

cial setup is in good shape, especially when consideration is taken of the great number of improvements the city has made in the last few years.

Brown also told councilmen that the best way to finance the proposed city hall would be to vote a bond issue. The city dads had been hopeful that it would not be necessary to vote bonds, as they already have plans made which will take care of the payment of the debt which will be incurred. Coke County has agreed to rent office space for a justice of the peace and a deputy sheriff, as well as the two jail cells which are

proposed for the building, at a rate not exceeding \$100 per month. This \$100 rental plus the rent which is being paid for the present city hall will make the payments on the new building, the council Allen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. members said.

Brown said it would not be necessary to call a bond vote if the city wanted to issue time warrants to finance the city hall. However, he pointed out that the interest rate would be considerably higher, and probably bids for the school activities.

Mob Present for Big Fish Kill at Oak Creek Lake

Hundreds of people and an estimated 150 boats were on hand last Saturday for the fish kill at Oak Creek Lake. The lake was poisoned with rotenone which paralyzes the fish's gills but does not make them inedible. Thousands of pounds of fish were picked up by the crowd, and many thousands of additional pounds were left on the lake to rot.

The biggest crowd was on hand Saturday, but a great number of people were present Sunday and Monday to pick up the fish as they came to the top of the lake.
