SALARY INCREASES VOTED The Coke County Commissioners Court voted to raise the salaries for the offices of Justice of the Peace in Precincts 1 and 2 and to raise the salaries of constables in Precincts 1 and 2. The amount of annual increase for these officers is \$300.00 per year. This brings the total annual salary for the Justice of the Peace in both precincts in Coke County to \$2,100 per year and the Constable salaries in both precincts to \$1,800 per year.


