the one received this week makes a total of \$13,092 which the government contributed for use in constructing the sewage treatment plant southeast of town.

A letter from Dr. Richard F. Boyd, Regional Health Director, to Mayor J. A. Stephenson said that books on the sewer construction project had been audited by a representative of the Health Service and that as everything was in order, the balance on the payment was being forwarded.

The letter said in part: "You will be interested to know that Bronte is one of 103 communities in Texas currently participating in this program and one of 61 to complete a project. It is gratifying to see the improvements in the control of pollution that have been accomplished through the efforts of the cities of Texas in cooperation with your State Department of Health.

"We commend you and your Texas State Department of Health for making this progress possible."

Sheriff Reports 13 Traffic Accidents Since First of Year

From January 1 through June 19 of this year, there have been 13 traffic accidents reported in Coke County, according to Sheriff Melvin Childress' office records. There have been seven 1-car, pickup and truck accidents, three 2-car accidents, one car and scooter and one pickup and motorcycle accident. No fatalities resulted from these accidents.

Sheriff Childress said Monday, "It is vacation time and the 4th of July will be here soon, and many of our citizens will be traveling.

"We want to encourage our people to use every precaution in driving, when on our streets and highways, so that their vacations will be a period of enjoyment, not a time of sorrow."

The Coke County Sheriff's Department is cooperating with the State Department of Public Safety in helping enforce traffic laws.

Rains Worth a Million To Area's Agriculture

Old timers are having a hard time remembering when a better rain fell during the month of June than the moisture which fell last weekend.

Coming almost like a fall rain, the moisture began falling just before noon Thursday and continued with only occasional stops until Saturday night. Up to 6½ inches fell in the Bronte vicinity. Ranchmen and farmers were rejoicing over the rain and the prospects for a good year. The only complaint was that "we still need a gully washer to run some water. Tanks didn't catch much from the weekend fall, as it came down so gently most of it soaked into the ground." The catch in Oak Creek Lake was only five inches, leaving the lake a long way from spillway level.

Mrs. Sneed was a native of the Fort Chadbourne community and had lived in this area until several years ago when she moved to Fort Worth. Her husband, Tom Sneed, preceded her in death.

Burial was in Ross cemetery, between Fort Chadbourne and Olga. Clift Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements.

Survivors include two sons, Tom Sneed Jr. and Kenneth Sneed, both of Fort Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Porter of Pampa and Mrs. Amelia Silen of Hollywood, Calif.; five brothers, Bob, Oscar and Ed Moore, all of Portales, N. Noted Lecturer To Speak Here

George A. Roberts of Houston, noted lecturer and authority on Communism will speak here on Thursday afternoon, June 29. He will come to Bronte as a guest of the Anti-Communism Study Group and will speak to the public at the school auditorium.

Edward Cumbie, president of the local study group, said that Bronte residents should feel honored to have such an outstanding authority come here to speak. Roberts will be giving a series of lectures at Abilene Christian College in Abilene each evening of next week and will come to Bronte in the afternoon. He conducts a series of lectures on Citizenship Training all over the United States.

Roberts served with Army Intelligence during World War II, and has traveled widely, studying the take-over of satellite countries by the Communist Party.

Cumbie said that he regretted having to hold the lecture during the afternoon instead of evening, "but you have to take a speaker of Roberts' caliber whenever you can get him," he added. He said he is hopeful a large crowd will turn out to hear the noted lecturer, even though it may mean neglect of important matters for a while.

Exact time for the meeting has not been set, but will be announced in next week's Enterprise.

Hoblitzelle Stakes 2nd Well in New Runnels Field

After completing the first well in the new Ronald Perkins Field of Runnels County, Karl Hoblitzelle of Dallas has staked location for a second test of the upper Canyon strike.

He will drill the No. 3-F Jack B. Herring, a 4,100-foot Goen lime wildcat, in Runnels County, six miles southeast of Norton and 933 feet west of his No. 1-F Herring, opener and lone producer in the Ronald Perkins (upper Canyon) field.

Location, on a 318.2-acre lease, is 2,640 feet from the north and 387 feet from the west lines of 34-H. C. Wylie (34-64-H&GN on some maps.)

The No. 1-F Herring was finished June 5 for 289.27 barrels of 46 gravity oil daily through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations between 3,275-2,79 feet.

Royce and Clyde Lee of Bronte are in charge of the venture.

New Post Office Building Near Completion; To Move in Soon

Noah Pruitt Jr., local postmaster, announced this week that he expects the Bronte post office to be in its new home some time during the first part of July.

Finishing touches are now being put on the building and the equipment is being installed. The contractor expects to be through with it in the next few weeks.

Pruitt said that new lock boxes are being installed this week. A total of 410 new boxes are being put in the office. This is an increase of 62 boxes over the 348 in the old office. Additional space is available for addition of more boxes when the need arises, Pruitt said.

Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth L. Musgrave of Abilene are owners of the new building and will lease it to the post office department. The post office will have a ten

year lease with an option to lease it for two additional five-year periods.

The new building, located at the corner of Oliver Avenue and Washington Street, will occupy the site where South Texas Lumber Co. formerly operated a lumber yard.

Pruitt said that plans call for paving the parking area on the south side of the building from the sidewalk out to the paving on the street. It is anticipated, he said, that plenty of parking space will be available, with the area on the south as well as in front of the building reserved for that purpose. The concreted area in back of the building is reserved for mail vehicles. A loading platform has been constructed at back of the structure.

The building has 2,693 square

feet of floor space. It will have central heating and refrigerated air conditioning. Specifications call for landscaping the area, but this remains to be done.

Pruitt said that new counters are already on the premises and will be installed shortly. Other new equipment has been received at the Santa Fe depot here but has not been unloaded.

The program of building new post office buildings by private enterprise and leasing them to the department allows the building to remain on local tax rolls. Another advantage to private ownership is that many new buildings are being provided where no federal funds are available for construction. This allows many towns, such as Bronte, to have a new post office, when it would not be possible any other way.

Ballinger Junior Rodeo Set for June 29-July 1

Final plans for the 3rd Annual World's Championship Jr. Rodeo to be held on June 29th, 30th and July 1, 1961, at the Rodeo Grounds in Ballinger are nearing completion, according to Alvin Spreen of Ballinger. Spreen stated that the rodeo would provide only nightly performances which will begin promptly at 8:00 p. m.

The 1961 rodeo to open to individuals to the age of 19 and contestants will compete in three divisions. Contestants age 16-19 are eligible to compete in the Tid Down calf roping, ribbon roping, bareback riding, bull riding, girls barrel race, and girls pole bending. Contestants, age 13-15 may compete in Tie down calf roping, breakaway roping, girls barrel race, and girls pole bending.

Contestants age 12 and under will compete in pole bending, breakaway roping, girls pole bending, and girls barrel racing. To be eligible to compete for the more than \$8,000.00 in prize money, contestants must have entry blanks, together with the entry fees in the Rodeo office at Ballinger, no later than 12 noon on Wednesday, June 28. Blanks are available at the Ballinger Truck and Tractor Building.

County Agents News Column

I believe that everyone will agree that the rains received during the past week were a generous blessing. I have seen good rains, timely rains that were of great benefit, but I believe this one was the best over such a wide area of sparse, usually arid West Texas that I have ever seen. The pastures are in good shape as a whole and should get better. I have already heard two men putting out feelers for a few cattle to reduce some of their taller grass to sheep size.

A few fields of cotton will have to be replanted, but the benefits will outweigh the losses immeasurably. Thrips should be watched for in the young cotton. Also, the grasshoppers could get out of hand in a few places. They are much easier to control while they are young, wingless and still in the hatching area. If an outbreak looks possible in your cotton I would attempt to prevent it rather than try to control it.

Participation in the feed grain program in Texas according to figures received recently is greater than the Secretary of Agriculture anticipated; a total of 152,878 farms in Texas reported a feed grain base. Of these, 80,286 signed up as participants. The total feed grain base for the farms signed up is 7,131,484 acres. The diverted acreage is 41.3 per cent of that figure or 2,951,351 acres.

Dollar-wise, the computed advance payment to the producers and landlords was \$24,578,792.

In summary, the diverted acres of grain sorghums represent 37.1 per cent of Texas' harvested acreage for 1959 and 1960 (an average of the two years). The Secretary of Agriculture set a goal of 20% diversion for the Nation.
