#### **Work Underway On Storage Tank**

Work is underway on a new storage tank that will add a half million gallons to the water storage capacity of the Bronte waterworks system. Contractor on the job is Texas Lawn Sprinkler Co. of Amarillo.

Also included in the project is construction of a considerable amount of new 8 inch and 6 inch water mains. Pipe for the new lines has been distributed along the routes where they will be laid. Cost of the waterworks improve-

ment project will be \$55,955. Money for the work is being furnished interest free by the Upper Colorado River Authority. It will be paid back by the city over a period of years.

The new storage tank is located near the water filtering plant in north Bronte.
