## District Track Meet Saturday At San Angelo

Bronte and Robert Lee are favored to win the district track meet being held Saturday at Central High campus in San Angelo. Bob Howard, Longhorn coach, is director of the meet and plans to take a good representation of local boys. Bronte is defending champion of the meet and will be trying for the third win, a feat not ever before accomplished by Bronte. Coach Howard felt confident the locals would take their share of the honors and he expects Christoval and Mertzon to show some real competition.

Preliminaries begin at 9:30 a. m. Saturday with finals starting at 2:00 p. m. The district is composed of Bronte, Robert Lee, Christoval, Mertzon, Miles, Wall and Barnhart.

Dee Arrott, still hampered with a knee injury, will defend his 440 yard dash championship. Tommy Boecking is defending champion of the 880 yard run and will try to hold his title. The Bronte team holds a record in the 440 yard relay and hopes to better the time in this run.

First and second place teams in the meet will go to regional meet at Odessa April 14.

### Track Meet Last Week

In a track meet at San Angelo last Friday and Saturday, local boys made some placings, but did not bring in any first place ribbons.

A relay team composed of Buddy Walker, Barry Curlee, Rudy Olivas and Dee Arrott placed 4th in the 880 yard relay and 5th in the 440 yard relay. Jim Morrow tied for third in the high jump, and Jimmy Wells placed 6th in low hurdles.

Tony Montez, Buddy Walker, Barry Curlee and Tommy Boecking composed the 6th place sprint relay team. Rudy Olivas, Bobby Allen, Tony Montez and Tommy Boecking placed 6th in the mile relay.

Two Bronte girls won first place honors in their division in the district tennis meet held in San Angelo Tuesday. ## Stephenson, Kemp, Caperton, Lockett Win in City Election

Bronte voters gave their city council a vote of confidence in Tuesday's city election, returning two incumbents and one former member to two year terms on the city's governing body. Mayor J. A. Stephenson, who was running unopposed, received almost 100 per cent endorsement for another two year term. A total of 125 votes were cast.

Winning spots on the council were Billy Joe Lockett, who has not served the past two years, Matthew Caperton and Cecil

Kemp, both running for re-election. The three defeated J. O. Pitts and Clark Glenn. Joe McCutchen is the retiring councilman.

Lockett was high man in the council race with 95 votes. He was followed by Caperton with 86 and Kemp with 74. Pitts received 64 and Glenn 46. Mayor Stephenson counted 120 votes.

A scattering of write-ins gave James Wells two votes and Mary Spencer one tally for council spots; Ben Oglesby received three

and Royce Lee one vote for mayor.

The election was held at the city hall with Noah Pruitt Sr. serving as election judge.

Holdover councilmen are C. E. Bruton and Royce Fancher.

Vaughan New Robert Lee Mayor

Chevrolet dealer Robert Vaughan was elected mayor of Robert Lee Tuesday. W. D. McAdams, retiring mayor, did not seek re-election.

Freeman C. Clark and Vaughan S. Davis were named new members of the Robert Lee City Commission. J. E. Quisenberry was the unsuccessful candidate.

Retiring city commissioners in Robert Lee were Curtis Walker and W. H. Robertson, neither of whom sought re-election.

## School Trustee Election Sat.

A trustee election will be held in Bronte Independent School District Saturday, to name two members to the school board. Three candidates are listed on the ballot for the two spots.

Running for trustee are A. E. Bell Jr., Hurlin Lee and Edward Cumbie. Lee and Cumbie are presently serving on the board.

Bell is a rural mail carrier; Lee is operator of a feed and farm supply store and Cumbie is representative in this area for Texas Farm Bureau and is engaged in ranching.

Voting places will be set up at the city hall in Bronte and at Tennyson. D. K. Glenn will be election judge for the Bronte box and Mrs. Tom Green for the Tennyson box. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

School board members whose terms run another year are C. O. Richards, Joe Rawlings, Allen Sherrod, Bob Wilson and Bill Thomas.

Also holding trustee elections Saturday will be Robert Lee school where Raymond McCutchen, Teddy Pitcock and Glenn Waldrop are seeking reelection; new candidates are Sam Williams

and Frankie Percifull. Three trustees will be elected from the five.

Silver school will elect two trustees. Only the incumbents, Arch Mathers and J. P. Jameson, are candidates.

D. O. King of precinct 3 and Hale Kincaid of precinct 1 are unopposed for spots on the county school board. Precincts 2 and 4 do not vote on county trustees this year.

## Rainy Weather Greets Residents

Residents of the area awakened to gloomy drizzly weather Wednesday morning. Intermittent slow-falling showers fell throughout the morning and farmers and ranchmen were hopeful they would continue.

## Deposits Increase Over Year Ago at First Nat'l Bank

Deposits at First National Bank in Bronte on March 26 showed a slight increase over the amount on deposit a year ago. The increase, approximately \$6,000, was from \$2,525,982.64 on April 12, 1961, to \$2,531,918.72 on March 26. The bank showed a slight decrease from the amount on deposit at the end of 1961. At the bank call Dec. 20, 1961, there was \$2,635,129.61 on deposit.

Loans of the First National amounted to \$884,560.14 on March 26, compared with \$825,519.20 a year ago, and \$867,996.06 at the end of 1961.

The bank's capital accounts swelled \$25,242.00 over a year ago. The capital structure of the bank is made up of capital stock, surplus account and undivided profits. The profits account jumped to \$103,218.31 on March 26, compared with \$77,976.31 a year ago. This jump raised the capital accounts to a whopping \$302,218.31.

Total assets of the bank on March 26 amounted to \$2,835,137.03, an increase of \$31,178.08 over the \$2,803,958.85 total for a year ago.

The complete report of the First National Bank is being published in this week's Enterprise, and was made at the call of the Comptroller of the Currency.

## Firemen Start Drive for Funds To Purchase New Tank Truck

Members of the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department are opening a drive this week to raise money to purchase a new tank truck for the area served by the department. Approximately \$4300 is needed to purchase the kind of truck the firemen want to buy.

Primary purpose of the new truck, which will be a tank pumper, is to fight grass and rural fires. It will also be available for use in town.

Fire Chief Billy Joe Lockett said in announcing the drive "We have been needing another truck for a long time, but this year the large number of grass fires has made the need much greater. We can all imagine what would happen here in Bronte if a fire broke out and our one fire truck was 15 miles or so out in the country fighting a grass fire."

All taxpayers and others whose names the firemen have been able to obtain are being sent letters this week announcing the plan to raise the necessary funds. Present plans are to ask each land owner or operator to pay 3c per acre and for city residents to pay 10c for each \$100 of property val-

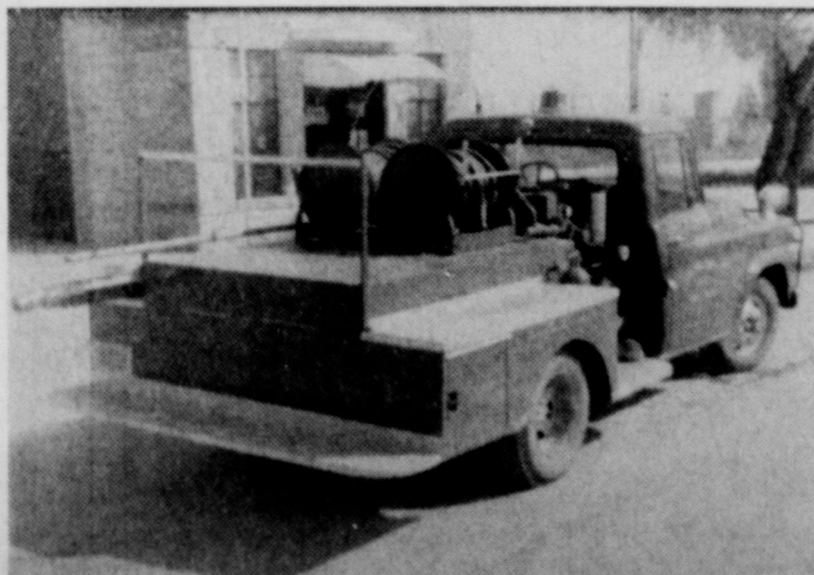
uation as it appears on the city tax rolls.

"If everybody will pay this small assessment," Lockett said, "It won't hurt anybody much, and we will be able to buy the equipment so badly needed."

Firemen said the period of expected usefulness of such a truck as they are interested in acquiring is 15 years. By using the truck for that length of time, the

annual cost for the added protection would be only \$300 per year, they pointed out. "This truck could pay for that yearly cost at one fire," the fire chief said.

I see by the papers where them stockpile officials in Washington has sold another 58,000 pounds of Chinese feathers. This feller J. G. Was they using 'em fer pillows, fer mattresses, or was they just making swivel chair cushions out of 'em fer the stockpiling officials to set on?

It was voted, Mister Editor, fer you to git a letter off to our Congressman and see if he can clear up these little details. But the fellers don't want you to git nasty with him about the matter. As somebody pointed out, some improvements is being made already in this situation. This feller said he was reading a piece in the papers where we had enough strategic materials stockpiled in

1959 to fight four wars, and now we got it down to three wars. He allows as how this is real progress and you should give our Congressman a pat on the back fer this accomplishment of our Government. But one thing was worrying him and he wished you'd ask our Congressman about it. Back in 1959 when we was stockpiled fer four wars, the storage on these items was costing us only \$13 million a year, and now, when we're down to three wars, it's running \$14 million.

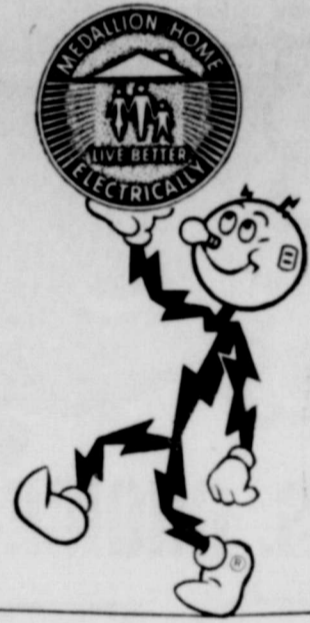

**Tractor Course  
To Be Held Here**

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held Apr. 16-20 under the sponsorship of the Bronte High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to C. B. Barbee, superintendent and J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher.

Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A. & M. College, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A. & M. College in 1956.

Wiedemann, a native of Mission, received his B. S. degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A. & M. College in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Company of Mission, and while serving 24 months active duty with the U. S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

"Outstanding success" has been the words associated with the tractor maintenance short course taught by Wiedemann, according to Hulan Harris area supervisor of vocational agriculture of Big Spring. Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through J. T. Henry's office.

The course will begin Apr. 16 at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building.

While the course is in progress, Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call Henry. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Tractor Maintenance Short Course Certificates will be presented to all who attend all of the training sessions.

Mr. Wiedemann states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Wiedemann will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life. Throughout the short course emphasis will be placed on "Learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All students will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on these tractors. Safety during both maintenance and actual operation will also be included in this course.

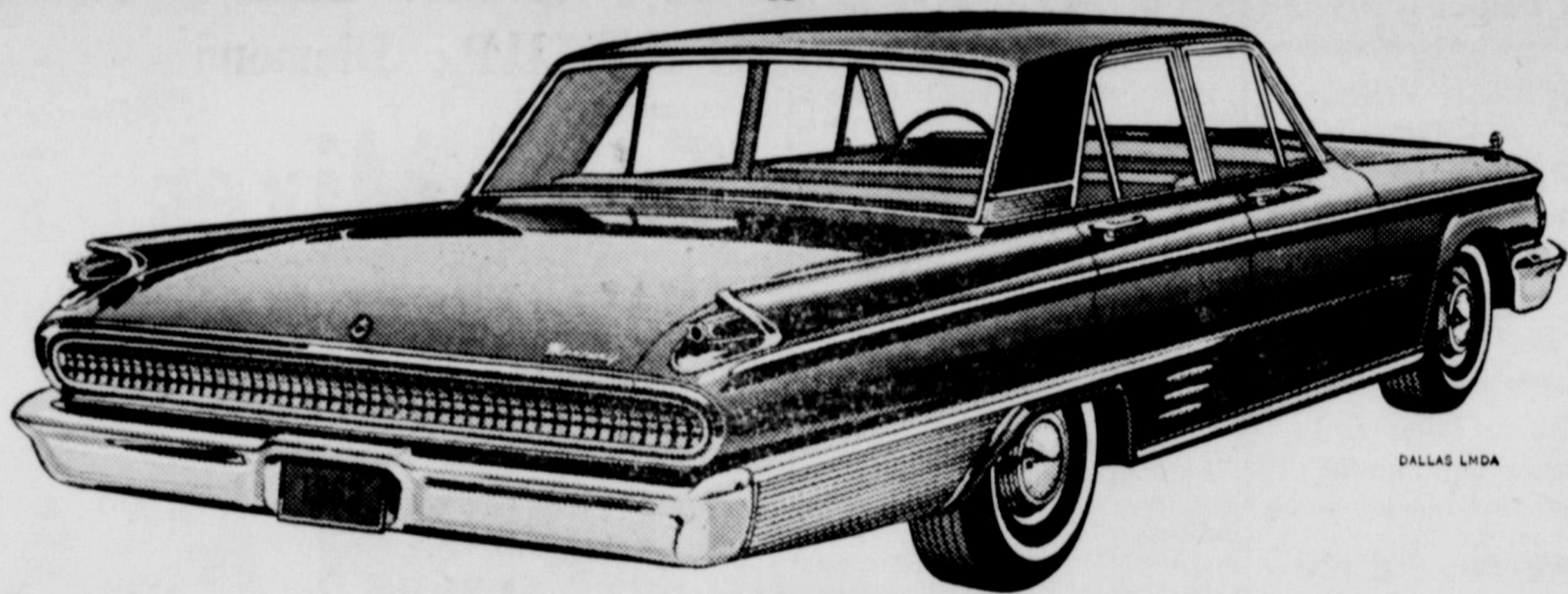

Leroy Elliott, government trapper, trapping for the Coke County Trappers' Association and Coke County, reported taking two bobcats, one coyote, three red fox and approximately 40 varmints during the past two months. He has traps in five locations in the county at the present time. He recently removed traps from three locations and has answered six other calls on problems during the period.

Some predators are killing livestock, but the situation is not as alarming as some anticipated for this time of the year. The decreased rabbit numbers caused us to anticipate having an increased damage from predators. Luckily no wanton killer has cropped up in the county. The losses have been systematic as a whole.

I received a Texas Fruit report during the weekend that included the following quotation: "The peach crop in all sections of Texas has been seriously reduced, but the amazing point is that there is some fruit left in all areas."

The report applies to commercial production of peaches, but it pretty well sums up the situation in Coke County. Our home fruit crop will be extremely light, but it is amazing that there will be some to harvest.

We have been asked to help make all producers aware of a six step program to help battle screw worms. Officials of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and USDA personnel have requested that farmers and ranchers:

1. Inspect all livestock frequently, paying particular attention to the navels of newborn animals, a favorite site for the screw worm.
2. Collect 10 maggots from every infested animal, place maggots in a container of alcohol or water and immediately notify the County Agricultural Agent.
3. Do not move animals from any area unless all wounds are treated with Korlan screwworm smear.
4. Do not move animals out of counties where screw worms have been reported until the animals have been sprayed with Co-Ral or Korlan in accordance with instructions on the label and all wounds treated with Korlan smear.
5. Do not accept or move animals from other states where screw worms may exist unless the cattle dealer, buyer, hauler or owner inspects and treats all animals at origin as indicated above.
6. Remain alert to all information released through newspapers,

television and radio or the county agent's office concerning the screw worm status in the county or state so as to prevent screw worm infested animals from entering a community.

### Ballinger Man Dies Near Here

A 59-year-old Ballinger dirt contractor, Jim Berry, died here last Friday while enroute to Bronte Hospital after apparently suffering a heart attack. Berry was at work clearing land on the C. O. Wylie ranch when he became ill. He shut off the tractor he was operating and then apparently collapsed. A ranchworker called an ambulance. He was dead on arrival at the hospital. Justice of the Peace J. T. Lyles said Mr. Berry was stricken about 5 p. m.

Services were held at 3 p. m. Sunday at the Ninth Street Church of Christ in Ballinger with burial in Crews cemetery.

He is survived by his wife; one son and one daughter; five brothers and three sisters.
