Funeral services for William Robert "Bob" Knierim, 87, were held Tuesday, Dec. 12, at 3 p. m. in the First Methodist Church. Rev. A. S. Neely, pastor, Rev. Lester Vinson, pastor of First Baptist Church, and Joe Wolf, Bronte Church of Christ minister, officiated.

The Coke County 4-H Club girls' and boys' annual Christmas party will be held at the Robert Lee School gymnasium on Friday, December 15, at 7 p.m. Mrs. Roe and I hope that a large number of members can be present to participate in the spiritual program and to enjoy the giving, and the refreshments. A report from the Animal Health Commission shows that 72 counties in Texas have been declared modified brucellosis free. Approximately 50 more counties are in some stage of brucellosis control. Also mentioned in the report were the various cases of disease found over Texas. I noticed that 46 cases of rabies were found in November. Twenty-six of these were skunks.

I know that you have noticed the trend in cattle to move eastward in Texas and farming westward; a recent outlook report emphasizes vividly the magnitude of the change. The three counties in the state leading in cattle numbers are along the southeast coast of Texas. Harris County is number one with 105,000 head, followed by Kleberg County with 95,000,
