Brown's schedule of payments set the city's obligation at \$6750 the first two years and at \$8770 for the next 28 years. He purposefully set the payments low the first two years, so the city's obligation would be low during the time of getting the system in operation. Also, he said, the city could not expect a maximum number of users during this two-year period. "After two years, you'll have just about everybody tied on who is going to use the sewer facilities," he said.

The council named Noah Pruitt, Sr. presiding judge for the election with Mrs. Olive Keeney to serve as assistant judge, and Mrs. Robert Forman and Mrs. Marvin Corley, clerks. The election will be held at the city hall.

### RECEIVES BURNS

## Funeral Held for Gussie L. Thomas, Accident Victim

Tennyson and Bronte communities were shocked Saturday by the death of Gussie Lee Thomas, 18 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Thomas of Tennyson. The youth was killed when a truck in which he was riding collided with a Santa Fe freight train at the crossing at View, between here and Abilene.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Kickapoo Baptist Church, with the Rev. W. E. Chandler, former Tennyson pastor, and Rev. R. W. Blackmon, Kickapoo pastor, in charge of the services.

Burial was in Fairview cemetery here under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Chester Roy Derrick, Benny Corley, Robert Feil, Leon McCarty, Russell Brown, James Copeland, Billy Thomas and Howard Wood.

Young Thomas was killed Saturday when the truck in which he was riding with Clarence G. Kempner, 39, of San Angelo collided with the train. Both men were killed instantly. The truck belonged to The Rich Plan, a frozen foods firm of San Angelo, for whom both Thomas and Kempner worked. They were delivering a load of frozen foods to Abilene when the accident occurred. The impact demolished the truck and scattered packages of frozen foods for about 100 feet beside the train.

Kempner and Thomas were victims No. 10 and 11 to be killed at the View crossing. An overpass is presently under construction to carry traffic over the railroad crossing. A bend in the highway has always obstructed the view up and down the railroad and the construction job now in progress adds to the difficulty in seeing approaching trains.

Thomas is a former student of Bronte school. He did not return to classes last fall, as he had secured a good job with the San Angelo food firm. Members of the junior class, of which he was a member, attended the funeral in a group.

Survivors include his parents; three brothers, William J. and Elmer S. of Tennyson, and Pvt. Arthur J. Thomas, serving with the Army in France; and two grandmothers, Mrs. Will McDonald of Stanton and Mrs. Susie Thomas of San Angelo. Pvt. Arthur J. Thomas arrived from France Wednesday morning for the funeral rites.

## Will Pay Snake Bounty Only To Coke Residents

(From Robert Lee Observer)

Coke County will continue to pay a 50-cent bounty on rattlesnakes this year, but only residents of the county are eligible to collect the bounty money.

County Commissioners in session Tuesday amended their previous resolution to limit the payment to persons living in the county. County Clerk J. I. Tinkler, whose office pays off the bounty claims, advised the Commissioners Court that outsiders had requested snake payments, but had been turned down.

Hence, the bounty will be paid only for rattlers killed within Coke County and to persons who are also county residents.

Snake killing has been brisk this winter, 954 rattler bounties having been paid in January and 980 during February.

C. E. Calder is accounting for about one-half the snakes killed, and continues his practice of driving them out of their dens by use of gasoline. He collected the 50c bounty on 592 snakes during January and 431 in February.

Others who brought in quite a number of rattles were Mack Eubanks of Bronte with 98, Monte Wilkes, Silver, 128 and Bunyan Millican, Silver, 146.

## Funeral Rites Held Here For Arthur Hayley

Death has come to Arthur Hayley, 78, early day Coke County resident, who returned to spend the last few years of his life here. His passing occurred at 5 o'clock the morning of Feb. 27 at his home in the north part of Robert Lee.

He had been in failing health for some time and a few weeks ago underwent major surgery in a San Angelo hospital. Later he was transferred to Coke County Memorial Hospital here and the last 11 days had been cared for by his wife at their home.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Robert Lee Baptist with the pastor, Rev. Robin Guess officiating, assisted by Rev. Travis McNair, Methodist minister. Burial was in Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Cliff Funeral Home.

Arthur E. Hayley was born Aug. 12, 1881, in Coleman County, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hayley. As a boy he lived in Abilene, Hayrick, and Robert Lee. He was engaged in stock farming for a time but his main life's work was carpentry.

He had been living at Sweetwater and Corpus Christi when he came to Bronte in 1954 and then to Robert Lee early in 1955. He was employed by Fred Roe and Palmer Leeper for some time.

He married Mrs. Eva Murtishaw on May 12, 1955. They had known each other from childhood, as their parents were neighbors in Abilene, Hayrick and in Robert Lee. Their companionship after their marriage was happy for both.

Arthur was a good man, friendly and neighborly. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Surviving are three sons, T. A. Hayley of Corpus Christi, Vance Hayley of Houston, and Arnold Hayley of Inglewood, Calif.; also four stepchildren, Mrs. Ardie Gibbins of Clyde, Emory Hughes of East Point, Ga., A. V. Hughes and Mrs. Ell Hatley of Robert Lee.

He is also survived by six sisters, Mrs. Ada Henderson of Snyder, Mrs. Walker Huddleston of Mrs. L. Dunlap and Mrs. J. M. Jennings of Sweetwater, Mrs. Carl Mayer of Van Buren, Ark., and Mrs. K. L. Daugherty of Glenside, Pa.; and three brothers, I. E. Hayley of Snyder, E. G. Hayley of Waco and W. C. Hayley of Sweetwater.

A large group of kinfolds and friends came for the funeral rites on Sunday. Present were the sons from Corpus Christi and Houston, his brothers from Snyder and Sweetwater, and three sisters, Mrs. Huddleston, Mrs. Dunlap and Mrs. Jennings.

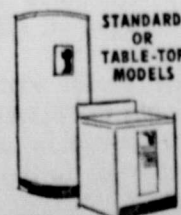

The RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Bronte, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose herein-after mentioned; therefore

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

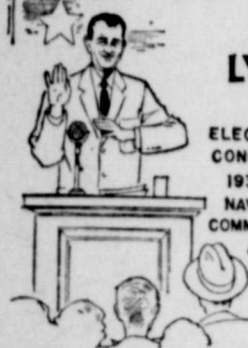

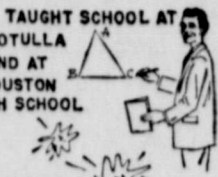

He was also a member of the Levelland Masonic Lodge and held the Worshipful Masters office in 1928.
