# 140 graduating in county

The number of graduates from the county's three high schools will reach 136 to 140 by the time the final recessional is played Monday night.

**NAZARETH High School** graduated 19 seniors Wednesday evening, 32 will receive diplomas at Hart High School tonight (Thursday), and 85 to 89 will graduate from Dimmitt High School Monday night.

None of those figures are record-breakers. Last year's total number of grads in the county hit 145, with Dimmitt and Hart setting records.

**DIMMITT High School** will hold baccalaureate services Sunday at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Rev. Jim T. Pickens, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, will deliver the baccalaureate address. Also taking part in the religious service will be Rev. Bill Wadley of the Lee Street Baptist Church, Bill Myers of the First Baptist Church, Rev. Eddie Sanchez La Bill Myers of the First Baptist Mission, and Supt. Charlie White.

Ronda Tidwell will perform the processional and recessional march music for both the baccalaureate and commencement.

Because of limited space in the auditorium, seats for both services will be reserved, according to Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Smith, class sponsors. Except for school board members and their wives, faculty members and graduating seniors, admission will be by ticket only. Each graduate has been allotted 10 tickets.

**DIMMITT High School's** commencement exercises will begin at 8 p.m. Monday.

After the processional, Max Newman will give the invocation, then Pam Barker will deliver the salutatory address.

Mrs. Patsy Morrison and Mrs. Ann Touchstone will sing the class song, then Kent Bradford will give the valedictory address. Supt. Charlie White will then present the class for graduation, and School Board President Frank Wise will award diplomas.

After the benediction by Patricia Gross, members of the Class of 1971 will walk the aisle together for the last time as Miss Tidwell performs the recessional.

**HART HIGH SCHOOL** will hold its commencement exercises at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) in the high school auditorium.

Baccalaureate services were held May 16 in the First Baptist Church, and the class has since made its senior trip.

Mrs. Carl Rambo will play the processional and recessional for the HHS graduates. Donnie Shive will give the invocation, then Carol Miller will deliver the salutatory address.

## No driver's license

### Teen driver fined \$500 as result of fatality

A 17-year-old Dimmitt youth was ordered to pay a \$500 fine after pleading guilty Wednesday morning to second-degree negligent homicide in the traffic death of a 2-year-old girl last week.

**THE CHARGE** was filed Tuesday against Johnny Villalobos, 404 NE Seventh St., who police said was driving without a license when the fatal accident occurred.

Villalobos pleaded guilty in county court Wednesday morning when he was arraigned before Judge Raymond E. Wilson.

The youth was driving the car that struck and killed Susie Ortiz,

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ortiz, in the 100 block of Northeast Seventh Street last Wednesday evening. The fatal mishap occurred at 8:10 p.m.

**THE GIRL** died in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital after receiving emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital here.

Police said Villalobos was driving south when the girl ran out of the front yard of her home, 106 NE Seventh St., and into the path of the youth's 1962 Ford Fairlane sedan.

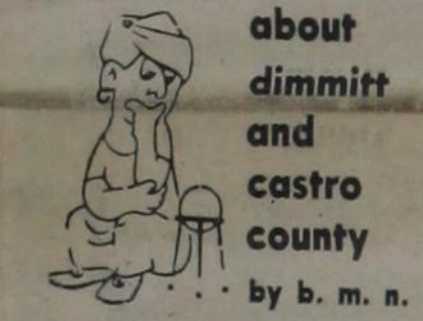
Officers said the left front fender of the car struck the girl, and that the car ran over her before Villalobos could bring it to a stop.

David Chavira, who lives across the street from the Ortiz home, rushed the girl to Plains Memorial Hospital in his car, then notified city police of the accident.

**IN EFFECT**, Villalobos was fined for being involved in a fatal accident while driving without a license. Police said skid marks at the scene indicated he was driving within the 30-mph speed limit when the accident occurred.

"This is an example of the serious consequences that can result from failure to obey the driver's license law," County Attorney Robert Buntyn said.

## Drought here is now 'severe'

The National Weather Service now rates the drought here as "severe."

**THE HIGH PLAINS** was given a Palmer index rating of 3.1 as of Saturday. A zero rating is normal on the Palmer index, which considers rainfall and loss of moisture already in the soil. A rating of 4.0 or higher is considered "extreme."

The NWS said the drought has reached the "extreme" stage in the Low Plains, North Central, Edwards Plateau and South Central areas of Texas is "severe" in the High Plains and East Texas, and "moderate" in the Trans-Pecos and Upper Coast areas.

## Our library: a success story

With more money, more books and more customers, the Castro County Library has recorded some historic chapters over the last five years. And a storybook climax is still being written.

**THE FRIENDS** of the Castro County Library, at their annual meeting recently, heard a detailed progress report from Hazel Merritt, member and former chairman of the county library board.

Miss Merritt's report pointed out increases ranging from 300 to 500 percent in the library's activity and its ability to serve the reading public here.

Key factors in the library's progress have been increased financial help from the city and county, radio and newspaper publicity, more services, longer hours, and—as a result of all these—a greatly increased usage of the library by the public.

The library is now circulating 4 1/2 times more books than it did five years ago. Total volumes circulated in 1966 was 2,000, but last year the number climbed to 9,012, and so far this year 50 new customers have started checking out books since the library moved to its new location on East Bedford.

Many are making use of the "Telex" inter-library loan system, through which volumes not on hand here can be borrowed from other libraries in the state-wide system, with only a two to three-day waiting period. Last year 170 books were checked out through this system, and almost 100 such book loans were made in the first four months of this year.

**THE LIBRARY'S** increased traffic includes readers of all ages—especially children. In 1966, 70 youngsters enrolled in the Children's Summer Reading Program and 29 completed their required reading. Last year, a whopping 262 enrolled, with 138 of them completing their requirements for certificates.

Also, the Children's Story Hour continues each Friday from 1 to 2 p.m., with 17 currently enrolled.

All this progress wouldn't be possible without the money to keep buying new books and expanding the library's services. And the funds have been provided at a rapidly increasing rate.

## Former Dimmitt man puts Vultee in the sky again

The "Spirit of Pueblo," a big, silver Vultee V-1A Special, made its second maiden flight May 1, after being rebuilt in Pueblo, Colo., by Harold Johnston, son of Mrs. Pearl Johnston of Dimmitt.

The 1936 aircraft was one of only 25 Vultee V-1A's built, and is the only one of its kind still in existence.

The single-engine Special was built for William Randolph Hearst of Hearst Publications, who had a supercharged two-stage, 1,000-hp Wright Cyclone engine installed, necessitating use of the three-blade propeller, and giving the plane an exceptional performance of 266 miles per hour.

Johnston put in more than 6,000 hours over a five-year period to rebuild the plane.

BEFORE beginning the actual work on the craft, he spent several months researching,

gathering information from all parts of the US, Canada and Mexico. The restoration work was done in the end of Johnston's auto repair shop, where he manufactured or rebuilt many of the structural parts.

The plane has an interesting history, beginning with its first owner, Hearst used the V-1A Special as his private plane after outfitting it with plush upholstery, soundproof cabin, individual ventilators and heaters at each seat, reading lights, ash trays, foot rests and commode-lavatory facilities.

It was later used to haul freight, and has even transported monkeys from Panama to the University of California at Berkeley for medical experiments.

THE AIRLINER has also appeared in two motion pictures: "Jungle Queen," starring Clark Gable, and "Tarnished Angels" with Rock Hudson and Robert Stack.

Before its recent flight, the antique plane was towed to Pueblo Municipal Airport, escorted by a parade of vintage autos from the same area.

After a final check, Federal Aviation Agency approval was given for the plane. This in itself was a major accomplishment, since FAA required more than 1,000 pages of information and completed forms before granting final approval for the rebuilt plane to be flown.

The plane was piloted by Johnston and an American Airlines pilot on the long-awaited flight. Very impressive with its purple and gold trim, the silver-colored aircraft is already in demand for air shows and antique shows.

"I'm looking for a sponsor," Johnston states, "or a buyer, if a sponsor doesn't show."

## Congressman is optimistic on drought aid

Congressman Bob Price and Senator John Tower lunched with Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin last week and were told that President Nixon is considering additional aid to drought stricken areas in Texas which the two lawmakers had requested.

"SECRETARY Hardin advised us that he and the President are studying all possible legal avenues to get additional aid for farmers and ranchers in our state," Price said.

The Panhandle Congressman said they discussed the possibility of government owned grain being made available to cattlemen at reduced prices to maintain foundation herds, and also discussed eligibility to graze irrigated set-aside acreage without penalty.

"I also mentioned the so called 'pauper's oath' that farmers and ranchers are forced to sign in order to obtain reduced price government grain," Price said. "The Secretary stated that possibly this could be changed where the applicant would only have to sign a statement indicating that he did not have sufficient liquid assets to purchase feed at the market price."

"The Secretary also indicated support for my legislation to give him additional authority to act in the case of natural disaster, and I am hopeful that the Congress will act on my bill within the near future," Price said.

# Soon, all outgoing mail to be postmarked TX 790

The newest innovation of the US Postal Service—Area Mail Processing—is to be installed at the Amarillo Post Office about mid-June.

WHEN THE new processing system begins, mail originating here will be postmarked "TX 790" in Amarillo.

W. L. Crawford, regional director of the Dallas Postal Region, which covers Texas and Louisiana, said, "The program is designed to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Amarillo's modern and mechanized post office."

Amarillo has a new \$110,000 letter sorting machine, with a capability of sorting 21,000 letters per hour into 160 separations, with only six operator positions.

IT HAS an automatic canceling machine capable of facing and canceling a combined total of nearly 30,000 letters per hour. It also has edger-stacker mechanism for letter mail.

THE MAIL deposited at the local post office or letter box designated for local delivery will be postmarked at the local office. Also, all metered mail will bear the local postmark.

Area Mail Processing will be applicable primarily to that mail originating at post offices within the SCF area which is destined for delivery outside of the city of origin.

The Sectional Center Area postmark will read, "US Postal Service TX 790" along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Amarillo and each individual associate office will not be changed.

HOWEVER, the only mail that will be postmarked with the name of the mailing office, regardless of destination for delivery, will be mail that has been deposited in street letter boxes or letter units which have been designated "Local."

Crawford emphasized that no office will lose its local postmark whatsoever.

He urged that when the plan goes into effect, for obvious reasons, customers should not use the word "city" on mail addressed for local delivery, but spell out the name and use the ZIP Code.

The Amarillo Post Office, Crawford pointed out, is also a large Sectional Center serving 79 associate post offices—including Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth—and the new system will revolve entirely around that capacity and that function.

Area Mail Processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within the Amarillo Sectional Center Facility (SCF) area will be shipped directly to the SCF for complete preparation, processing and cancellation.

Area Mail Processing will be applicable primarily to that mail originating at post offices within the SCF area which is destined for delivery outside of the city of origin.

The Sectional Center Area postmark will read, "US Postal Service TX 790" along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Amarillo and each individual associate of-

ization for letter mail.

This year Doris Payne had all the practice a person needs to write little insinuating notes

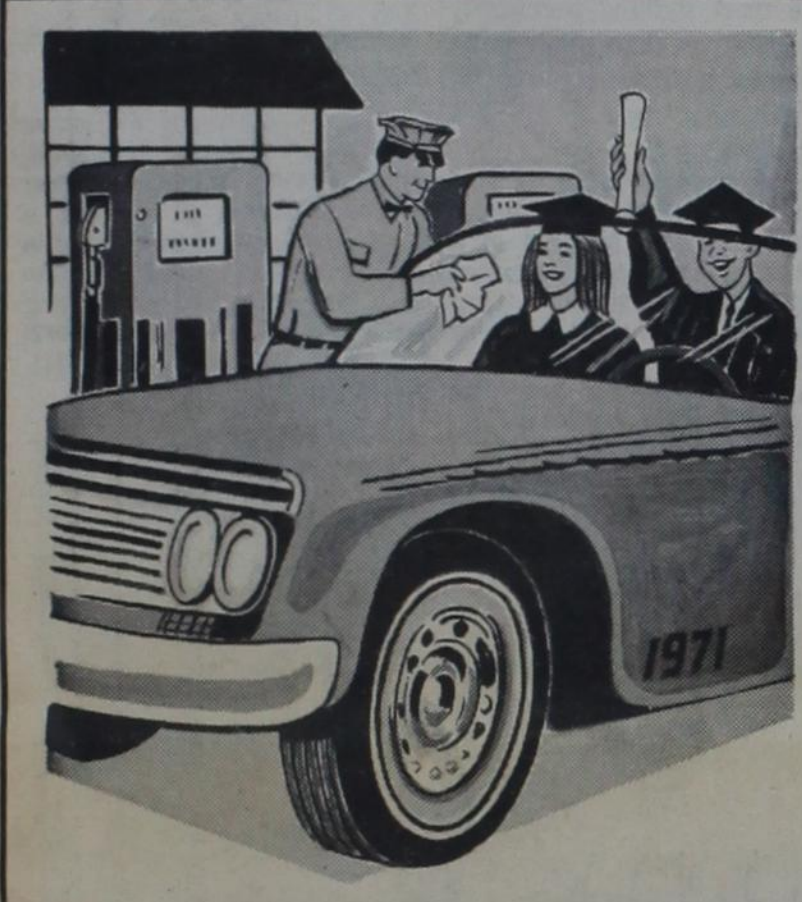

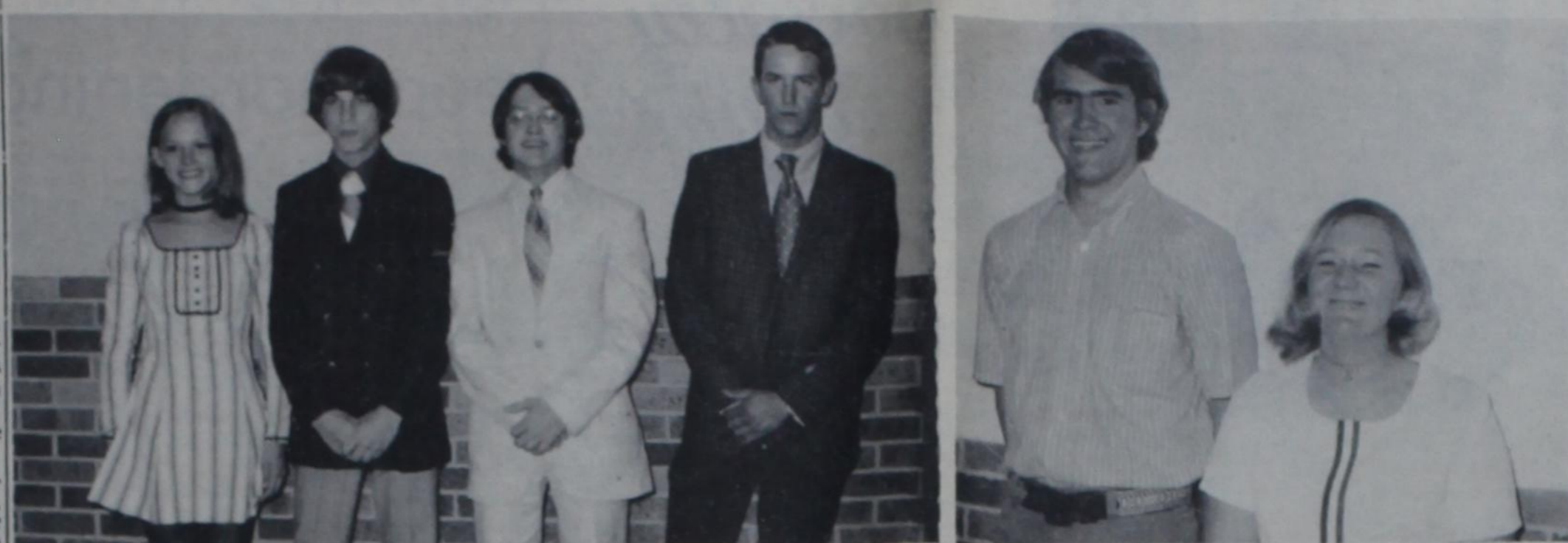
She was a member of the Baptist Church.

## Fight the wind, keep gardening

By IRENE KEATING  
The way the wind has been blowing lately sure has hurt all plants. But it must stop someday. My newly planted shrubs are being oriented to wind. If they survive it they should live forever. My grass is coming up too. I never knew how much work it takes to start a yard until I've tried it. It is a very rewarding work though. Each thing we do makes such a difference.

HERE IS THE garden check list for June.

1. Time to take stock of the Home Landscape. Make notes on how it can be improved, new plants needed, old ones to be replaced, walks and curbs to be installed, and anything else needed to improve the landscape. Then prepare a timetable for accomplishing your objectives.

2. There is ample time to produce a colorful flower border by planting zinnias in early or mid June. Plant them, preferably, in full sun or where they will receive at least six hours of full sun.

3. Although the past winter was relatively mild, some azalea plants are developing symptoms of freeze damage. The bark is split and peeling - indicating cold damage. Cut back to sound healthy wood. New growth should appear below the cut this summer.

4. THIN the fruit on fruit trees to increase the size, quality, and to prevent limb breakage. Thin peaches to an average of four to six inches apart, apples and pears to six to eight inches, and plums to two to four inches apart.

5. Make your selections of bearded iris and prepare the beds for new plantings. They may be transplanted any time from mid June until late summer.

6. Cuttings can be made of your favorite plants using mature wood from the current seasons growth. A propagating frame or box is almost a necessity to maintain optimum conditions of temperature and humidity.

7. Fertilize bearded iris after they have completed flowering. Use four pounds of 8-8-8 or three pounds of 12-12-12 per 100 sq. ft. of bed area.

8. Don't forget to provide supplemental water for plants such as hydrangea, coleus, caladium, geranium, dahlia, azalea, and camellia. Hot dry summer weather is extremely critical for these plants.

9. SPIDER mite is one of the most troublesome pests during the hot summer months. A hand lens is helpful in checking for this pest. Kelthane, Diazinon, and Cygon will aid in controlling spider mite. Use only as directed on the container label.

10. Continue to pinch mummy plants to obtain compact bushy plants.

11. Black spot is no respecter of season. Continue to apply protective spray of phaltan or maneb to both upper and lower leaf surfaces of your roses.

12. Container plants and hanging baskets require extra water and fertilizer during hot weather. Never apply fertilizer to dry soil.

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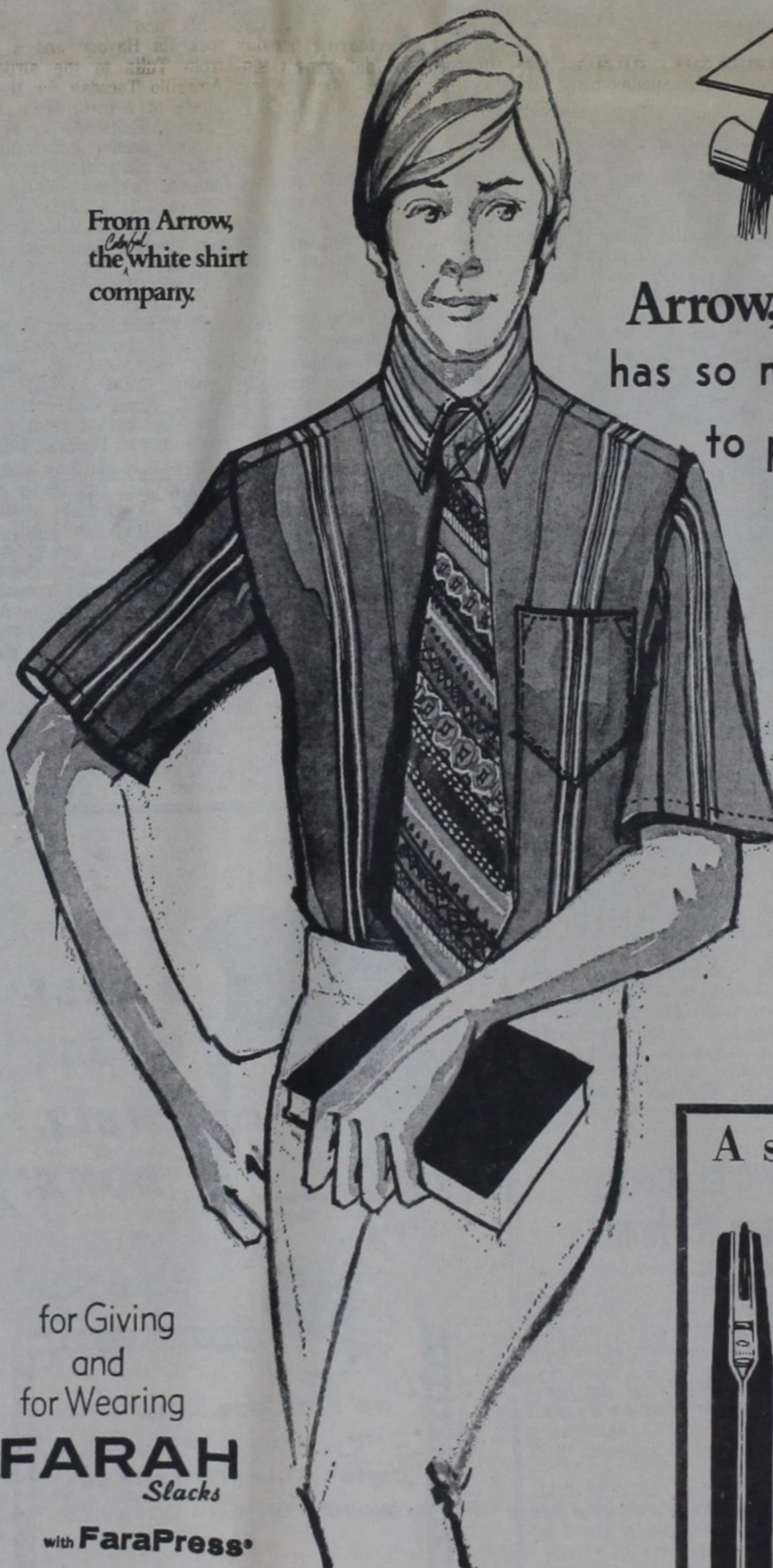

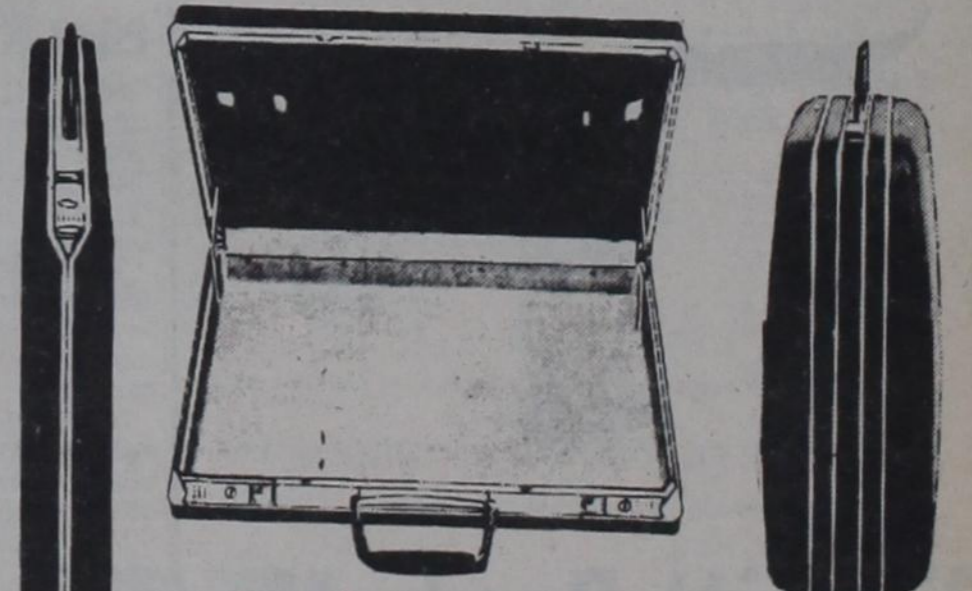

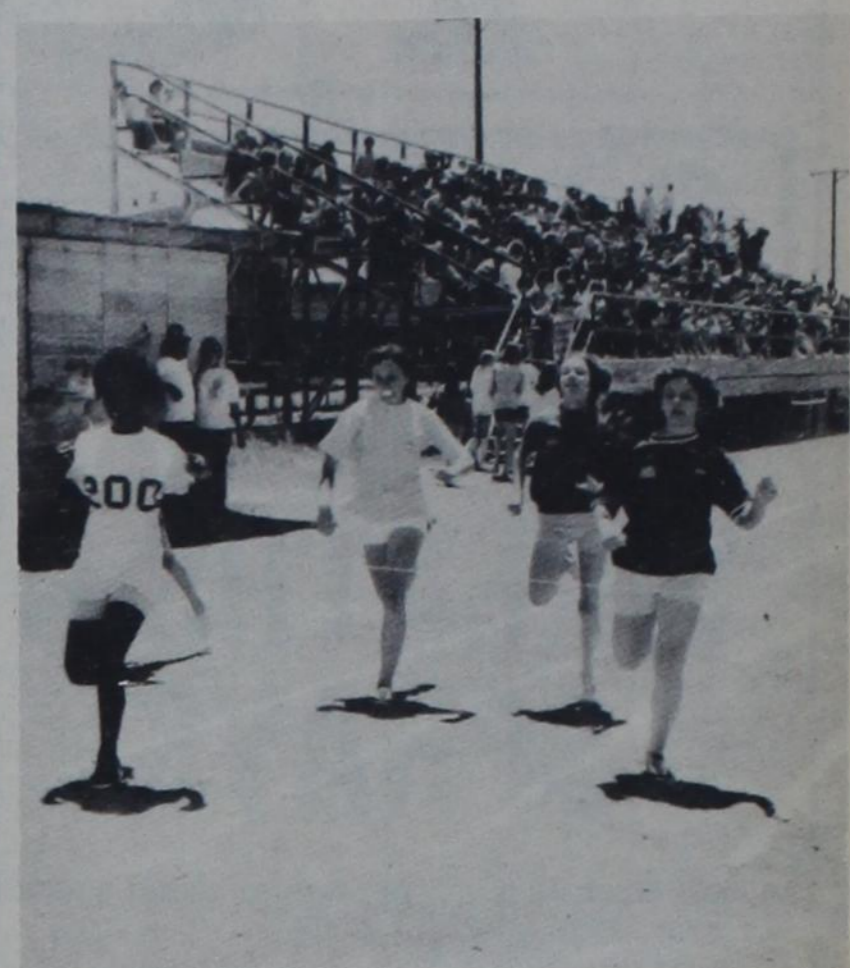

About a culture of war

France has suffered from so many wars that now we can really talk of a "culture of war."

I HAVE grown up among stories, movies, and memories of war, telling me how my Daddy fought and is now handicapped, how my uncle died, and how many of my parents' friends died. I grew up among families who lost several relatives, their homes, and sometimes all their fortunes.

There was always a sort of animosity between France and Germany because they seem to be our eternal enemy. In the last 100 years, we have had three wars with Germans. In 1870 our great-grandfathers fought; in 1914-18, our grandfathers fought; and in 1939-45, our own fathers fought.

My father's family live in the north part of France, which has been long under German occupation, and everything there has been turned up by the bombings and destroyed. My mother's family live in the coast of Normandy, about six miles away from the beach where the Americans and Englishmen landed June 6, 1944, to help liberate France. There too, everything was turned up, burned, ruined.

MY DADDY was a prisoner for a while in Germany, in one of those famous camps, but fortunately he escaped one night with some friends—it was his third attempt! He came back to France, but the north part was under German occupation. So my mother, who was still in the north part, had to swim across the Loire River, which was the border, to meet my daddy on the free part. She swam across by night because German patrols were watching, and she could have been killed.

Knowing that the south part of France was about to be occupied too, they escaped to Morocco, where my daddy re-entered the army and fought in North Africa, and then in Italy with the Americans. And then one morning in 1945, a soldier found him in a coma with a big hole in his hip. It was the end of the war for him.

I am extremely proud of my father because he fought for me, for his country, and for freedom against the dictatorship of Hitler.

WAR IS still everywhere in the world. But France has now a little rest—a very little rest, when you think that the student riots of 1968 almost brought a civil war. I know many young people

who think a war is inevitable in France because of the strength and aggressiveness of the Communist party. Others react eagerly against war—even against the war in Vietnam. You can see on the streets "US go home" or "Peace in Vietnam."

Maybe it is hard for America to understand what a "culture of war" is, because it has been a very long time since you had any war inside your own territory. You did not grow up a-

mong those scared and angry memories of war, as we did. When I read about the liberation of Paris in 1945, I can feel deep inside the feeling of happiness that our fathers had that day.

THE PAST still stays alive for us. Because our own fathers fought and even died for us, because World War II is still too close, we can't forget. And I wish we could!

Peace on earth, good will toward men.
