Ballots have been printed for both the school trustee and city elections, which will be held the first week in April. Persons wish; ing to vote absentee may do so until three days before each elec-

The city election is set for Tuesday, April 5, while the school trustee voting will take place Saturday, April 2. Three trustees are to be elected from a slate of four candidates. In the city voting three councilmen will be selected from a field of six candidates.

Absentee voters in the school election should go to the county clerk's office in Robert Lee, or, if unable to do so, may write that office requesting that a ballot be mailed to them. The same procedure may be followed in the cit;. election, except the place is Bronte city hall.

Candidates for school trustee are Conda Richards, Bob Wilson, Joe Rawlings and Marvin Landers.




