It was the first time she had

missed a day of school in her twenty-four year teaching career. If the truth were known, this would probably be some kind of record. But doing outstanding things is rather commonplace with this remarkable lady.

Twenty-two years ago-in 1937 her husband F. A. Lovd was sheriff of Lamb County. He was killed while conducting the duties of his office and Mrs. Loyd finished out the remaining two years of his term, never missing a day night in office.

She was left with eight children to rear, the youngest being five years old. Mrs. Loyd worked hard at being two parents to her children and through her encouragement and help she saw them through college. She also finished up her own education, receiving a bachelor of science degree from Texas Tech with high honors in 1945 and in 1951 she received her master of education degree. At one time, Mrs. Loyd and five of her children were enrolled in Tech. Her three boys and four of her daughters attended Texas Tech and one of the girls, Wilma, went to Harden-Simmons Univerand her boys all graduated from

One of her sons, Owen, was principal of Dimmitt High School here in 1953.

Mrs. Loyd teaches the fourth grade in the South Grade School and has been with the Dimmitt system since 1948.
