

Kickapoo Church Changes Name to Central Baptist

Members of the Kickapoo Baptist Church in Bronte recently voted to change the name of the church to Central Missionary Baptist Church. The change was made after the church bore the name "Kickapoo" for more than 58 years. It was organized and named Feb. 28, 1904.

The Rev. Wayne N. Stout, pastor of the church, said the change is in name only, as there has been no change in the doctrine and beliefs of the church. The church is a member of the Fairland Missionary Baptist Association, which has a membership of several churches in this area.

Formerly located four miles north of Bronte, the church moved into town and built a new sanctuary in 1955. More recently an educational building has been added to the structure. The

church plant now has adequate space for all Sunday School classes, a modern kitchen and fellowship hall and a spacious sanctuary. The building is air conditioned.

Mr. Stout submitted information for the short history of the church which follows.

The Kickapoo Baptist Church had 16 charter members when it was organized in 1904. None of the original 16 is now living. The infant organization was named for the Kickapoo Creeks and Kickapoo Mountains in this area. The Rev. J. C. Johnson served as temporary moderator during the organization and was later called as first pastor. J. L. Scott was the first clerk.

First meetings of the group were held in the school building at Bronte. On April 8, 1905, the congregation met in a new building for the first time. It was located near the present Bronte School. Some time about 1915, the church building was sold and the congregation held services in the Union School north of town. A new building was completed in 1924 and it burned in the spring of 1926. That fall another new building was erected, located about four miles north of Bronte. It was used until 1955 when the present building was completed in town.

During some short periods during the past 58 years the church has been without a pastor, but listed below are the names of the men who have served the church and the years they were here:

J. C. Johnson, 1904-06; D. W. White, 1906-07; P. C. Shilling, 1907-08; T. S. Barron, a few months in 1908; W. N. White, 1910-12; M. T. Priddy, 1912-13; T. D. Muddock, 1913-16; J. A. Branaman, 1920-32; J. O. McCaleb, 1932-33; C. L. Carroll, 1933-45; L. L. Griffin, 1946-47; Wayne N. Stout, 1947 for several months; E. L. Thurman, 1949-1950; W. A. Reeves, 1950-52; C. W. Coleman, 1952-55; R. W. Blackmon, 1955-62; Wayne N. Stout, 1962 to the present.

Royce Lee, new president of the Bronte Longhorn Club, has called a meeting of all football boosters in the area Thursday night at the local gridiron. Purpose of the meeting is to do some clean-up work around the football field and stands.

A work night Monday produced good results, Lee said, but there is more work that needs to be done. Everyone who can come out and help with the clean-up is asked to bring a hoe and rake with him.

Lee was elected president of the booster club at a meeting last Thursday night. Bob Wilson was named vice president and Marvin Bryant is new secretary-treasurer. Dues were set at \$5.00 per year for a man and his wife, and at \$4.00 for one person.

A drive is currently underway to add new members to the roster of the club. The organization's main function is to instill the football spirit into every member of the community. It also helps the team in any way possible, such as footing the bill for equipment or material not provided by the school. One of the big expenses of the club is paying for filming of all the football games. These films have proved, in past years, to be of great value.

Lee urged everyone in the community to join the Longhorn Club, and to take an active part in its activities. Regular meetings will be held during the coming football season, with comments on each game by the coach, and showing of the film.

All proceeds from the concession stand will go to the Little League teams for the purchase of new uniforms for next season. A collection will also be taken among spectators for this purpose.

The barbecue will begin at 6 p.m. and another large crowd is anticipated. Denman said ladies of the community are asked to bring desserts only. Everything else will be furnished.

Denman said a program may be held following the barbecue but that plans are incomplete at this time.

Firemen's Ball Saturday Night

A big Firemen's Ball will be held at the Tad Richards barn next Saturday night, Aug. 25, beginning at 8 p.m. The Country Ramblers of San Angelo will furnish the music and Slim Willett, of Abilene TV and radio fame, will MC the affair.

Admission will be \$1 and proceeds will be applied on the new fire truck which was recently delivered to the City of Bronte.

Dancing will continue until 1 a.m. A concession stand will also be operated by the firemen.

It is hoped by the department that a large crowd can be drawn from outlying areas, and three local firemen, Dolan Mackey, Buddy Reed and Billy Joe Luckett, appeared on the Harry Holt program on KRBC-TV Monday to help publicize the program.

The Richards barn is well known in the area and has been the scene of many successful entertainments for the March of Dimes and other worthy causes. It was built by the late Mr. Richards especially for entertaining and has a spacious balcony for dancing.

Dolan Mackey, president of the local fire department, issued an invitation to everyone to attend. He said, "Come on out and have a good time at the same time you are purchasing fire protection for yourself."

Flares will be set up along the Winters highway north of Bronte, lighting the way to the Richards barn for those who are not familiar with the road.

County Agents News Column

This has been the year of the unpredictable and the extremes as far as our weather is concerned.

Despite our numerous misses and low yearly total of moisture, our area looks much better than some others. We had good moisture as a whole to start the pastures, but did not have enough spring rains to make things sappy.

As a result, the plants rooted down well and adjusted themselves to the situation.

Two men who had been through the Mason area said it looks bad down there. My sister has continually written me how dry the area is between San Antonio and Laredo. The last rain she had received was during the last week of June, and they were dry when that rain came.

Sterile fly production at the new plant in Mission has now passed the 50 million per week mark, ac-

ording to our latest report. The flies are now being released at the rate of about 800 per square mile in the release area.

They will use 12 planes in dispersing the flies and expect to use 20 planes when the 75 million per week production figure is reached in September.

The production of 50 million sterile flies requires about 75,000 pounds of meat, 35,000 gallons of blood, and 8,712 gallons of water.

The number of worm samples confirmed as screw worms last week in the state was 2,287 cases. In our county I have received reports of 99 cases. Of course this is a very small percentage of the actual cases. One operator has reported finding 482 cases this year.

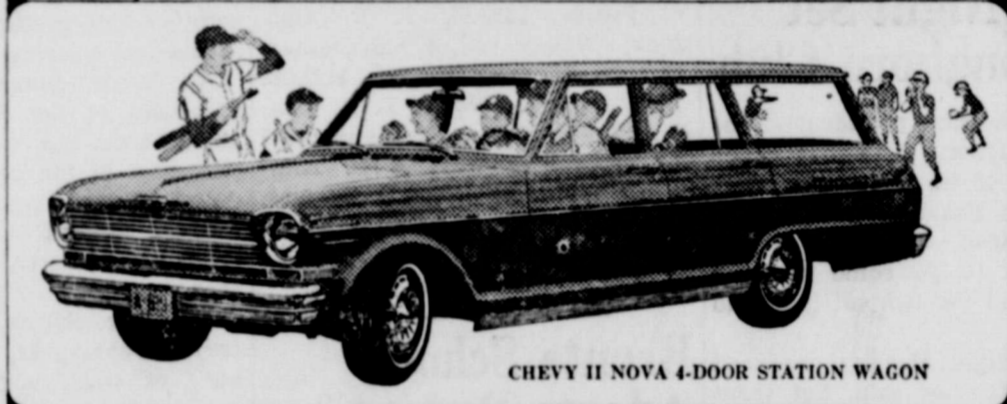

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Complete Publication of Amendments For Voting in November Election

With this issue of the Enterprise concludes the four issues of legal publication of seven of the fourteen amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted on in November. The other seven of the fourteen have been published by the Robert Lee Observer.

They are published as advertising, paid by the state, meeting requirements of publishing all of the amendments in each county.

Following is a summary of the amendments furnished by the Texas Press Association, which handles the distribution of these amendments to the newspapers.

Number Fourteen seems to be arousing the most publicized opposition.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 25)—Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-Seven

Million Dollars (47,000,000) to Fifty-Two Million Dollars (52,000,000).

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and per-

mits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 25)—Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 32)—Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

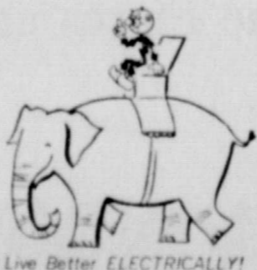

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levying of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49-d authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 49-d, as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for the conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on

State bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the State's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized by said Section 49-c, plus the principal of the obligations incurred under any contracts authorized hereunder, shall not exceed the Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities at a price not less than the direct cost of the purchase of same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the State that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Board of Water Engineers or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water included therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities shall be used to pay principal and interest on State bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on November 6, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-d, providing for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-d, providing for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefit for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, renumbering said Section, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for a permanent and totally disabled person during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 11, providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county; providing for the acquisition of land and properties for hospital uses, as well as the maintenance and operation of the same; and authorizing the issuance of tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements; and further providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county.

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-taxpaying voters who have duly renewed their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of the amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse to hear or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the condi-

tions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 3-b, providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is within Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

that time. They used a small building furnished by the Martinez and Fuentes families.

The Catechists were followed two weeks later by Father Alcuin who was also taking care of the charges at Mertzon, Knickerbocker and Sanitorium. The first Communion class was in 1942 and numbered around 20. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Fuentes furnished generous help for the class and their daughter, Odalia, was a member of that first class.

In 1950 property was purchased here and Father Fidelis, O.F.M., supervised the erection of a church, which was dedicated under the name San Ysidro (St. Isidore) by the late Monsignor Pokluda on June 14, 1951. The building was an old barracks set on cinder blocks and stuccoed on the outside, with a seating capacity of 100. Father Fidelis remained in charge of the mission here until February, 1962, when Father Binversie was placed in charge.

The need for a larger church was evident in 1960 and in 1961 a tract of one-half block was purchased from the Lamesa Corporation. In February, 1962, an appeal was made to the Catholic Church Extension Society in Chicago through the late Archbishop O'Brien. A grant of \$10,000 was approved with the request that the church be named St. James.

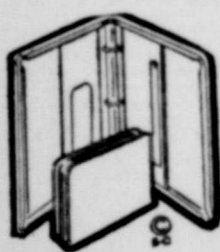
