## Insect School for Area Farmers Begins Jan. 6 at Nazareth School

An Entomology short course for Adult Farmers will be held January 6-19-27 under the sponsorship of the Nazareth High School, Vocational Agricultural Department of first near Fort Worth the merit, according to Mr. J. M. Slavik, Superintendent and Mr. Emerson Brister, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the Vocational Agriculture Department of Nazareth High School.

Mr. H. A. Turney, Entomology specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Entomology at Texas A & M College, will be the instructor in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Turney holds a Master's Degree in Entomology. He worked three years with the Department of Arkansas in their cotton scouting program. He also worked two years as survey entomologist for the state of Texas in cooperation with the Texas Extension service.

"Many Entomology short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Turney and all have proven to be very helpful in helping to solve

farm insect problems," according to Mr. Walter Labay, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult short courses are made through Mr. Walter Labay's office.

The short course at Nazareth is scheduled to begin January 6 at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building. Other meetings in this series will be held January 19 and January 27. Two additional meetings will be called.

During the dates the short course is in progress Mr. Turney will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction according to Emerson Brister.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Mr. J. M. Slavik, or the teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Emerson Brister. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Entomology short course certificates are to be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Turney states that these sessions will be adjusted to the problems that the farmers are faced with in their community. He will discuss these problems and the insect or insects that might be causing the damage, and the insecticides needed to do the job. He will also discuss the timing and method of applying insecticides to get the best results. The course will be as practicable and simple as possible. Time will be allowed each meeting for any questions that may arise.

## Leap Year 1960 Opens New Decade

Well, here comes another year. There's not much you can do about it, any more than you can stop the inexorable march of your birthdays.

This coming year is leap year. Since some of our readers may be potential students of cosmology, we offer this information: Leap year is not, as some may suppose, simply a time when days may ethically progress to begin. Instead it means we must add a day occasionally to keep our calendar in time with the seasons. Every twenty-nine and a half days the moon is full. This time came to be known as a month. Since each season recurred every 12 months, then 12 months was taken to be a year. But it wasn't exact and after some revisions it came about that January would eventually occur during the summer if something wasn't done. So in 45 B.C. Julius Caesar proclaimed following the celestial studies of his astronomer, that each year contained 365 days and months were adjusted accordingly. Caesar was slightly wrong and over the centuries this error was appreciable. The accumulated error of Caesar's calendar was removed by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582 by taking eleven days out of that year. He then instituted the leap year rule which has remained with us ever since.

The leap year rule is as follows: Those years whose date numbers are exactly divisible by 4 are leap years, unless they are also exactly divisible by 100. In such cases they are not leap years unless they are exactly divisible by 400. Thus the year 1900 was not a leap year, but the year 2000 will be.

The additional day is traditionally added to February, giving it 29 days instead of 28. There have been many people wanting to change our calendar, but it has pretty well stood the test of time.
