

Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles said he has ruled that the deaths last Tuesday night of two men were accidental. The ruling came after Aubrey Don Denman of Bronte and Fred C. Ohlenbusch of Sweetwater died in a headon collision about six miles south of Bronte. 


