





This home can easily be fi- CERTAIN REGULATIONS RE-QUIRING THE USE OF THE FA-CILITIES OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO BE AC-QUIRED BY CITY OF BRONTE SECTION 3: Except as hereinafter provided, it shall be unlawful to construct or maintain any privy, privy vault, septic tank, cesspool, or other facility intended or used for the disposal of sewage

> SECTION 4: The owner of all houses, buildings or properties used for human occupancy, employment, recreation or other purpose, situated within the City and abutting on any street, alley or right-of-way in which there is now located or may in the future be located a public sanitary or combined sewer of the city, is hereby required at his expense to install suitable toilet facilities therein, and to connect such facilities directly with the proper public sewer in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, within ninety (90) days after date of official notice to do so, provided that public sewer is within one hundred feet (100 ft.) of the property line.

SECTION 5: Any person found to be violating any provision of this ordinance shall be served by the city with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations.





County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

I noticed two examples last week of what deep breaking and fertilizing can do under certain conditions. We have experienced and probably will see in the future years in which fertilizer applications will give little or no benefit. Thus far this year, however, there is a marked difference in the two fields of cotton in question.

R. C. Patterson, on his cotton field in the Friendship community, left a few rows unfertilized. Possibly in the future the unfertilized cotton will gain in size and production, but at the moment vast difference in size and development of the plants - the fertilized rows are much further along. The cotton is approximately four weeks of age and is planted on a sandy and sandy loam soil.

Frank Percifull, of the Valley View Community, has a field with a similar contrast. One portion of the field was deep broke, another deep broke and fertilized, while a third portion received neither treatment. The portion that received both treatments is advanced over the other two areas. The portion that was deep broken oly is ahead of the area with no treatments applied. The field looks like it contains cotton of three different ages. Frank's soil is a deep clay loam.

Certainly the portions in a year in which we had less moisture would not stand out so vividly but with conditions as they are we are anxious to know whether or not the differences will carry through the season and show a difference in yields.

Controlling insects on livestock and field crops is a common thing during this season of the year. Everyone is aware that all insecticides should be handled with precaution, but we often are less careful as we become accustomed to using a certain insecticide. Even though a person has never been affected from handling insecticides, they still have the ability to be toxic. Because they have never been toxic to the handler, regardless of how many times he has been exposed, does not mean the next time will be the same. All insecticides should be handled with care and the manufacturers precautions adhered to.
