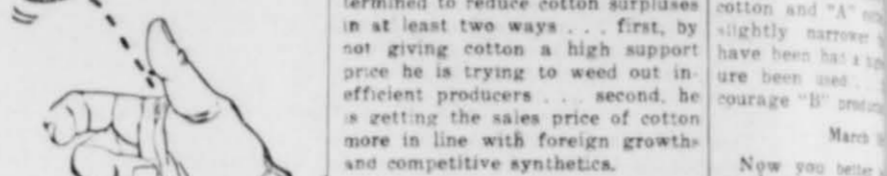
Both recitals will be in the South Grade school Cafeteria and other pupils will play on a later program.

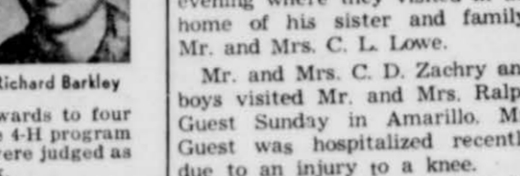
More Lone Star 4-H Members Rate Awards

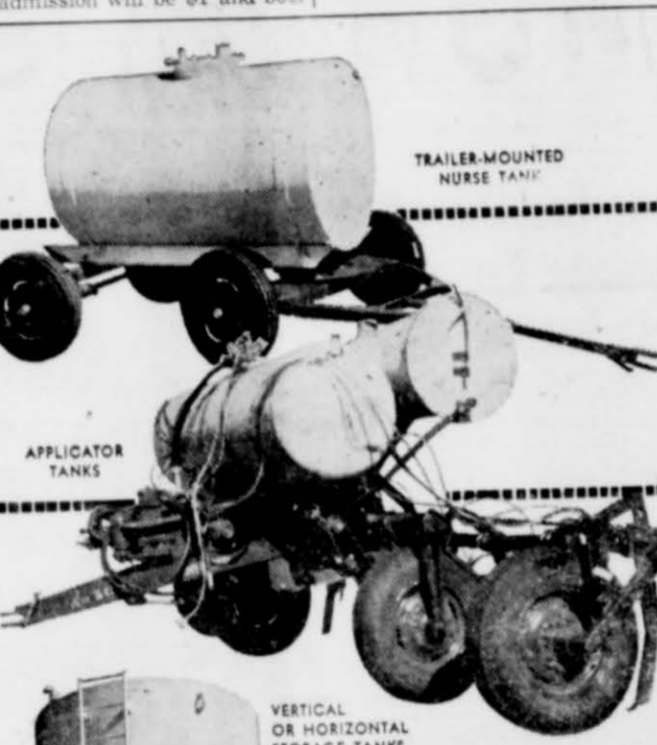

Great Plains Program Reaches \$2 1/2 Million Mark

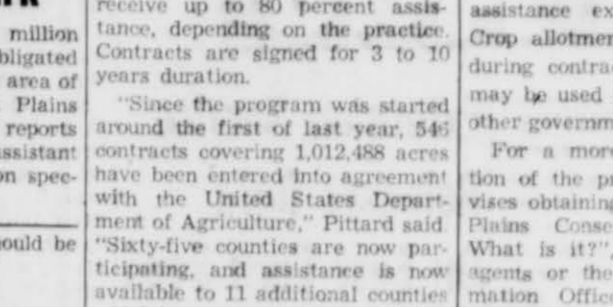
Over two and one-half million dollars have now been obligated to landowners in the Plains area. This voluntary program applies to 68 counties in the Great Plains area...

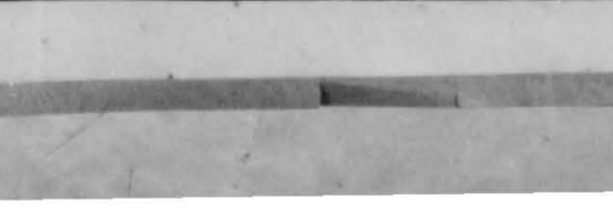

\$500 Scholarship May Be Awarded To County Girl

Miss Curtis, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Curtis of Surrency, won the right to be judged for one of three \$500 scholarships to be given by the Texas Home Demonstration Agents Association.

Miss Curtis will be judged by a four-member judging team: Erma Wins, assistant state 4-H club leader; Wanda Barkley, specialist in home management; Margaret Becher, district agent, all from the Extension Service; and Mrs. L. A. Byett, vice-chairman of the 4-H Committee of Texas Home Demonstration Agents Association.

Among the work Miss Curtis must show the judging committee will be demonstrations on electrical, clothing, food preparation, including freezing and canning, yard improvement, interior home improvement, poultry, safety, crops, recreation and leadership and tractor maintenance. If her 6-year record in these and other respects is good enough, she will be the recipient of a \$500 scholarship. This scholarship is paid for by a 25-cent assessment to each home demonstration club member in Texas every year.

The High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation has released statistics on tests conducted there with grain sorghums. Following are some of the general results...

One hundred and twenty pounds of nitrogen applied to grain sorghum produced a yield of 6,056 pounds per acre while the non-fertilized plots showed a yield of 3,623 pounds. The net return after paying fertilizer cost was \$30.05 per acre from the application of 120 pounds of nitrogen...

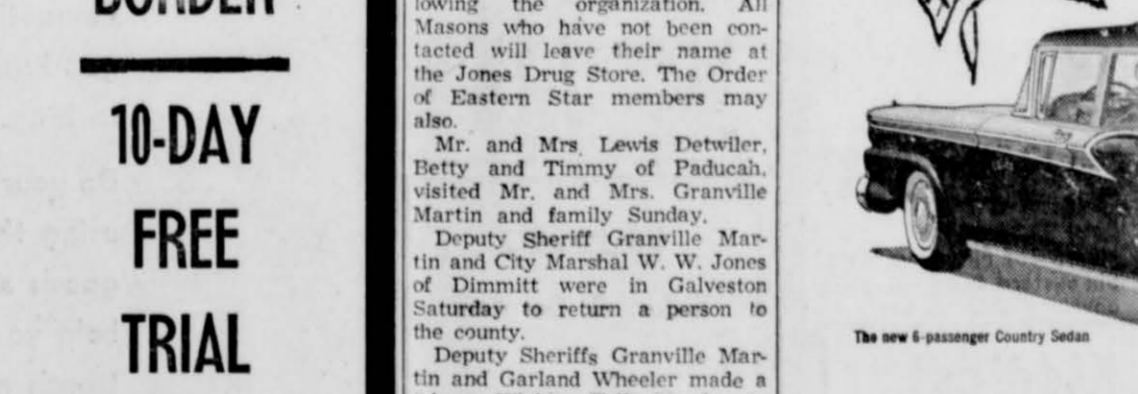

Fertilizer Use Increases In State

Fertilizer use, the last half of 1958 increased slightly more than 4 percent over the same period of 1957, reports J. F. Fudge, state chemist.

This increase represents almost a 9,000 ton increase over the 213,800 tons during the last half of 1957. The big increases in the fall of 1958 were primarily in anhydrous ammonia and 16-20-0.

These materials accounted for almost one-half of the total fertilizer materials sold.

The big increase in mixed goods was primarily in the 1:2:1 grades. The largest seller was 10-20-10, which accounted for about one-third of the total mixed fertilizer sales.

This large amount of fertilizer represents a big investment. To make this annual expenditure more profitable, Fudge advises getting a soil test to determine your soils' requirements. For information and assistance in taking a soil sample and submitting it for testing, contact your local county agent.

Irrigated Lands Produce Abundant Soybean Crops

Many questions about soybean production are answered in a leaflet published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Soybeans."

According to the leaflet, soybeans can be grown in all irrigated section of Texas, but most of the commercial acreage harvested for seed is on the High Plains. Although profitable yields have been produced in some seasons under dryland conditions on bottomland soils of the Red River Valley and in the eastern part of the Coast Prairie, yields over a period of years have been so inconsistent the crop has not been widely grown.

Soybeans are adapted to about the same general soil and climatic conditions as corn or cotton and do well on properly drained, mellow, fertile loams and sandy loams when adequate moisture is available.

Seedbed preparation for soybeans is the same as for cotton or grain sorghum. Texas farmers tend to plant too early for best results. Soybeans should be planted after minimum soil temperatures have reached 65 degrees F. and after the effective daylight period reaches or exceeds 14 1/2 hours. Fertilization should be based on soil test recommendations.

The leaflet contains discussions on growth requirements, time of seeding, seedbed preparation, fertilization, moisture requirements, harvesting and other related topics. It is available from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for L-411.
