Science Fair Saturday To Show Work of Many Local Students

The third floor of Bronte High School became a beehive of activity this week after not being used for some time. The third floor of the building is being used for the school's Science Fair which

will be open to the public Saturday. Hours for visitors to view the exhibits are from 8:30 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Science classes in both high school and the elementary grades

have been busy preparing projects to be on exhibit at the fair. Awards will be given for first, second and third places in senior individual projects, senior biological individual, junior high individual, and elementary individual. First and second place ribbons will be given for the senior physical group and senior biological group exhibits. A first place ribbon will be given for the best room project in the elementary grades.

Everything from a dissected rattlesnake to a solar motor can be seen at the fair. Then there are live snakes, a volcano that really erupts, a dehumidifier that draws water out of the air, and many other projects that will be of interest to residents of this area. Clint Low, who is head of the school's science department, is in charge of the fair. Assisting him is John Boyles, science instructor.

Every high school science student is required to have a project on exhibit at the fair, and elementary students may enter an exhibit if they wish. A large number of the younger boys and girls have created exhibits which will be ready for the public to see.

The Science Fair this year is the most extensive project of this kind ever attempted by the local science department. Hundreds of hours of work by students and instructors have gone into preparation of the projects.

School officials issued a cordial invitation to everyone to attend on Saturday.

Hearty approval of the work was voiced Tuesday night when those present at the PTA meeting were given a preview showing of the Fair.

County Agents News Column

I want to mention in the beginning the coming of Dr. Gartman which is covered elsewhere in the paper—just to reemphasize how fortunate we are to be able to have Dr. Gartman meet with us. 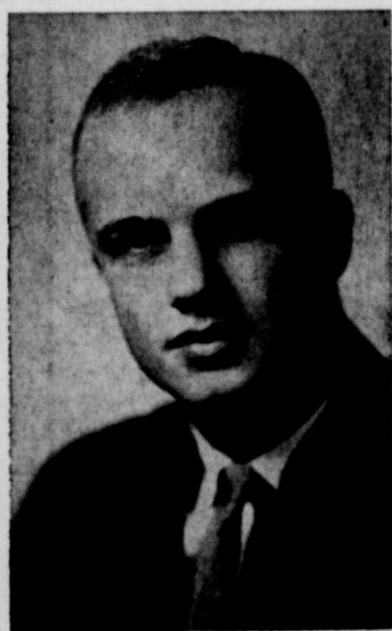
Joe Rawlings dropped by the office the other day and reported two red fox killed by Mr. Elliott that he had not included in his report. The fox strayed some distance before dying and had not been found when the report was made.

Something that may eventually be a boon to the sheep industry is the work being done to isolate and identify the flavor components of lamb meat. Research in this field has revealed that the flavor comes from the fat, probably from minor constituents called carbonyls.

Last year each person in the United States ate 86.7 pounds of beef; he is expected to eat 87 pounds in 1962. The per capita consumption of pork was 63.0 pounds last year and should rise to 63.5 pounds in 1962. What about lamb and mutton? Each person ate 5.1 pounds in 1961 and is expected to do away with 4.7 pounds this year.

If the flavor causing substances, and they apparently are the major controlling factor of lamb consumption, can be altered, removed or modified, it sounds reasonable to expect lamb consumption to increase. Animal Research Service chemists believe they will be able to find the compounds responsible for the characteristic taste of lamb.

The soil temperature should be approaching the point where authorities will recommend planting cotton—60 to 80 degrees three mornings in a row at 7 a.m. at their temperature range, cotton seed will properly sprout. Through regular temperature checks, the earliest suggested planting date can be found. I plan to do some checking during the next two weeks.

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Bronte Takes 1st Place In IL Literary Events

Bronte High School students slipped by contestants from Barnhart last Friday to win first place in the District Literary Meet held at San Angelo College. The Bronte contestants achieved a total of 87½ points to take first place honors.

Barnhart was second with 86 points; Mertzon, third with 82½; Robert Lee, fourth, 74; Miles, fifth, 73; Wall, sixth, 20; Christoval, seventh, 15 points.

Winning first place honors and stacking up the most points were: Patsy Woods and Jimmy Wells in extemporaneous speaking and Marilyn Glenn and Ida Lee Park-

er in debate.

The Elementary School Meet, held on the same day, found Bronte in fourth place, with 29 points. Robert Lee was high pointer with 56; Mertzon, second with 35; Christoval, third, 31; Miles, fifth, 13; Wall, sixth, 12; Barnhart, seventh, with no points. No first place honors were taken by the local grade schools boys and girls.

High school students who placed high enough to be eligible to enter the regional meet this weekend in Odessa included: Marilyn Glenn and Ida Lee Parker, first in debate; Jimmy Wells and Patsy Woods, first in extemporaneous speaking; Johnnie Sims, third in shorthand; Bobby Allen, second in science; Margie Oglesby, second in ready writing. Laura McGuire will go as an alternate in shorthand, having won fourth place and Charles Coppock will serve as alternate in slide rule, as he was third place winner.

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Longhorns Win 2nd In Dist. Track Meet

Some outstanding performances, including one record-breaker, gave Bronte High School athletes second place in the District 83-B track meet last Saturday at San Angelo. Robert Lee came in ahead of the Longhorns to take top honors. The Steers came up with 137½ points to 121½ for the Longhorns.

Coach Bob Howard said he was particularly impressed with the record-breaking 220 yard dash of Barry Curlee and the first place win in high jumping by freshman Jim Morrow. Curlee also tied the record of 10.3 set in 1951 by Gerald Sandusky for the 100 yard dash. Curlee's new 220 yard record was 22.8 seconds. Morrow's first place high jump was 5 feet 10½ inches.

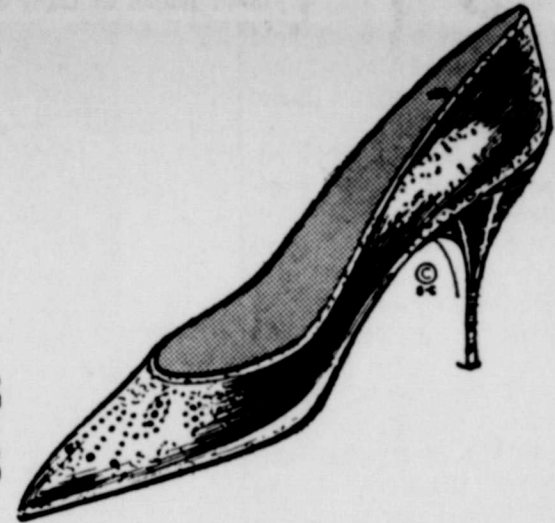

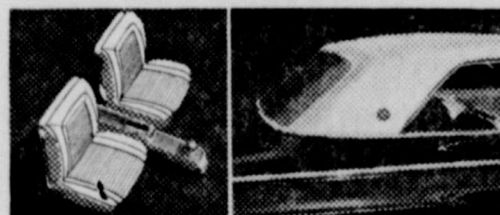

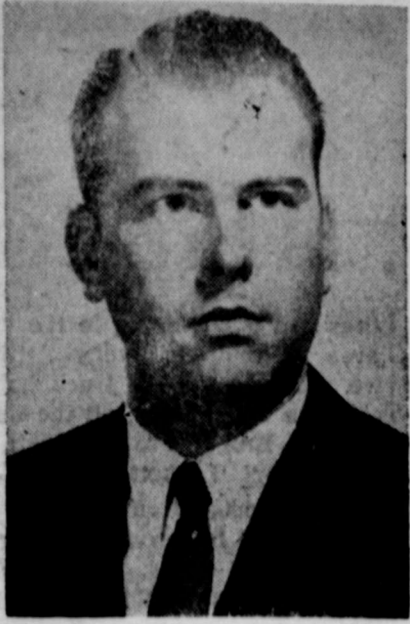

Tractor Course To Be Held Here Starting April 16

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will start next Monday under the sponsorship of the Bronte Vocational Agriculture Department, according to C. B. Barbee, school superintendent, and J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher. The course will continue through April 20.

Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A. & M. College, will be the instructor. His headquarters is at Texas A. & M. College.

Wiedemann is a native of Mission and received his B. S. degree in agricultural engineering from Texas A. & M. in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Company at Mission, and while serving with the U. S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

"Outstanding success" were the words used to describe the tractor maintenance short course taught by Wiedemann, according to Hulan Harris, area supervisor of vocational agriculture of Big Spring. Arrangements for the adult education short course in this and in other fields are made through the office of J. T. Henry.

Classes will be held at 7 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building.

While the course is in progress, Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call Henry. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Tractor Maintenance Short Course Certificates will be presented to all who attend all the training sessions.

Wiedemann states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and igni-

tion. Wiedemann will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life. Throughout the short course emphasis will be placed on "Learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All students will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on these tractors. Safety during both maintenance and actual operation will also be included in this course.

J. T. Henry urged all area residents who are interested to contact him. "This is a good course," he said, "and will be worth the time for anybody who works with tractors."

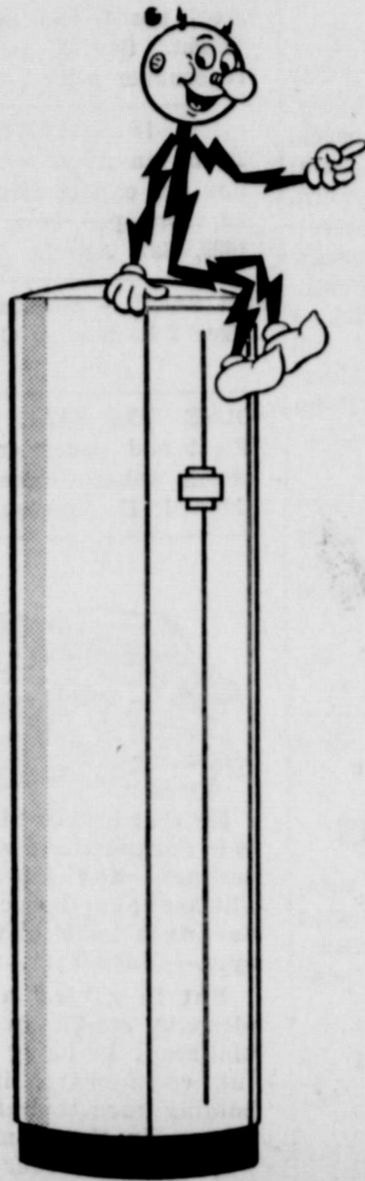

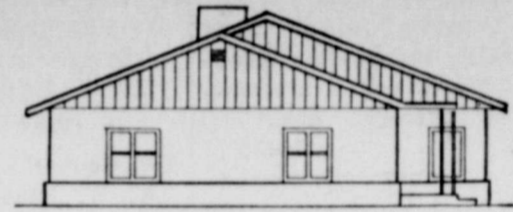

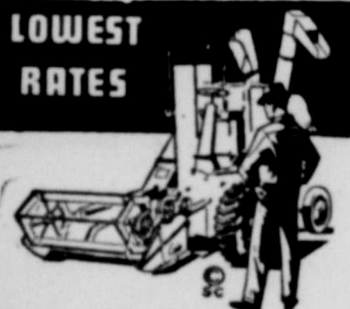

Firemen Drive for New Truck Is Started

Bronte Volunteer Fire Department has its drive for funds to buy a new fire truck in full swing this week. Letters have been mailed out to all taxpayers and others whose names were available asking for a contribution to the fund. Up to Wednesday morning a total of \$114.40 had been received.

The firemen want to purchase a new tank truck that will cost approximately \$4,300 completely equipped. Primary need for the new truck is to fight rural and grass fires where a plentiful water supply is not available.

Dolan Mackey, president of the fire department, urged everyone to contribute the assessment asked for purchase of the new truck. Land owners and operators are being asked to give 3 cents per acre and city residents are asked to give 10 cents per \$100 valuation of their property as it appears on the tax rolls.

Fire Chief Billy Joe Luckett said the department is afraid of a fire breaking out in town when the present truck is several miles out in the country fighting grass

fires and other blazes in the rural area of the community. "When we take our present truck out on a run in the country, all the buildings in Bronte are left with no protection," Luckett said.

Mackey pointed out that the fire truck would be serviceable for an estimated 15 years. At this rate, the annual cost would be less than \$300 per year. "One fire could cost more than that amount," he said. "I want to urge everyone to get a contribution in as soon as possible," he added.

The firemen have asked The Enterprise to serve as the place to make contributions to the fire truck fund. Anyone who wishes to give may leave his money at The Enterprise office or mail it to P. O. Drawer O, Bronte, Texas.
