A Wingate girl can consider herself mighty lucky after being revived from near drowning Monday afternoon at the Bronte swimming pool.

The girl, Linda Brewer, was pulled from the water by lifeguard, Rex Harris, who then gave her mouth to mouth artificial respiration until she began breathing

Aubrey Denman, park and pool caretaker, said Linda had completely stopped breathing when she was rescued. "Rex did a mighty fine job," Denman said. "Things looked pretty bad there for a while," he added, "but Rex kept working with her until she started breathing. We all felt better then."

What are the trends in back-toschool clothes for this fall?

News in little girls' clothes, both dresses and sportswear, is that many will carry names of famous fashion designers of adult wear. This means that they will reflect a definite awareness of current grown-up couture, according to Mrs. Fay Roe, County Home Demonstration agent.

One designer will feature a little jacket outfit which may be done in a variety of fabrics. The skirts may be swirl, flared or done with unpressed pleats while the jackets may be cut-away or squared off. Blouses may feature floppy or tailored bows, and if belts are used they will be wider than last season.

Another important trend will be the "spare" look. Slim Aline shapes, less collars, pleats ple trend. And look for set-in sleeves and princess curves in both dress and sportswear lines.



NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 32 proposing an amendment to
the Constitution of the State of
Texas to authorize the Legislature to
provide for trial de novo on all
appeals to the courts from actions,
rulings or decisions of administrative
agencies and executive departments
of the State of Texas or any of its
political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as

follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its rollitical subdivisions, under departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or trative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the condi-

tions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
