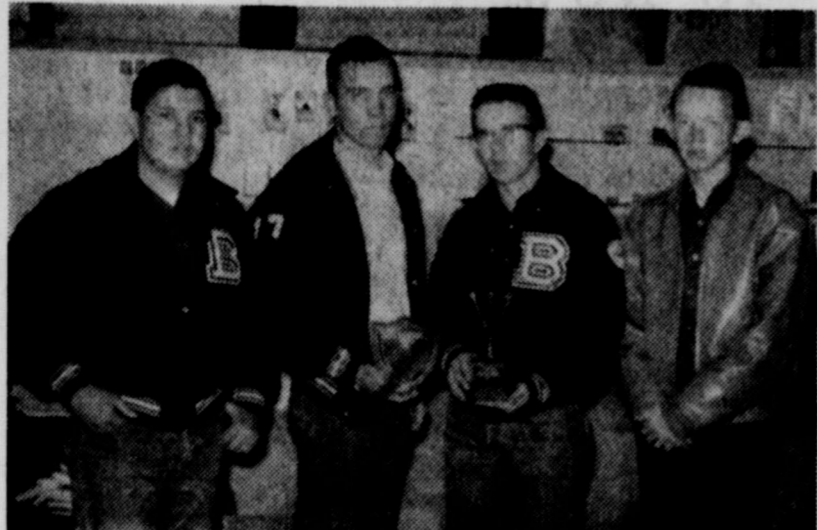

Livestock Team Wins Third Place In Angelo Contest

Bronte FFA's livestock judging team won third place in the overall contest held at San Angelo last Saturday. The team, made up of Jerry Roach, Greg Whalen, Russell Brown and Malcom Johnson, also was awarded a plaque for placing second in judging of sheep. The team is coached by Bronte vocational agriculture teacher, J. T. Henry.

A total of 67 teams entered the contest. Fredericksburg FFA team was first place winner in the competition, and Llano 4-H Club team won second place honors.

Henry said the Bronte team will enter at least four contests during the next few weeks. Team members will enter a contest at San Angelo College Saturday; on Mar. 24, they will go to Sweetwater; April 7 will find them at a contest at Sul Ross College in Alpine; and they will go to Lubbock on April 28 for a contest at Texas Tech.

Henry said his team is hopeful of bringing home more honors from future contests.

Rex Allen, Western Star, Visits Bronte

Rex Allen, western star of movies and TV, paid a brief visit to Bronte last Thursday while his show was in San Angelo with the San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo. With him were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Horrace E. Allen, of Benson, Arizona. They visited in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rome Richards, who accompanied them on a tour of the Fort Chadbourne area. Horrace Allen, cousin of Richards, is a native of that area and spent his childhood and early teens here. He moved to Arizona in 1915.

The Allens and Richards toured the remains of old Fort Chadbourne on the Wylie Ranch, the old Chadbourne cemetery and visited Horrace Allen's birthplace. It was the first visit of Rex Allen to the scene of his father's childhood.

Mr. and Mrs. Allen returned on Friday and the Richards accompanied them to Maryneal where the rock walls of an old "half dug-out", in which Allen lived when he was seven years old, are still standing.

Lions Broom Sale Will Be Held Here Saturday, Mar. 17

Annual Broom Sale by Bronte Lions Club will be held Saturday. The event has been held here the past several years, and is used by the Lions Club as a method of making money for local projects and also as a help to the blind people who make the products which are for sale.

Known over the entire area for their quality products, the blind persons who make the merchandise work with the Texas Light-house for the blind.

The event is known as a Broom Sale, but many other high grade items will be for sale, as well as brooms. Included are rubber door mats, lawn rakes, ironing board covers, mops, dish rags and many other items. A complete list of the merchandise for sale appears in an ad in this week's Enterprise. It is designed so customers may check the items they wish to purchase.

The large van which carries the items for sale will be parked on Main Street in front of the First National Bank. In addition to selling from the truck, members of the Lions Club will make a house to house canvass in town.

D. K. Glenn, president of the Bronte Lions Club, urged local citizens to support the Broom Sale. He said, "I know of no better way for us to help the blind than to buy this merchandise. At the same time you will be helping the Lions and yourself, for every item we will have for sale is of top quality."

7" Snow Covers Bronte Area

A beautiful snow covered the Bronte area with a blanket of white Wednesday morning. Up to press time the snowfall measured up to seven inches.

The snow was high in moisture content and farmers and ranchers

were of the opinion that it would do the land a lot of good. Moisture has been badly needed in this area for some time. Many good stands of small grain have died from lack of moisture and severe cold weather.

The snowfall started in the early morning hours Wednesday and continued all morning. Skies became lighter and the snow flakes were diminishing in size at noon. Local temperature was standing at 37 degrees at 1 p. m. and a lot of the snow had melted, particularly on streets where traffic ran over it.

A report from Blackwell said five inches of snow had fallen there by 10 a. m.

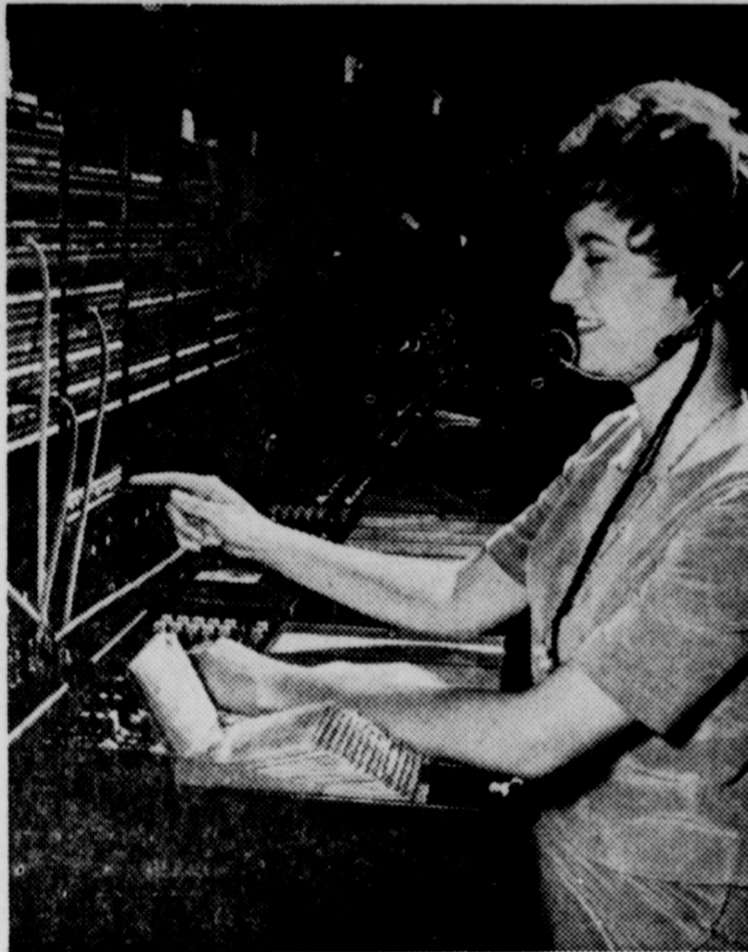

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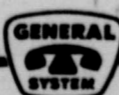

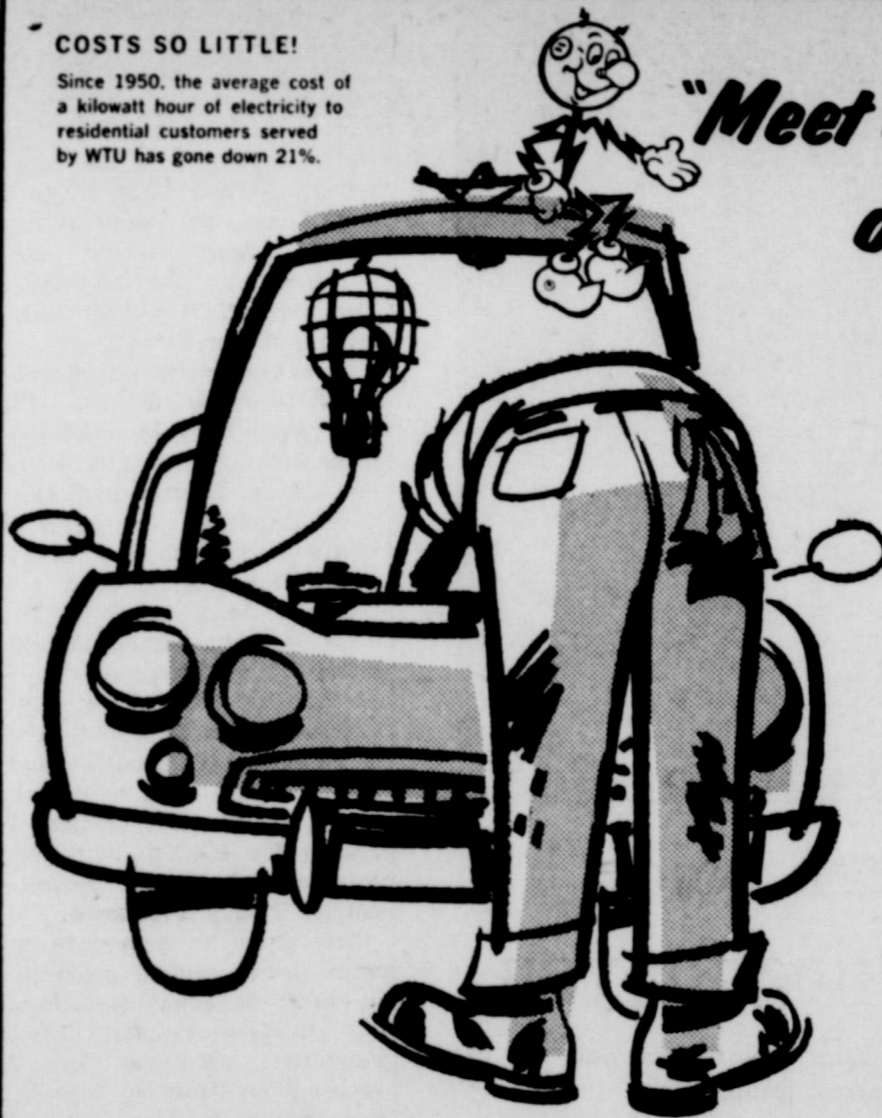
