Forecast for Wednesday night said the mercury would again plummet to 5-10 degrees in this area. Barometric pressure in all the central part of the United States was unusually high this week, and was blamed with the exceedingly cold weather.

In other sections of Texas, the Panhandle reported sub-zero reading, while the Rio Grande Valley had weather below the freezing mark, endangering the fruit and vegetable crops of that area.

No real relief from the cold weather is forecast before the weekend. Thursday was supposed to be a little warmer than Wednesday.
