

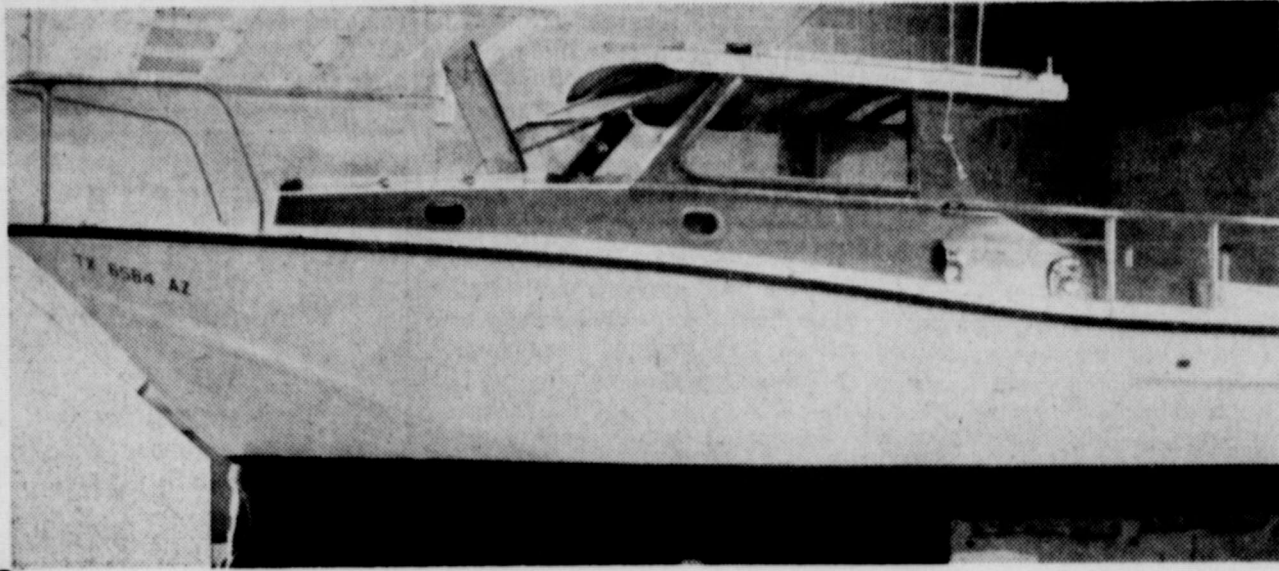

A beautiful red and white boat was hauled out of Bronte last Wednesday. It is on its way to make first contact with water in the Gulf of Mexico.

The boat was built over a period of 13 months by Conda Richards, Charlie Boecking and Royce Lee. It has been named "Cocharo", each syllable being made up of the first letters in each of the men's given names.

The sleek craft is 25 feet and 3 inches long and is 8 feet wide at the widest point. Measurement of its height shows 9 feet and 3 inches from the keel to the top of the cabin. Estimated weight is 5,000 to 6,000 pounds.

Besides their 13 months of labor, the men have put approximately \$4,500 worth of material and equipment into the boat. They figure that a similar rig made in a factory would cost from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

Designed by E. B. Mansfield, a Texas City naval architect, it was planned for a maximum of seaworthiness and safety, with speed a secondary consideration. The men estimated that 22 mph will be top speed for the craft, and 15 to 18 mph will be its best operational speed. They figure it will safely carry four to six persons on fishing expeditions out as far as 75 miles from the coast.

Included among the accommodations on the Cocharo are one bunk, a small bathroom, and cooking facilities. The cabin contains seats and also houses the steering and other operational equipment. The large weather deck on the after part of the vessel is designed as an ideal place from which to fish.

The entire hull of the boat is made of Philippine mahogany, all double planked and placed together with six gallons of glue. 13,000 bronze screws were used in putting the many parts of the boat together. The men said they used everything bronze they could lay their hands on in making the fittings for the boat.

Power plant for the boat is a 195 hp Chrysler inboard motor. Other equipment includes two-way radio, radio direction finder, depth finder, and magnetic compass.

Leaving Wednesday of last week, the owners figured it would take them two days to haul the boat to Galveston, where it was scheduled to undergo a series of tests before putting out to sea. Certain licenses and other approvals had to be obtained from the Coast Guard before it could be launched. Also some of the equipment as not installed until arrival at the coast

1" RAIN

Justice Rules That Deaths Were Accidental

Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles said he has ruled that the deaths last Tuesday night of two men were accidental. The ruling came after Aubrey Don Denman of Bronte and Fred C. Ohlenbusch of Sweetwater died in a head-on collision about six miles south of Bronte. Judge Liles' ruling said the "immediate cause of death was multiple fractures of the head and the entire body" in both cases.

County Agents News Column

I made four spot checks for cotton insects Friday and Monday. The fields checked do not indicate a need for pushing the panic button, but checking at frequent intervals to avoid any surprise build-ups of insects is indicated.

Bollweevils and boll worms were found in all four fields. Weevil damage was light in three of the fields, medium to heavy in the fourth one, north of Bronte.

The boll worm infestations were light in all four fields. But, in one field north of Bronte egg deposits were fairly heavy. In another field, south of Robert Lee, bollworm millers were plentiful.

If we have some showery weather, the bollworms could increase sharply. They could become costly if left unmolested or if weather conditions are not favorable for spraying. A few bollworms left in a field to complete their life cycle, could multiply into damag-

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ing numbers when they produce more larvae.

Checking closely during the next two weeks on their progress and their changes would be time well spent. They have caused heavy damage in some fields east of us. They could do the same here a little later in the season.

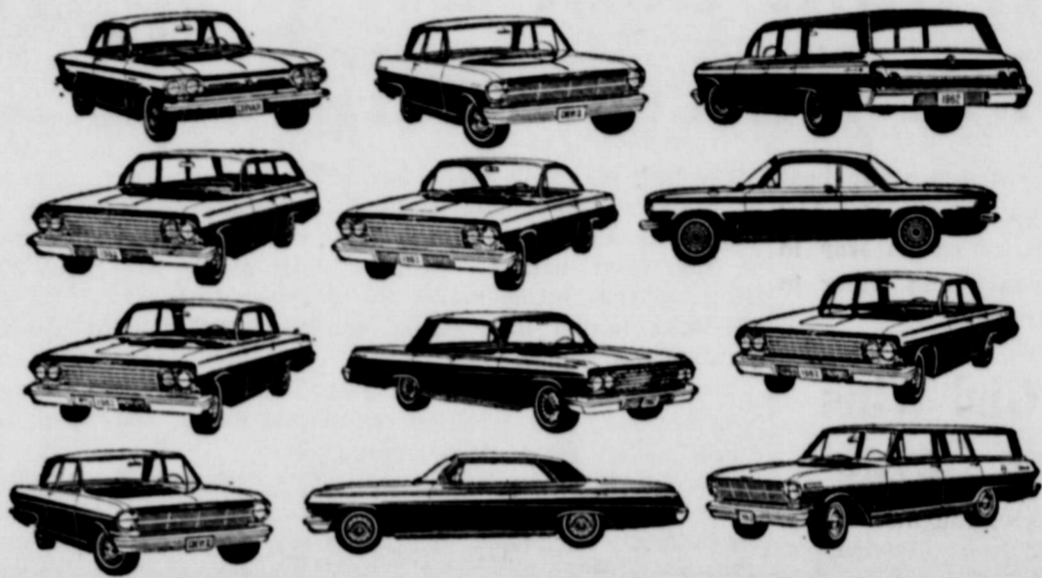

Something you probably have already read, but is of importance to many Coke County operators—shorn wool incentive payments amount to 44.5 per cent of the dol-

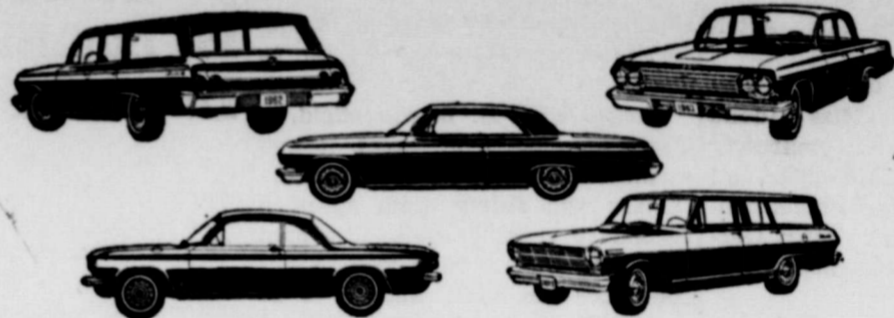
lar returns each producer receives from shorn wool this year. This amount brings the average wool price of 42.9 cents per pound up to the incentive level of 62 cents. The payment rate on unshorn lambs has been announced at 76 cents per hundredweight.

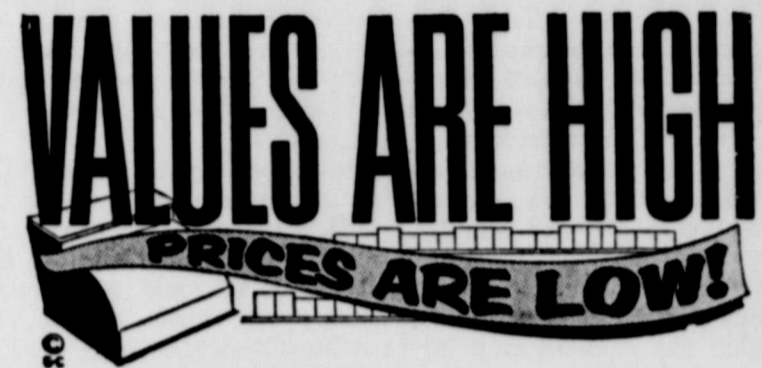

Bridges in Area Being Widened

The Texas Highway Department has announced a construction project on State Highway 158 in Coke and Runnels Counties between 0.6 miles east of Bronte and 3.0 miles west of Ballinger, and on Highway 208 in Coke County between 1.2 and 7.2 miles south of Robert Lee. Work consists of the construction of four new bridges and widening of 14 existing bridges. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, L. R. Bowden of Dallas, stated that construction began July 18, and will be completed by April, 1963.

G. G. Lackey Sr., Resident Engineer, in charge of construction on this project, stated that traffic will be routed through construction or over short detours at the eighteen bridge sites. Although adequate barricades and warning signs will be prominently displayed, motorists should use extreme caution while passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment. A temporary speed zone of 45 m.p.h. has been established by the Texas Highway Commission through the construction area as an additional safety measure and the entire length will be patrolled to minimize inconvenience to motorists. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals and warning signs.
