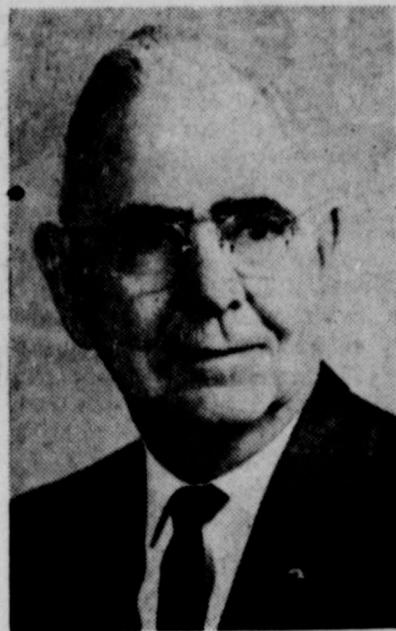

## MARVIN BRYANT SUCCEEDS H. A. SPRINGER AS WTU MANAGER

Marvin Bryant of Eden has moved to Bronte and assumed his new duties January 1 as local manager for West Texas Utilities Company. He will succeed H. A. Springer who is retiring from active service with the Company after a career of more than 37 years. The announcement was made today by District Manager R. E. Ruble of Ballinger.

Mr. Springer has been a resident of Bronte since 1940 when he was transferred here from Eden to assume his new duties as local manager. He joined WTU in 1924, when the Ballinger electric properties were purchased by the Company, and served as a lineman in Ballinger for nine months before his transfer to

Winters in 1925 as head electrician and serviceman. Three years later he moved to Mason where he served as a serviceman for three years.

In May, 1930, Mr. Springer moved to Eden to begin his long career as a WTU local manager and 10 years later moved to Bronte to start his 21 years service in Bronte.

Born in Milano, Texas in 1896, he grew up on a farm in Milam County and attended the public schools. After serving a short time with the U. S. Army during World War I, he moved to Ballinger in 1919 and was employed by C. J. Lynn. The following year he was employed by the Ballinger Light, Power & Ice Company. Four years later he resigned and was employed by the Bell Telephone Company. Springer worked as a lineman for the telephone company until 1924 when he returned to work for the Ballinger utilities company.

Mrs. Springer is the former Ida Mae Roberts. They were married in Eden in 1940. Mr. Springer has one daughter by a former marriage, Mrs. Kathryn DeRiemer, who lives in Oklahoma City, Okla. They are active members of the Church of Christ. He is a master Mason, a member of the Scottish Rite, and the Dallas Consistory.

He has served as county chairman for the Red Cross for 18 years and served one year as commander of the American Legion Post. He is a member of the Suez Temple, The Bronte Lions Club, Concho Scottish Rite Association, the Parent Teacher Association and the Quarterback Club.

## 200 Entries Expected Monday At Coke County Livestock Show

The annual Coke County Fat Stock Show will unravel at the show barn in Robert Lee on Monday, Jan. 8, with approximately 200 entries on hand to vie for the prizes and a place in the auction sale. Fifty-four 4-H Club and FFA Chapter members from over the county will display their demonstrations and projects as they compete for \$675.00 in prize money and 210 ribbons, banners, rosette trophies and belt buckles that are to be awarded.

The big show will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the judging of the breeding swine. The market swine judging will follow at 9 a.m., the fat lambs at 9:30 and breeding sheep at 10:30 a.m. After lunch judging of the breeding

cattle will commence at 1 p.m. then the steer judging at 1:30 p.m. The show will be terminated with the auction sale of 30 or more lambs and market swine starting at 2 p.m.

Judging this year's show will be H. A. (Swede) Hanson of San

Angelo and Roy Sims of Coleman. Hanson is a former Vocational Agriculture teacher of Winters and Ballinger, now in the insurance business in San Angelo. He judged the 1961 county show and will judge the sheep and swine divisions of the 1962 show.

Sims will judge the breeding and fat cattle divisions. He is presently the County Agricultural Agent of Coleman County and served shortly in Coke County in 1958 as Assistant County Agricultural Agent in Training.

Classifying and sifting the animals entered in the 1962 show will be H. B. Edmondson, Ballinger Vocational Agriculture Teacher. He classified the sheep in the 1961 county show.

Action on the part of the girls and boys that will compete for the awards will begin with the bringing of their animals to the show barn on Sunday, Jan. 7, between 1 and 4 p.m. The animals will be tagged, weighed and classified for showing on Monday.

The show association directors will serve as superintendents of the various divisions of the show and be in charge of the events. Teddy Pitcock, Nolan Pentecost and Leslie Wink have been named superintendents of the baby beef show. The fat lamb show superintendents are J. Lee Ensor, Glenn Waldrop, Howard Varnadore and Bert Blaylock. In charge of the market pig show will be Jack Corley, James Wells and J. B. Arrott. The breeding animal shows will be handled by D. K. Glenn, J. W. Service Sr. and Aubrey Denman. James Wells, president of the association, will be superintendent of the show and Bob Cox, association secretary, will be busy with the records, prizes and sale.

The 1962 show is expected to be a repeat of the fine show held last year. With the weather cooperating a large crowd is expected to be on hand to witness the competitive showing and to participate in the sale. The Home Demonstration Club women of the county will again serve barbecue lunches at the community center at noon.

## Politics Gets Off to Good Start

Politics in Coke County got off to a good start this week with six candidates announcing their intention of seeking office. Five of the announced candidates are presently holding the offices they seek, but two persons have already announced for the commissioner of Precinct 2 post.

Announcements appear in this issue of The Enterprise for County Judge W. W. (Bud) Thetford, County Clerk J. L. (Chilly) Tinkler, County Treasurer Mrs. Gertrude Gray, Commissioner Howard Brock of Precinct 2, and Commissioner Claude Ditmore of Precinct 4. The other announced candidate is C. E. (Eldred) McGuire, who

is also running for the Precinct 2 Commissioner's post.

Rumors from over the county indicate that other residents are considering running for some of the offices. However, no definite statements had been issued to The Enterprise up to Wednesday noon.

Also running for re-election is State Representative David Reed of Big Spring. This will be the first time that Coke County has been in a Representative District other than with Runnels, Coleman and Concho counties. The last session of the legislature re-districted the state and Coke County is now in a district with Sterling, Howard, Irion, Martin, Glasscock

and Reagan counties.

Other offices which will be voted on this year include justice of the peace, state senator and most all state offices. Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo has already announced he will seek re-election.

Other district offices will also be open for competition by candidates.

Candidates for county and precinct officers now run for office only once every four years. Half of the offices become vacant each two years. Offices with two more years before becoming vacant include sheriff, tax assessor-collector, county attorney, constable and commissioners in Precincts 1 and 3.

We have one to suggest right off the bat and we hope it will meet your approval.

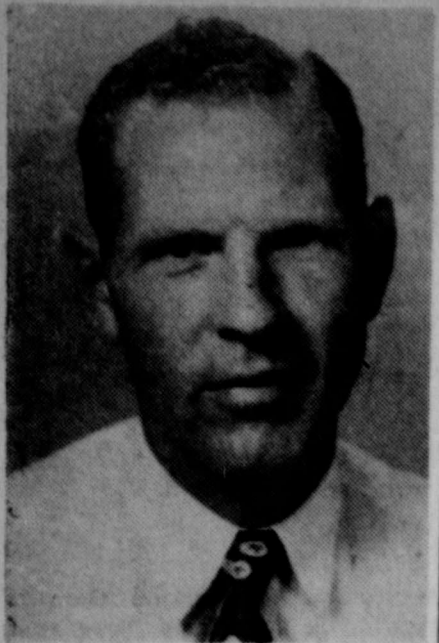

County and city officials alike say it wouldn't take much. We certainly feel it would be a good investment in that it would preserve the investment we have already made in these streets.

We would like to see included enough money to pave streets in the new additions in the south and east parts of town. Many new homes have been built in these areas since the paving was done and these streets should be paved.

If it could be arranged to tack a small bond payment onto the end of payments of the present bond, taxpayers would hardly feel it, and everybody would benefit by having their investment protected.

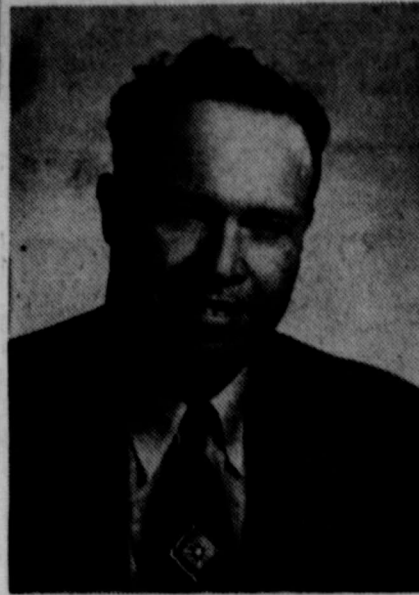

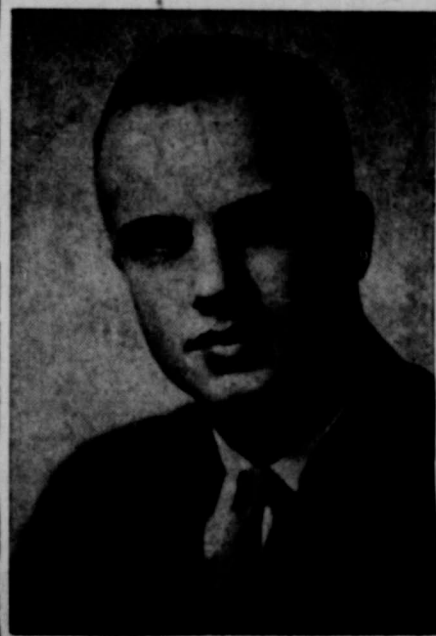

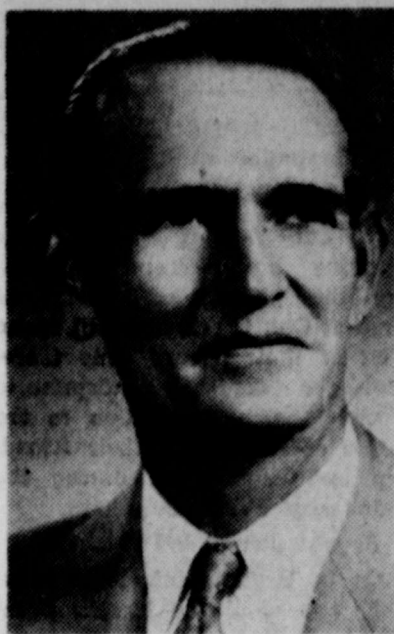

Tinkler is a booster for high school athletics and has been an active member of the Quarterback club.

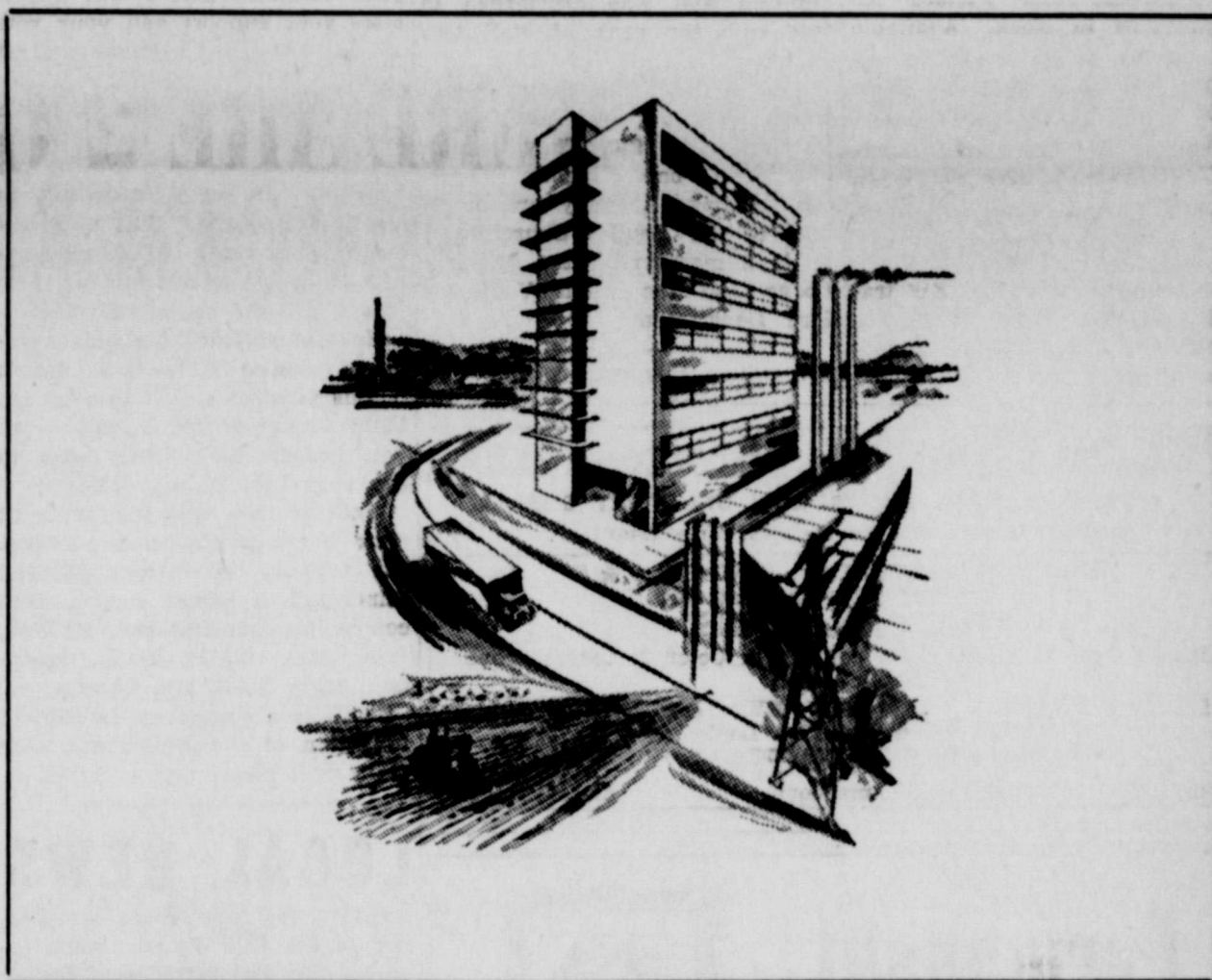
