

FRIDAY, AUGUST 21

The Castro County Hospital District Board will vote Tuesday evening to increase its tax rate by 239.48%, from 10.65 cents per \$100 assessed valuation to 35 cents.

35° Including Tax

The vote will come at a board meeting to be held in the hospital's main dining room at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday. The meeting is open to the public.

A standing - room - only crowd attended the public hearing on the proposed rate increase last Thursday night. Most of those addressing the board said the hospital must be kept open, but wondered aloud how much money the hospital district has lost through mismanagement and sloppy bookkeeping.

Joe Stevens, the new administrator, told the crowd that the financially beleaguered hospital has been virtually abandoned by the federal Medicare and Medicaid programs, will have to borrow \$600,000 in operating funds this fiscal year, and will have to provide about \$500,000 in "unreimbursed services" during the coming year. "What has happened here is not unique," Stevens said. "Since January 1985, 28 rural hospitals in Texas have closed. "Both Medicare and Medicaid now refuse to pay for services they used to pay for," Stevens explained. "The government now says that if a patient can be treated anywhere else, he can't be treated in a hospital." Outlining Medicare's complicated new criteria for diagnosing, admitting and treating elderly patients by category of illness, with restricted time limits, Stevens assailed the government program as "cookbook medicine." "The big problem is that the Medicare and Medicaid rates were set too low, and hospitals our size get paid less for the same services than urban hospitals-as much as 38% less," he said. "The paperwork required by any government program is huge. Nurses now have to make about 10 times as many patient-chart notes as in 1981, and it's the same with the business staff." Even if the hospital were to close, he said, "The hospital district will still exist and will still have to collect taxes. We would have to contract with the Hereford hospital for services for local residents; we would have to expand our ambulance service, and so forth." He said the proposed tax hike includes no provisions for pay raises. The hospital is continuing to try (Continued on Page 3)



The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen voted Monday night to pay \$2,-476.21 as the city's portion of the ambulance service expenses incurred from September 1986 through June 1987.

Hospital Administrator Joe Stevens told the board that records do not indicate how much of the service's accounts receivable has been paid, but added that a new system in use can account for those payments since July 1.

Stevens said the service would be willing to assume a 50% collection rate on the other 10 months, with the remaining 50% of costs to be divided between the city, county and hospital district.

The city was also allowed to subtract \$1,789.79 from their portion to cover the cost of a replacement motor purchased by the city for one of the ambulances.

Stevens said he estimates the ambulance service had about a 20%

collection rate from persons who used the service during the months in question. But with the new record system, he said they expect a collection rate of 60 to 65%.

The 50% assumption of expenses will not be in effect for future billings to the three taxing entities who share the cost of the service. Payments received from those using the service will be subtracted from expenses before the remainder (Continued on Page 10)

Recent rains brighten harvest

A good general rain blanketed the Castro County area last week putting the finishing touches on this year's corn crop and smiles on the faces of many local farmers. Most area producers feel the rains were beneficial, but, for the cotton's sake, things need to dry off now.

South of Dimmitt toward Sunnyside farmers received anywhere from 3 to 5 inches, but any more moisture will mean run-off, according to Ricky Byers, manager of Sunnyside Grain and Supply. Byers said Sunnyside area crops look as good as they ever have. Like most area elevator operators,



Byers felt corn harvest was still three weeks away.

of Farmers Grain of Hart said the crops look good in his area, with the exception of a few spots that received hail earlier this summer. Sewell expects good yields with corn harvest starting a little later than usual one will know the real outcome until harvest for the various crops gets around Sept. 1.

2 to 4 inches of rain in the Flagg area may have been even better for the sorghum than for the corn, according to J. R. Brown, manager of Flagg Grain. Brown said crops around Flagg look beautiful, and he has never seen better yield prospects on corn. The cotton needs some drying off, though, to keep from becoming too big and rank, Brown said. He expects the first loads of Flagg corn to start coming in around Sept. 1.

Yields on sorghum should be better than last year if the frost doesn't catch them at the wrong time, Collyer said. Sorghum harvest should begin in October, he added. Crops in the Nazareth area look very good in the Nazareth area thanks in part to the two inches plus of rain they received last week, reported Rocky Wilhelm of Dimmitt Agri Industries. Harvest in the Nazareth area should be right on schedule, according to Wilhelm, with corn starting around the first of September, sorghum in October, and cotton October to whenever. Area sugar beets look good so far with the help of recent rains, according to Tony Edwards of Holly Sugar. Edwards said they really need the rainfall to back off now. Producers will need pesticides to control outbreaks of



Public criticizes hospital management at hearing

to cut expenses, he said. He added that local physicians have saved the hospital \$45,000 this year by cutting their fees.

Hospital Trustee Stanley Schaeffer said, "I doubt if it (the tax increase) will fund us completely because of our back obligations, but it will come close." He explained that the hospital district owes Medicare \$248,000 because of a bookkeeping mixup, and that the hospital had to add an \$80,000 sprinkler system recently to meet government regulations - all in

addition to the regular operating loss through Medicare, free service and unpaid accounts.

Former Board Chairman Garland Coleman added, "The tax increase should take care of these problems, although we will probably have to borrow operating money again before the next fiscal year ends."

Comments by those who addressed the board at Thursday night's hearing:

CAROL LANTZ, Dimmitt school nurse: "I'm concerned about taxes, but more concerned about our hospital and what would hap-

pen if we didn't have it.... Those who live in rural areas where hospitals have had to close are just sick. I know it's been hard for the hospital board; we appreciate your efforts. I think our community will do anything that's possible to help.... We know there have been problems in the business office. Have people been paying their bills? Have they been receiving them? This is the thing that has people the most upset.... All our people need to consider what it would be like not to have a physician or a hospital in Dimmitt."

CARROLL GERBER, Nazareth businessman: "My property value doubled with the reappraisal in the spring. The school calendar for 1987-88 was approved with the stipulation that if the "snow days" are not used, they will be moved to the end







Furrow dikes prove cost-effective

farming, furrow dikes provide a very cost effective means of water conservation. Furrow dikes can help producers maximize water use, decrease the amount of water pumped from underground sources, reduce irrigation costs and increase crop yields.

"It's a simple and inexpensive way to conserve water," says Ken Carver, Assistant Manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

Furrow dikes consist of small dams or dikes spaced periodically down the furrow. The dams prevent water runoff by holding the water in place until it can soak into the soil.

"We need to maximize the use of rainfall," Carver says. "The furrow dike is an effective, inexpensive

In either irrigated or dryland method to capture rainfall. Also, the dikes allow heavier irrigation without runoff."

> A three-year study by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock measured an average annual runoff of 2.73 inches without the use of furrow dikes. Experiments at the Bushland Agricultural Experiment Station showed an average annual runoff of 1.7 inches per acre from undiked furrows, rows with dikes.

Research at the Agricultural Experiment Stations in Bushland and Lubbock has consistently shown increased crop yields using furrow dikes. Water captured with furrow diking can improve crop production by supplying water beyond basic plant needs. For each additional

inch of furrow dike harvested water in the soil, cotton lint yield may applications from sprinkler systems increase by as much as 30 pounds per acre and grain sorghum yield may increase by as much as 350 pounds per acre. Thus, the average two to three inches of runoff water the furrow dikes save can result in yield increases of 60-90 pounds per acre of cotton lint or 700 to 1,050 pounds per acre of grain sorghum.

Furrow dikes are highly cost compared to nop runoff from fur- effective. The initial investment for furrow diking equipment ranges from \$140 to \$300 per row. This investment can usually be recovered in the first year of use through reduced pumping costs and/or increased yields. By catching runoff water, dikes enable the producer to save the \$8 to \$12 per acre it would cost to pump two to three inches of

water from the aquifer.

For furrow irrigation and cultivation ease, the furrow diked rows may be alternated with undiked rows. If using sprinklers, the irrigator may wish to furrow dike each row for maximum water collection benefits.

An additional benefit of using the runoff water saved by the use of furrow dikes is the reduction on the amount of water pumped from the Ogallala aquifer. Water is saved for future use.

5. Entries will be accepted as listed in each division from 5 to 7 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 19 and from 12 noon to 4 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 20.

6. Entries must remain on exhibit until 5 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 22. Cash awards and/or items should be picked up Saturday.

7. All articles not removed from the building by 6 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 22, will become property of the Fair Association and will be disposed of.

8. All articles must be labeled with your name in an inconspicuous place. Labels are in the back of the fair books.

Label all entries with your name, section, class and division.
 10. There will be five ribbons

given per class. Cash awards are \$1 for first place ribbons and 50 cents for all second place ribbons.

ANTIQUES

Antique cars and farm equipment will be entered in this section of the fair.

BAKING

Divisions in the baking section include brownies, six pieces any kind; candy, six pieces any kind; cinnamon rolls, six rolls, cookies, six pieces, any kind; decorated cake; fruit pie; muffins, six muffins; other pies; plain iced cake; pound cake; quick loaf bread; and yeast bread.

 Products may have been frozen, but it is not necessary. Thaw at room temperature in packaging material to be ready for judging.

2. Display products on foil covered cardboard and wrap with clear plastic wrap. If not displayed in this manner, your food will be disqualified. Pies should be in foil pans. Cream pies may be taken after they

are judged due to spoilage. 3. No commercial mixes!

CANNED FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

All canned products, except jelly and preserves, must be in either standard square or round glass jars. (Standard jar is not a jar you bought canned goods in.) No mayonnaise jars will be accepted. Jelly and preserves may be in pint, half-pint or jelly glasses and must be sealed or covered with paraffin or both. (Label what kind.)

In the dried fruit category, classes include apples, apricots, bananas, grapes, peaches, pears, plums, prunes and other.

The dried vegetables class will feature asparagus, beets, bell peppers, green beans, lima beans, shelled beans, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower,celery, corn, onions, parsley, blackeyed peas, English peas, spices and squash.

Apples, applesauce, apricots, cherries, fruit juice, peaches, pears, pineapple, rhubarb and other will be featured in the fruits category.

Jams and jellies entered will be apple, any berry, cherry, grape, peach, plum, strawberry and other. (Continued on Page 3)

After the corn is cut, cattle can be put out to graze on the wheat and the corn stubble, allowing farmers to get cattle on a field more quickly. Ordinarily, it would be two months later before a farmer could get cattle on wheat pasture.

This process saves the farmer time in the field, too, because he doesn't have to shred and disk his corn stalks. It also makes fuller use of a center pivot which would have more money for the farmer.

Wheat seed can also be flown over cotton, though it must be done later to keep the wheat from outgrowing the cotton. The usual planting time for this would be around Sept. 10, according to Roger Sanders, of Southwest Agri-Services, Inc.







New technology brings water management success

Texas farmers are being equipped with cost-efficient technology to improve water use efficiency and engage in water quality management strategies.

strategies are focused on maximizing precipitation effectiveness, limiting irrigation and maximizing water use efficiency (crop yield per unit volume of water use), points our Dr. John Sweeten, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dryland, or totally rainfed, crop production is riskier but its acrege is increasing due to irrigation pumping costs. Key components of water management on dryland farms includes reduced soil evaporation by conservation tillage and narrower row spacings for soil

shading; weed control to reduce from increased infiltration and reevapotranspiration; reduced runoff and increased soil moisture storage by conservation tillage, land leveling, level terraces, deep chiseling and furrow diking; and selecting Present day water management crops, varieties and planting dates to coincide with rainfall probabilities.

> Conservation tillage, which involves maintaining crop residues on the soil surface, has increased soil moisture by 2.1 to 2.8 inches per fallow season following irrigated wheat as compared to conventional tillage, according to agricultural engineers and soil scientists with the USDA's Agrucultural Research Service based in Amarillo. Increased storage of rainfall results

duced evaporation.

Furrow diking, in which soil dams are mechanically placed every few feet along furrows, prevents runoff from most rainfall, Sweeten said. Researchers have reported that dryland grain sorghum yields more than doubled using furrow dikes as compared to open furrows, which lost more than three inches of runoff. Furrow diking increased cotton yields by 25% at Lubbock. Other tests have shown benefit-cost ratios for furrow diking usually exceeded 10 to 1.

Graded furrow irrigation systems, which are the predominant type used in Texas, have been improved in recent years to reduce tailwater runoff and deep percolation losses, Sweeten said. Irrigation

water use efficiencies have been increased through the use of shortened furrows, land leveling, limited irrigation fequencies and amounts, tailwater collection and reuse systems, skip-row planting and irrigation, alternate-row irrigation, tractor wheel compaction in irrigated furrows, conservation tillage and furrow diking.

Surge flow is an innovative method of graded furrow irrigation in which furrow streams are intermittently applied in on-off watering cycles controlled by a surge valve and timer. Light irrigations of two to three inches can be applied. Surge flow irrigation results in faster furrow stream advance due to partial soil sealing during off cycles and primarily reduces deep percolation losses, especially for the first seasonl irrigation, notes Sweeen.

Surge valve sales in Texas have increased from only one in 1982 to 3,000 in 1986, on an estimated half-million acres. It appears that a 20% water savings with surge flow is a realistic expectation for many furrow irrigated farms, Sweeten said. Benefits appear to be greatest on soils with moderate or high infiltration rates. Careful management is necessary to reduce excessive tailwater losses.

A TAES engineer has developed an advance-rate feedback irrigation system (ARFIS) which is essentially a computer-controlled surge flow system for each furrow. Remote sensors in each furrow trigger calculations of rate - of - advance and infiltration rate and result in furrow stream adjustment. Irrigation water application efficiencies have ranged from 90 to 100% and distribution efficiencies from 85 to 92%.





are labor efficient, low pressure spray nozzles operated at 25 to 30 psi just above the crop canopy have largely replaced higher pressure nozzles, Sweeten said. Low pressure nozzles reduce evaporation losses but tend to increase runoff, which can be virtually eliminated through conservation tillage, soil chiseling, and furrow diking.

A low energy precision application system (LEPA) was developed by Experiment station agricultural engineers at Lubbock to lower evaporation losses and energy requirements of sprinkler systems. The LEPA system consists of very low pressure emitters (5 to 6 psi), suspended from moving laterals, that discharge water 6 to 15 inches above each furrow. The LEPA system has consistently achieved 96 to 100% water application efficiency when furrow diking is used to control runoff. Higher application efficiencies combined with lower system pressures often mean a savings of 25% or more in both water and energy costs. The LEPA system costs much less per acre than drip irrigation, especially when an existing center pivot irrigation system can be convereted to LEPA.

Engineers now have developed a new second generation LEPA system known as MFIS (multi-function irrigation system), which contains an additional adjustable nozzle that can spray various types of agricultural chemicals while irrigating. The system is especially effective in conrolling insects that usual-

ly live on the bottoms of leaves where they are protected from overhead sprays. The extremely high application efficiencies of MFIS are expected to minimize spray drift and chemical leaching below the root zone, says Sweeten. Drip (or trickle) irrigation sys-

tems have been used in vineyards, orchards and nurseries in Texas for many years where high valued crops can justify the additional capital cost. Drip irrigation systems also have been used in West Texas cotton demonstration projects, where increased yields were usually obtained. High capital costs and the need for high quality management means that investments in trickle systems for row crops such as cotton are difficult to justify economically at this time.



A Dimmitt Lion's Club member will be there to get you in order and make sure the judges see you.





Cotton producers on the South Plains should terminate their irrigation if they have not already done so, according to a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Not only would continued irrigation be an additional expense farmers certainly don't need this year,

it could delay maturity of a crop already well behind schedule, cautioned Dr. James Supak, Extension

"Pay attention to the calendar and look at the probability of making a bloom after mid-August," Supak advised producers who irrigate.

The Extension specialist said two factors influence his recommendation. First is the rapid drop in the probability that blooms after mid-August will develop into mature bolls. Second is that, for this year's crop, heat unit accumulation, a guideline for fiber maturity, is running well behind the long range average.

"A large percentage of this year's cotton (on the South Plains) is June-planted," Supak said. Across the area as a whole, the average date for the first blooms was around July 25 to 27, approximately two weeks later than normal.

Supak cited research studies at Lubbock by Dr. Don Wanjura, USDA agriculturl engineer and others which show that historically if cotton plants bloom in the area on Aug. 15, they have a 71% chance of maturing. Bolls initiated by today (Aug. 20), however, have only a 36% chance of maturing, and another ten-day delay of bloom, to Aug. 30, means only a 14% chance of maturing.

As you move north of Lubbock,

the probability for boll maturity on Aug. 15 blooms drops one column to 36%. Aug. 20 blooms have only 29% chance and Aug. 25 blooms have only a 14% chance of matur-

South of Lubbock, maturity prospects improve a step, with Aug. 15 blooms having near - pefect potential and Aug. 20 blooms having a 71% chance.

Rainfall is another consideration. "Our probability for rainfall increases in late August and September," Supak said.

"If we apply irrigation and also get rain, it will further delay the maturity of the crop and cause excessive vegetative growth," he said.

"All this indicates the need to be careful about late irrigation this year," Supak said. He urged producers to keep in mind the old guidelines that with furrow irrigation all irrigation should be terminated by today (Aug. 20) or Saturday. With center pivot irrigation, where controlled amounts of water can be applied, the deadline can be extended until about Sept. 1.
