The Amarillo Daily News is commended for its recent editorial thumping of the Supreme Court for the ruling that a health inspector may enter a home without a warrant.

The Daily News has always been an outspoken critic of strong central government and have, we feel, many times gone too far to be critical. This time, however, they have a good point.

Every American citizen should be cognizant of the Supreme Court's infamous ruling.

One of the basic rights granted mankind as far back as 1689 in England was the principle that every man's home is his castle. I could not be searched without a process of law.

We may not think much of it, but what of a hundred years ago when petty and irresponsible bureaucrats can range through people's homes at will for real and imagined causes, or when law enforcement agencies find it simple to enter a home on the excuse of checking the plumbing rather than obtaining a warrant.

One of the basic foundations of citizenship is the ability to go will through the homes of frightened subjects ignoring all proprieties and the principal of human dignity.

The Bill of Rights was considered so important that its provisions were made into constitutional amendments. Here is Article 4 of our Constitution—read it and see how you can see how any group of people, judges or what have you, can interpret it to mean a health inspector could have access to homes without a warrant; the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, the persons or things to be seized.

We have always held there is something particularly wrong with strong central government so as it retains the role of servant of the people. Everything we've ever said in this newspaper has carried out that theme. But when the government becomes stronger, then it's time for someone to send a few well-placed kicks where they'll do the most good.

With this one interpretation the law is set for the government to become the master whereby a penny-ante health official can shatter the peace of mind of an entire community and where one can violate what we consider a basic human right on the pretext of a suspected health violation.

To hold that it's nobody's dog's business, from a health standpoint or otherwise, what goes on in any American's home, be it shack, slum, or mansion. And unless something is done at the Supreme Court, that tribunal will lose every last vestige of respect and reverence that has amassed during the past century and a half. They also rely (in the case of Abate and one vs. the United States) upon Article 5 which says a law cannot be tried for the same reason twice. They ruled that a federal court could try a man for the same offense twice in a possible prior trial in a federal court for the same offense. This is double jeopardy and our founding fathers were careful to put this safeguard against this into the constitution. Yet the Supreme Court has found their way clear to visit this basic human right out of context.

We don't know just how the law could legally oppose the judicial department of our federal government. Since the justices are appointed for life by the president they can't be voted out. The beating everyone else over the head with misinterpretations of the Constitution, they are at the same time enjoying job security through its provisions. It may be the nation will have to vote on constitutional amendments—spelled out in three letter words so there can be no misunderstanding—we can simply maintain rights so many patriots fought and died for long ago.

We consider these two rulings—double jeopardy and home entrance without a warrant—as a loss of personal freedom a calamity of serious proportions not only in themselves but portent of things to come unless something is done quickly.

This is our graduation issue. There are many greetings in this issue's Castro County News from area businessmen who are serious in wishing the best everything to the graduates. There is a tremendous transformation from student to adult citizen. There are the people who—twenty years from now—will be the nation's citizens of this area. There are the firms who have sponsored the

118,351 Colonies of Bees Relocated in 1958

Bees for pollination of crops are becoming increasingly important to Texas farmers. During the year which ended August 31, 1958, the state Entomologist's Office granted official permits to 219 beekeepers to relocate 118,351 colonies of bees.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Progress Report 2069 states that 45,000 colonies of bees in Texas were inspected and 148, or 32 percent were infected with American foulbrood.

The report says that during the 1957-58 season a number of apiaries in Bastrop County were affected by European foulbrood and were treated with a formulation of terramycin (TMS and TM-10). After two dustings of the antibiotic many of the affected colonies showed very little or no evidence of the disease. The bees in the colonies under observation stored a good honey crop during this season.

The disease picture of American foulbrood is now rather clear. But much more information is needed concerning European foulbrood and

Rot Resistance Will Be Added To Cotton Fabric

Texas cotton producers and consumers should be interested in a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture announcement dealing with the development of a practical method for producing cotton fabric with outstanding rot resistance and improved water resistance.

Because of its improved properties, cotton fabric treated with the chemical promises to open new markets for cotton in awnings, tents, tarpaulins and other outdoor fabric items.

The treatment method, developed by the USDA's Agricultural Research Service, is based on the use of a water soluble acid colloid of methylolmelamine. This chemical is well known for its resin-forming qualities. The resin, which penetrates the outer portion of the fiber rather than just a coating, makes cotton virtually immune to rot and mildew as demonstrated by soil burial tests in the laboratory.

Untreated cotton buried in soils containing fabric-destroying bacteria was in shreds after one week. The treated cotton, on the other hand, still retained 100 percent of its breaking strength after 21 weeks.

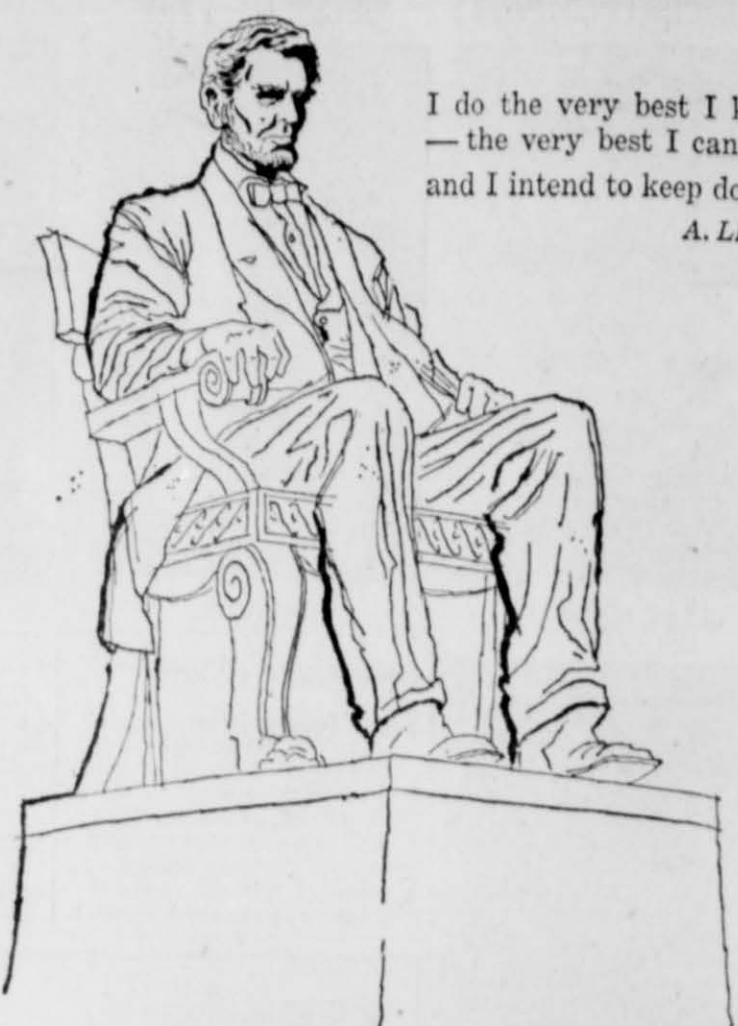

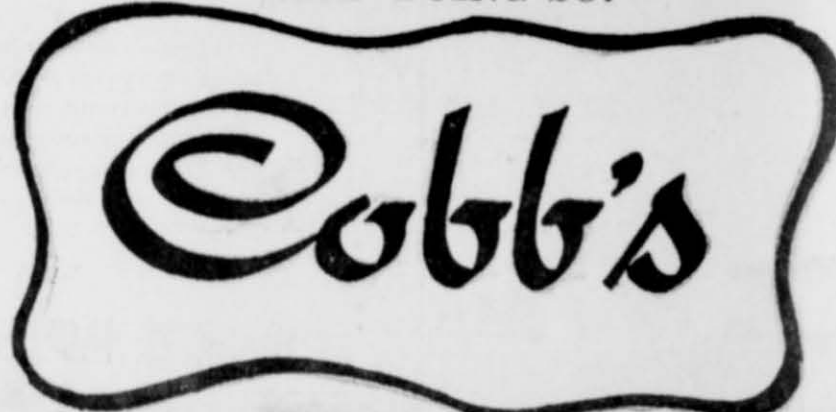

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Texas Nurses Will Be Honored During This Week

This is Texas Nurse Week. Nursing has played a vital role in the ministry of the sick, and today there are 12,000 active registered nurses in Texas plus thousands more vocational and practical nurses.

The force keeps growing. There are now about 2,155 student nurses in training in three dozen nursing schools scattered about the state.

In all, there are 30,000 registered professional nurses in Texas, but not all are active and many more work in other states.

A major problem facing nursing is encouraging a new recruits. Towards this end there are now many Future Nursing Associations dispersed among Texas high schools. In public health the need is complicated because of its specialized nature.

The Division of Public Health Nursing in the Texas State Department of Health was created in July, 1943 and is shouldered with the responsibility for general nursing leadership and consultation within the Department.

The Nursing Division conducts a constant program of studying and surveying health nursing accomplishments, needs and facilities throughout the State.

They also help to improve the quality of public health nursing through consultation and training directed towards qualifications and requirements for public health nurses, standards, techniques and procedures in the field.

In certain areas, the blue-uniformed public health nurse is the major factor in bringing a higher level of health into blighted neighborhoods.

How many new mothers have been shown how to bathe and feed baby, and how many invalids and chronic disease sufferers rest easier because of the routine rounds of the public health nurse is anybody's guess.

To thousands of Texans—both sick and well—a nurse is a friend and confidant. This is her week. Think of her and her colleagues, and take comfort in the fact that she will be there when needed.

Booklet Answers Questions on Social Security Problems

Farmers, accountants and income tax people interested in farm social security information, now have a factual booklet available to them. Hal S. 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Amarillo Air Force Base Invites Public to Open House May 16-17

Plans for the Armed Forces Day celebration at Amarillo Air Force Base Saturday and Sunday, May 16 and 17, have been completed. All indications are that it will be one of the largest crowd-gathering events at this base since the first celebration, held in 1945 when it was Amarillo Army Air Field.

According to Lieutenant Colonel Bernard F. Campbell, Armed Forces Day Project Officer, all activities will be centered at the base this year. The scheduled events include a parade, a fire-power demonstration by the United States Marine Corps Reserve, and a demonstration of a "sonic boom" by a TF-101 from Cannon Air Force Base, New Mexico.

"A static display of Air Force, Navy, and Army aircraft will be open to the public," said Colonel Campbell, and, in addition, the Technical Training School will open its doors to allow the visitors to see the training facilities used to implement the mission of Amarillo Air Force Base, the training school of pet mechanics, millmen, and supply and administration personnel.

More than two months of preparation have preceded the upcoming event which has been handled by an Armed Forces Day Committee composed of local military and civic leaders.

Playing an important part in the base plans for Open House is the 3320th Technical School, which is planning informative displays and demonstrations for the visitors who are expected to arrive from all over the Panhandle area.

The Jet Engine Mechanics School, a primary-mission organization at this base, will open its classrooms, school buildings, and hangars to visitors who will be able to watch the training system in operation.

Missiles on display in the hangars will include the giant intercontinental, Snark missile and the famous air-to-air Sidewinder. The aircraft in the hangars where students train will include the F-100 Super Sabre, F-101, F-102, F-86, and B-47. The Navy will also have on display one of its latest super-seismic aircraft, and the Army will be represented by helicopters and liaison aircraft.

Noon activities on Saturday, May 16, will feature the annual Armed Forces Day luncheon to be held at the Officers Club on the base. Delivering the key address at this affair will be Brigadier General Laurence B. Kelley, Director of Logistic Plans, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Materiel, at Headquarters, United States Air Force. The luncheon will be attended by many high-ranking civic and military officials.

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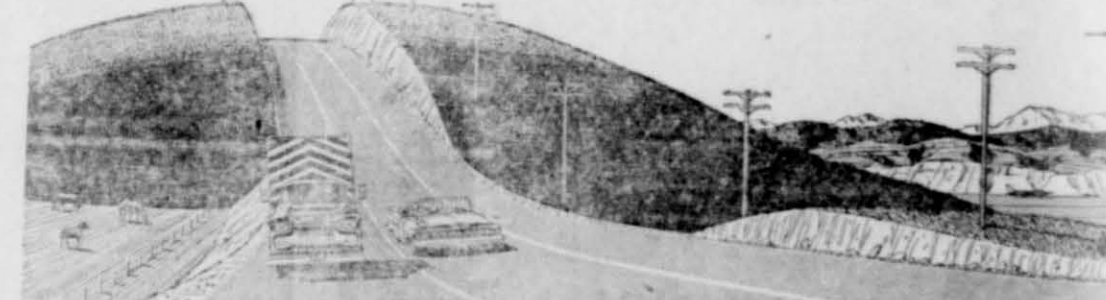

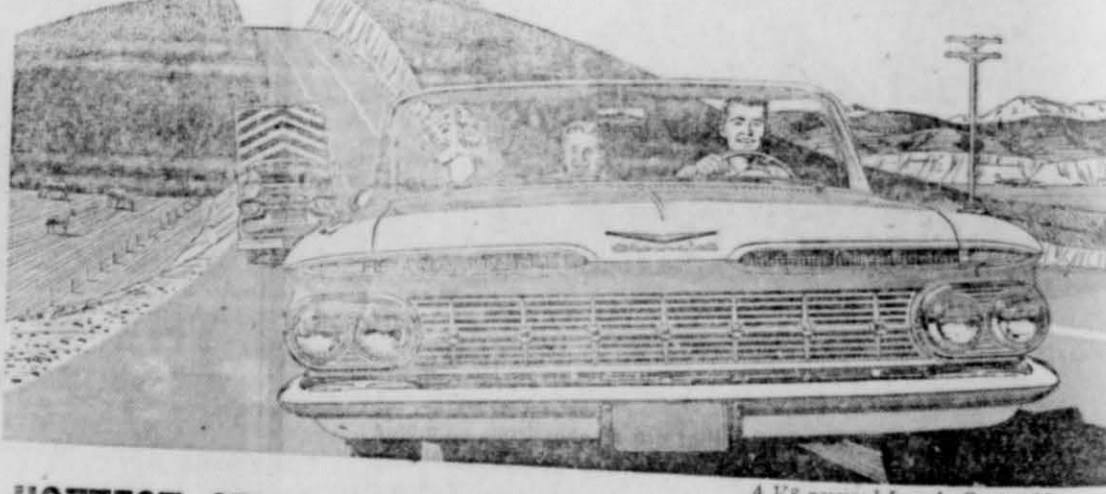

BACK TO WASHINGTON

It was nice to be home for several days last week. I only wish I could have stayed longer and visited more, but chances for doing that were vetoed by the press of matters pending in Committees and before the House. So, it was back to Washington Wednesday night. By catching a late plane in Amarillo, making connection with a late plane in Dallas, I was able to get back to Washington by 5:30 a.m., EDT. This enabled me to get a few winks of sleep before reporting for work and voting on the measure pending in the House of Representatives. There must be some kind of change going on in the world, because staying up all night and working all the following day is much more strenuous now than it was 10 years ago. Perhaps "fall-out" may have something to do with it.

STOCKPILING

A very able and alert Congressman from Houston, Texas, is doing some probing in one government department that could turn up pay dirt. I refer to Honorable Albert Thomas, who is Chairman of an Appropriations Subcommittee. In a recent investigation, it was revealed that the General Services Administration had a stockpile of strategic materials worth some 8 billions of dollars. These stockpiles have been justified in the past on the grounds of "national defense". They were supposed to include highly strategic materials, including strategic minerals and metals. Because of the "defense" brand, the whole matter was highly hush, hush. A few years ago, as Chairman of the Mines and Mining Subcommittee of the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, I moved for a complete investigation of these activities concerning minerals and metals: the reason being that many mining operations in this country were faced with bankruptcy because of the high cost of production here, as compared with the low cost of production in many foreign countries. Efforts to stabilize the domestic minerals operations were being thwarted on the argument that it was not fair to subsidize mining activities if the products could be purchased for a lesser price from foreign sources. This argument is excellent from an economic standpoint, looking only at the dollars and cents involved on a limited number of transactions. However, a look at the entire picture would reveal that this country needs and must have a strong minerals industry, not only for the purposes of national defense, but for the proper utilization and exploration of our own natural resources, and to support our position in world trade. If we could be assured of a continuing peace and amicable trade relations with other countries, certainly it would be sensible to buy strategic raw materials at the cheapest price on the world market.

But, when these materials are

indispensable in the maintenance of a proper national defense, the danger of a foreign source of supply being cut off, in the event of war, standing by itself, alone, justifies the proper development of sources of such strategic raw materials in this country. Some thought that the building of an adequate stockpile would dispense with the necessity of developing our own resources of these materials. To me, it is much more important to develop an industry in your own country to provide the needs of the people, than to permit a segment of the economy to die on the vine simply because the material can be purchased from foreign sources. The actual cost in either case will be about the same in the long run. However, in the first instance this country has a living industry that will provide much employment. If a country is going to follow the stockpiling theory, the stockpiles should not get too big, because it is all coming out of the taxpayers' pockets. In the case at hand, it occurred to some of the Members of Congress several years ago that some of the people clamoring for more imports of these strategic materials might have some interest in the foreign sources. It was this phase of the program that I wanted to investigate. My approval of the GSA or the State Department. It was my feeling that if the American taxpayer was being required to supply the money for this vast stockpile, much of which came from foreign sources, certainly it was advised by the GSA that they

could give me the country of origin, as well as the name of the broker through which the material was acquired, but could not give me the names of the owners of the mines where the material originated. They also told me the information concerning these operations was classified and must be given to me under those circumstances. Some suspected that the owners in foreign countries might be some folks in our own backyard. If such is the case, the veil of secrecy should be lifted. A billion dollars is entirely too

much money to be tied up in such a stockpile without the taxpayers knowing who got the money.

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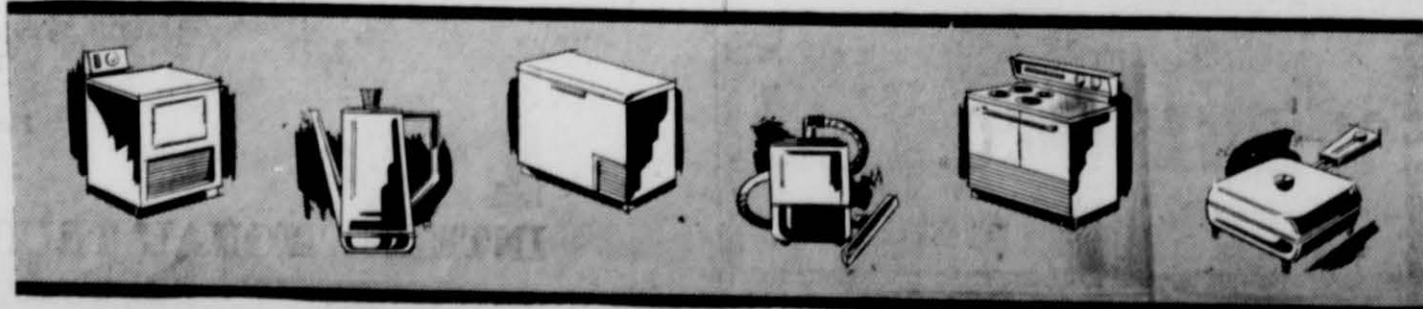
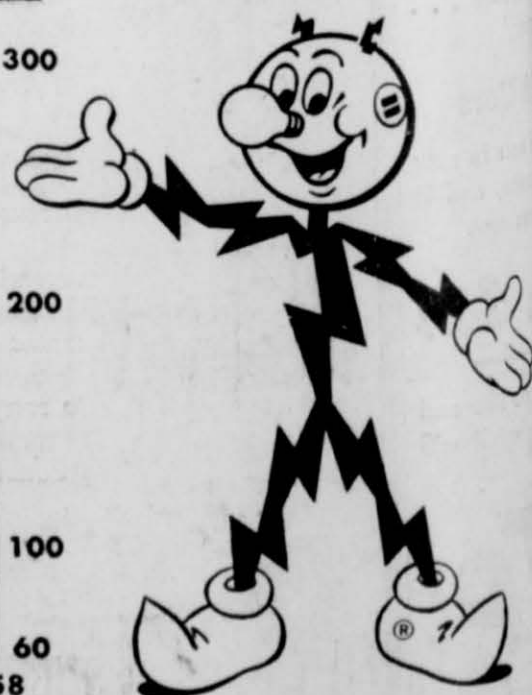
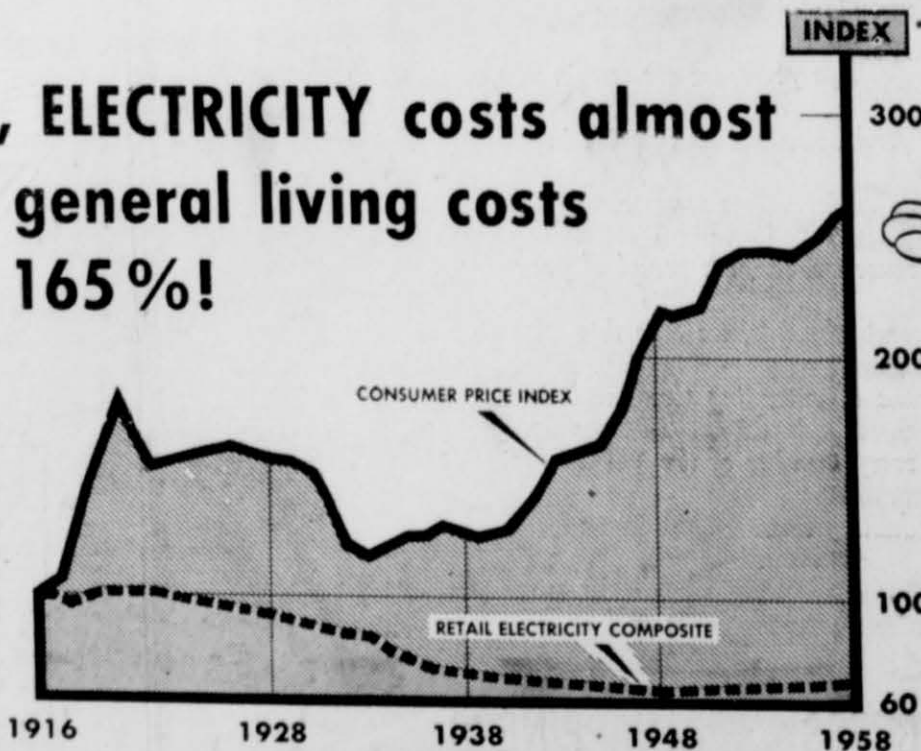
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
