



**CHURCH HISTORY** 


At this time in the History of the Jewish nation, when Greek skepticism was holding sway, both Jews and Gentiles alike were in need of a Saviour. In Jesus of Nazareth was fulfilled all that noblest and most spiritual in the aspirations of Jews and Gentiles. Even though in coming, He fulfilled the prophesy of the Old Testament, yet was rejected, tried, and crucified. After the resurrection He gave to His apostles the Great Commission and ascended into heaven, having fulfilled His mission.

On Pentecost, the first disciples with their multitudes of converts, were the original or Jersualem church. Even after Pentecost the great body of believers in Jersusalem had for some time very little organization. It is said that they all were of one heart and one soul, and had all things common. Day by day they continued steadfastly in the apostles doctrine and n the breaking of bread.

In a world filled with systems of philosphy and religion, and in a time of intellectual activity, such as was the beginning of the Christian era, it could not but be expected that Christianity would draw its converts from two grand sources, Judaism and Paganism. It would have been strange indeed if trouble had not arisen, when the two groups, each antagonistic toward the other, were united in a new system. Such an antagonism, having once entered the realm of Christian thought, naturally awakened intellectual activity, and led finally to the accurate definition of Christian doctrine according to the categories of the Greek philosphy. A very able and alert Congressnan from Houston, Texas, is dong some probing in one governnent department that could turn ip pay dirt. I refer to Honorable Albert Thomas, who is Chairman of an Appropriations Subcomnittee. In a recent investigation was revealed that the General Services Administration had a tockpile of strategic materials orth some 8 billions of dollars. These stockpiles have been justified in the past on the grounds of "national defense". They were supposed to include highly strategic materials, including strategic minerals and metals. Because of the "defense" brand, the whole matter was highly hush, hush. A few years ago, as Chairman of the Mines and Mining Subcommittee of the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, I moved for a omplete investigation of these activities concerning minerals and metals: the reason being that many mining operations in this country were faced with bankuptcy because of the high cost of production here, as compared with the low cost of production in many foreign countries. Efforts to stabiize the domestic minerals operaions were being thwarted on the rgument that it was not fair to ubsidize mining activities if the oducts could be purchased for a esser price from foreign sources This argument is excellent from an economic standpoint, looking only at the dollars and cents in volved on a limited number of transactions. However, a look a the entire picture would reveal that this country needs and must have a strong minerals industry not only for the purposes of national defense, but for the pro-

indispensable in the maintenance could give me the country of ori- much money to be tied up in such of a proper national defense, the danger of a foreign source of supply being cut off, in the event of war, standing by itself, alone, justifies the proper development of sources of such strategic raw materials in this country. Some thought that the building of an dequate stockpile would dispense with the necessity of developing our own resources of these mater als. To me, it is much more im portant to develop an industry in your own country to provide the needs of the people, than to permit a segment of the economy to tie on the vine simply because the material can be purchased from loreign sources. 
