All three directors of the Coke County Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District were unanimously re-elected to two year terms in a special election Tuesday. Elected to serve another term were J. A. Percifull, Austin Sandusky and Preston Davis. Each of the three received 42 votes. There were no write-ins.

The election was held at Bronte Feed & Supply, with Hurlin Lee serving as election judge. He was assisted by Noah Pruitt, Sr., Mrs. Marvin Corley and Mrs. Otis Smith.

The board of directors of the water district expects to be busy during the next several months getting machinery rolling in construction of a million dollar flood control project on the Kickapoo Creeks in the area north of Bronte. Plans call for beginning of the work at an early date. Other officers of the district are F. S. Higinbotham and D. K. Glenn.

Funeral Today For R. L. James

Funeral services for R. L. James, 39, of Christoval will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday (today) in Johnson's Chapel in San Angelo. The Rev. Roy Woldof, Methodist minister from Runge, will officiate and burial will be in Christoval cemetery.

Mr. James died at his home Tuesday night. His death was attributed to a heart attack.

He was born December 25, 1921 in Ballinger. A Christoval resident for 15 years, he owned the R. L. James General Earth Moving and Land Clearing Co. He married Eunice Floyd January 2, 1947.

Diphtheria Crisis Past; 1 Positive Case Here

Dr. John R. Harris said Wednesday that he believes the crisis in the diphtheria scare in this area is past. Only one case here has been definitely diagnosed as diphtheria, the doctor said.

"We have had many suspects,"

Dr. Harris said, "but only one case that has been diagnosed as diphtheria. Therefore I feel that the crisis is over."

The local doctor also complimented local residents because of the calm manner in which they reacted to the situation. "I was very proud of the fact that there was no panic here," he said.

Hundreds of diphtheria shots have been given at the local hospital and clinic. Dr. Harris said that anyone who wants information concerning shots should call the hospital or clinic as a definite policy concerning them has been established.

A shipment of vaccine was received the first of this week after the Bronte Hospital's supply was exhausted because of the great number of persons taking shots.

3 Inch Rain Helps Farms And Ranches

What old timers are calling "the finest rains in a long time" fell over this area the latter part of last week. About three inches of moisture was received in this area.

The rain fell on top of what was already considered a good underground season, as the county and surrounding territory have been receiving moisture at frequent intervals during the fall.

Farmers say that one has to dig pretty deep now to find dry dirt and that most fields are still too wet to work.

In addition to supplying a good underground season, the latest rain will help small grains and pasture land.

Possibly the only persons in this area who objected to the rains last week were workers for Collins Construction Co. who are working on the new highway through town. They had just completed smoothing out and packing a section of the road, including the part in town, when the rain started. Traffic soon wore out chug holes in the caliche base and the work had to be done over this week.

Veterans of World War I will organize a Coke County barracks at a meeting set for Thursday night of this week at 7:00 o'clock at the court house in Robert Lee.

Roger Q. Evans of Baird, commander of the Texas department, will be present and explain the purposes and aims of the national organization of veterans of 1917-18.

The WWI group does not compete or take the place of other veterans societies, and does not interfere with memberships in The American Legion or Veterans of Foreign Wars.

In addition to looking after the welfare of World War I veterans and their widows, the organization sponsors an important program against communism and urges more emphasis on teaching patriotism in our public schools.

Commander Evans is serving his second term as department commander, and has had wide experience in veterans affairs and politics. A former member of the state legislature, he was a candidate for governor a few years ago.

Films will be shown at the Thursday night meeting and officers are to be elected for the new Coke County barracks. World War I veterans and their wives from all over the county are invited.

Texas had 212 local WWI barracks last year with 8,300 members. A goal of 15,000 members has been set for 1961.

Leon Thomas of Ballinger, membership co-chairman for the 21st district, has been in the county this week acquainting WWI veterans with the state and national organization.

Highway Dept. To Spend \$107,000 In Coke During '61

The Texas Highway Commission this week approved the expenditure of \$107,000 for highway safety and betterment in Coke County during 1961, according to District Highway Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo.

He said a total of 11.6 highway miles in the county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of R. N. Jennings, Sr. Maintenance Engineer, and G. G. Lackey, Sr. Resident Engineer, both of San Angelo.

This work is part of two state-wide "highway housekeeping" programs revealed today by the Texas Highway Department. Totaling \$40 million, the programs are keyed to safety features and proper upkeep of the State's highway systems.

The two safety-and-betterment programs will be evenly divided financially throughout the State with \$20 million to be spent on the U. S. and State Highway System and \$20 million earmarked for the Farm- and Ranch-to-Market Road System.

Snell said a total of 275.8 miles in this highway district would be involved at a total cost of \$1,162,000.

The following projects will take place in Coke County:

U. S. 87, from Sterling County line to Tom Green County line, a distance of approximately 4.6 miles, seal coat.

State 208, 1.2, 5.5, 6.8 & 7.2 miles south of Robert Lee, approximate length 0.5 mi., construct 2 bridges and approaches, and widen 2 bridges and approaches.

F. M. 2059, from FM 1672 in Silver, southwest 6.5 miles, seal coat.

AN ORDINANCE FOR HOUSE SEWERS

For BRONTE, TEXAS
(A) DEFINITION OF BUILDING OR HOUSE SEWER:

Building or House Sewer: That part of the horizontal pipe which begins outside of the wall of a building and connects the "House Drain" with the main public sewer, septic tank, or other disposal terminal.

(B) SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS:

1. Rain Water Leaders: Roof leaders, surface drains, or ground water drains shall not be connected to the sanitary sewer.

2. Independent System: Each house sewer and drainage system shall be independent of that of any other building except as provided below:

Where one building stands in the rear of another building located on an interior lot, the house sewer from the front building may be extended to the rear building and the whole considered as one house sewer.

3. Use of Public Sewer Required: Where a public sewer is accessible in a street or alley to a building or premises abutting thereon the liquid wastes from any plumbing system in said building shall discharge into the public sewer unless otherwise authorized by the governing body.

4. Connection to the Main Public Sewer: Before any connection is made to a public sewer, an approved permit for such connection must be obtained from the governing body or its designated representative. Each connection shall be made at the "Y" designated for that property. The only exception shall be where the designated "Y" is not located within three feet of the point of measurement furnished by the local governing body. Any connection not made at the designated "Y" in the main sewer shall be made under the direct supervision of the Sewer Inspector.

A "Y" or "T" fitting shall be installed near the building foundation to provide for cleanout purposes.

(C) SUPERVISION:
Sewer Inspector: The Sewer Inspector shall be appointed pursuant to the laws of the city and state and shall under the direction of the governing elective officers of the Municipality, supervise all house sewer connections and excavations for the purpose of installing or repairing the same.

(D) SPECIFICATIONS:
1. Material: All house sewers shall be constructed of either Vitrified Clay Sewer Pipe meeting the A.S.T.M. Standard Specifications for Clay Sewer Pipe (Designation C-13 or C-261) or Extra Heavy Cast Iron Soil Pipe meeting A.S.T.M. Standard Specifications for Cast Iron Soil Pipe and Fittings (Designation A-74).

2. Joints and connections:
(A) Vitrified Clay Sewer Pipe shall be fitted with factory made Resilient Compression Joints meeting the A.S.T.M. "Specifications for Vitrified Clay Pipe Joints Having Resilient Properties" (Designation C-425).

Before joining the pipe in the trench, the bell and spigot surfaces shall be wiped free of dirt or other foreign matter. A lub-

ricant or sealer as recommended by the Pipe Manufacturer shall be applied to the bell and spigot mating surfaces just before they are joined together.

The top or one side of the spigot end shall be positioned into the bell end of the pipe previously laid and shall then be shoved home to compress the joint and to assure a tight fit between the interfaces. Special Compression Adaptors or Field Unions shall be used where connections are made to street sewers, building drains, cut pipe, or to pipe lines already in place.

(B) Joints for Extra Heavy Cast Iron Soil Pipe shall be made by inserting a roll of hemp or jute and thoroughly caulking it into place and then following with pure molten lead well caulked, not less than one inch deep. No paint, varnish or putty will be allowed in the joints until they have been tested.

3. Size of House Sewer: No house sewer shall be less than four inches in diameter. No building or house sewer for a commercial building or a multiple dwelling shall be less than six inches in diameter.

4. Grades for House Sewers: Unless otherwise authorized all house sewers shall have a grade of not less than one-eighth (1/8) inch per foot. A grade of one-fourth (1/4) inch per foot shall be used wherever practical.

5. Trenching and Backfilling:

All excavations shall be open trench work unless otherwise authorized by the Sewer Inspector. The foundation in the trench shall be formed to prevent any subsequent settlement of the pipes. If the foundation is good, firm earth, the earth shall be pared or molded to give a full support to the lower quadrant of each pipe. Bell holes shall be dug. Where the floor of the trench is of hard or rocky material, the trench shall be excavated to four inches below grade and brought back to the proper grade with fine gravel, coarse sand or similar material so as to provide a firm foundation and uniform support for the house sewer line. Backfilling shall be placed in layers and solidly tamped or packed up to two feet above the pipe. Backfilling shall not be done until final inspection is made by the Sewer Inspector.

6. Use of Old House Sewers: Old house sewers or portions thereof may be approved for use by the Sewer Inspector. The Sewer Inspector may request that the old sewer be excavated for the purpose of facilitating inspection. No old cesspool or septic tank shall be connected to any portion of a house sewer that is also connected to the public sewer.

(E) INSPECTION:
Each and every part of the house sewer shall be inspected and approved by the Sewer Inspector before being concealed or back-filled.
