Burial was in the Old Runnels Cemetery near Ballinger under the direction of Clift Funeral Home. Rev. L. L. Vinson, Bronte, nephew of Mr. Vinson, and Rev. Billy F. Crews, pastor of 7th Street Baptist Church in Ballinger, officiated at the services.

A retired farmer, Mr. Vinson was born May 10, 1890 in Tennessee and attended school at Levi, Texas. He moved to Runnels County at the age of 16 and to Coke County in 1931, and had been a resident here until his death. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Bronte.

Bitter Cold Wave Hits Area, School Dismissed

The year's worst cold spell swept into West Texas Tuesday about noon, dropping temperatures to below 20 degrees Tuesday night.

Mist falling Tuesday afternoon froze on cars and trees, but high-

ways in the Bronte vicinity remained dry until Wednesday morning. Sleet fell Wednesday, almost covering the ground and causing roads and sidewalks to become slippery. No accidents had been reported in this area up to noon

Wednesday, but law enforcement officers warned that driving conditions would be hazardous, particularly after night.

Bronte School was dismissed at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday due to the weather conditions and Supt. C. B. Barbee announced that there will be no school today, Thursday. Present plans are to have school Friday. In case weather conditions warrant turning out school on Friday, it will be announced over TV stations in San Angelo and Abilene and radio stations in San Angelo and Ballinger, Barbee said.

The cold front blew in following a slow warm rain early Tuesday.

Forecast called for another hard freeze Wednesday night with a low of 20 predicted for this area.

The lung ailment which has been bothering Dr. Harris for the past few weeks seems to be clearing up satisfactorily. His present critical condition has been diagnosed as pancreatitis.

Dr. Dean Adams, who was formerly associated with Dr. Harris here, arrived in Bronte Monday morning to take charge of the local practice. He is on leave from the Navy and will be here at least 30 days. Mrs. Adams and their little daughter, Kim, are with him. They are living in the former Harris residence.

Cowley Rites Held At Robert Lee

Funeral services were held for Lem Emmett Cowley, 75, resident of Coke County for 54 years, at the Baptist Church at 2 p. m. Saturday under the direction of Cliff Funeral Home. Officiating were Rev. Taylor Henley, San Angelo and Rev. Robin Guess of Robert Lee. Interment was at Valley View Cemetery.

Mr. Cowley died Thursday afternoon at Coke County Memorial Hospital two hours after being admitted for a sudden illness. He had been in failing health for several years.

He was born December 25, 1885, in Atascosa County to the late Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Cowley. He moved to Coke County in the Valley View Community in 1907 after attending schools in Atascosa County.

Mr. Cowley was married to the former Miss Lillie Jewell Casey Jan. 2, 1910 in Valley View.

He farmed until he retired in Ap-

ril of 1958. He served as trustee on the Valley View school board from 1918 until Valley View consolidated with Robert Lee schools in 1931, and then he served on that school board until 1944. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Mr. Cowley was known for his humor and enthusiastic interest in baseball; and especially, his support of the Robert Lee Rabbit Twisters and the San Angelo Colts.

Mr. Ferrell came to Robert Lee in 1950 to operate the Adams Abstract Company which he was leasing at the time of his death. He served the City of Robert Lee as Mayor from May of 1952 until May of 1956.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, a Mason, worthy patron of the Order of the Eastern Star and a past president of the Board of Community Development.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

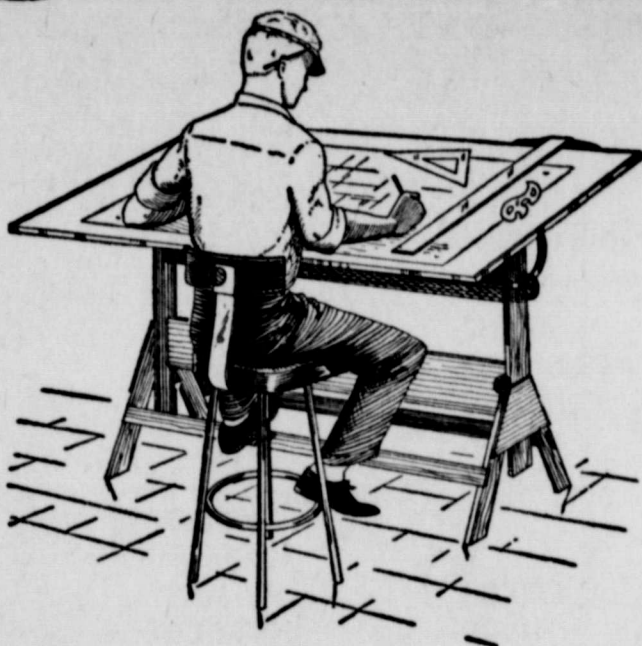
