Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 5 p.m. for T. E. Tidwell, 59, longtime Bronte area resident. He died at 12:40 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 5 in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. He had been in ill health about a year.

Services for Mr. Tidwell will be held at First Baptist Church in Bronte, with the Rev. R. W. Blackmon of Lamesa, former Central Baptist Church pastor, and Rev. C. R. Blake of Welch, former First Baptist pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Fairview cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Theron Emmerson Tidwell was born May 1, 1903, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Emmett Tidwell. He attended school at Miles, and on June 8, 1927, was married at San Angelo to Miss Winnie Hallmark. Mr. Tidwell was a member of the Baptist Church. He was in the ranching business west of Bronte until a few years ago when the family moved into town. The Tidwells were operating a cafe here at the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Theron E. Tidwell Jr. of Lamesa and James A. Tidwell of Bronte; one daughter, Mrs. Douglas Stevens of Wingate; five sisters, Mrs. I. S. Story of Big Lake, Mrs. Raymond Story of Miles, Mrs. T. C. Cook of Miles, Mrs. Carl Rios of Austin, and Mrs. Pearl Neely of San Angelo; three brothers, J. N. Completely new fixtures are being installed in the building. They are not completed yet, but will be in the next few days. His prescription counter is already in place, and the stock of medicines is on hand.

Bronte has been without a prescription service for several months since Wayne Patterson closed the pharmacy. Hurley said he has Patterson's prescription files and can fill any prescription in the files, provided the owner knows the number. He also stated that he will be glad to call any place where local persons have been having their prescriptions filled, to get a copy of the order for medicine.

The Hurleys have already moved to Bronte and are presently living in Leroy Scott's rent house. They have a new home under construction in the southeast part of town which they will move into as soon as it is completed. The Hurley family consists of Mr. and Mrs. Hurley and three children, Jerry, Donna and Melody Holcombe. The children, ages 15, 14 and 11, are enrolled in Bronte schools and Jerry is on the Longhorn football squad. The Hurleys are active in church work.

## 700 Attend Labor Day Barbecue

Over 700 persons invaded Bronte County Park Monday evening for the annual Labor Day barbecue sponsored by business firms and individuals of the city. Aubrey Denman, park caretaker, who was in charge of arrangements, said this year's crowd was the largest ever to attend one of the affairs. "We used over 700 plates and cups, so I would say we had at least 700 people there," he said.

The barbecue was prepared by Pat and Bob Johnson, and was said by many to be "the best they had ever eaten." Supplementing the menu were red beans, vegetable salad, onions, pickles, bread, iced tea and coffee. Desserts were brought by women of the community.

## 276 Students Enrolled In Bronte's Schools

Up to Wednesday noon a total of 276 students had enrolled in the Bronte Schools. This figure was 13 below the 289 enrolled the first week of last year's term. However, the first report last year was made after the first two days

of school instead of one. Supt. C. B. Barbee said he expects the figure to climb to about 305 within the next few days.

The elementary school accounted for 197 of the students, while high school enrollment was 79.

## Season Opener Will See Bronte Vs. Rankin

Bronte's Longhorns will get a chance Friday night to try out the new split-T method of playing football. The formation was introduced to the Longhorns by new Head Coach N. M. Curlee, and will be used in the season's opening game against the Rankin Red Devils.

The game will be played in Rankin and kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Coach Curlee's only comment on the upcoming game was, "We're going to win." Assistant coach John Boyles was not available for comment.

The coach announced the following probable starting lineup for Friday night's contest: Russell Brown and Rudy Phillips, guards; Kenneth Wilkins, center; Ray Sisoms and Charles Coppock, tackles; Greg Whalen and Jim Morrow, ends; Jimmy Wells, quarterback; Tommy Glenn Sims, fullback; Barry Curlee and Malcolm Johnson, halfbacks.

Prices to be in effect for this year's games are \$1.00 for adults, 50 cents for students, and preschool children will be admitted free.

### Band Members Increase

Two buses will run this year to carry band members to football games, Supt. C. B. Barbee announced this week. The band has grown in size to such an extent that one bus will not carry all the members. Buses carrying band members to Rankin will leave at 4 p.m., while the bus carrying the football team will leave at 2:45 p.m., Barbee said. The buses will be routed through San Angelo, west to Big Lake and on to Rankin. Distance to the Red Devil's home is about 130 miles.

The Longhorns have been looking good this week in practice sessions, and last week made a good showing in a scrimmage with the Eden Bulldogs. Another intrasquad scrimmage Saturday gave the footballers a good workout.

Local fans were a little irked this week when the Abilene Reporter News placed the Longhorns in the cellar in district play in pre-season predictions. Sentiment in the local camp seems to be that the Longhorns will not stay in that spot for very long. With only four lettermen returning, the Longhorns will need to do some work before they become a well coordinated team, but the players, coaches and fans don't think it will take long.

The number of students enrolled in each grade is as follows: first, 25; second, 23; third, 18; fourth, 29; fifth, 26; sixth, 22; seventh, 35; eighth, 19; freshmen, 23; sophomores, 24; juniors, 18; seniors 14.

Barbee said he expects the elementary school enrollment to reach 220 and high school to be about 85.

Bronte School again this year is sponsoring a life and accident insurance program for all students. The insurance covers students until July 31, 1963, and provides protection during all school endorsed activities. Cost of the insurance per student is \$3.60, with the school paying \$1.10 and the student \$2.50. Cooperation of all school patrons is asked in this program, Barbee said. The insurance is being carried with Security Life and Accident Co. of Denver, Colo.

The superintendent announced that school pictures will be made Thursday afternoon (today), and said that students should come prepared to have the photos made.

The 1962-63 school term officially got underway Tuesday morning with an assembly at 8:10 a.m.

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## \$76,273.01 Budget Accepted for City

City officials of Bronte, in a special session Tuesday, accepted the budget for the city of \$76,273.01. The budget covers the fiscal year, April 1, 1962, to March 31, 1963.

The above figure is for estimated expenditures and is some \$12,452.99 lower than the estimated receipts of \$88,726.00 for the same period.

The budget is set up into seven funds and is given below with the estimated receipts listed first, followed by estimated expenses:

Waterworks fund: \$27,041.34 and \$26,073.42.

General and Social Security Fund: \$16,623.25 and \$14,223.27.

Sanitary Sewer Fund: \$12,877.67 and \$10,928.12. This fund is set up to retire sewer revenue bonds.

Special Sanitary Sewer Fund, Series 1960: \$8,410.54 and \$3,000.00. This fund is to pay sewer tax bonds.

Contingencies Fund: \$1,700 and no expense is anticipated. This fund is set up to pay any special expense which may arise in connection with the sewer operation.

Building Fund: \$20,600.00 and \$20,575.00.

Fire Dept. Special Account: \$1,473.20. All this money is to be spent toward paying for the new fire truck.

The above listed receipts include money currently coming in and balances left over from the last fiscal year.

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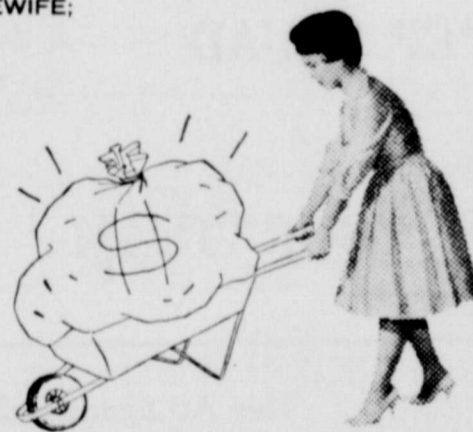

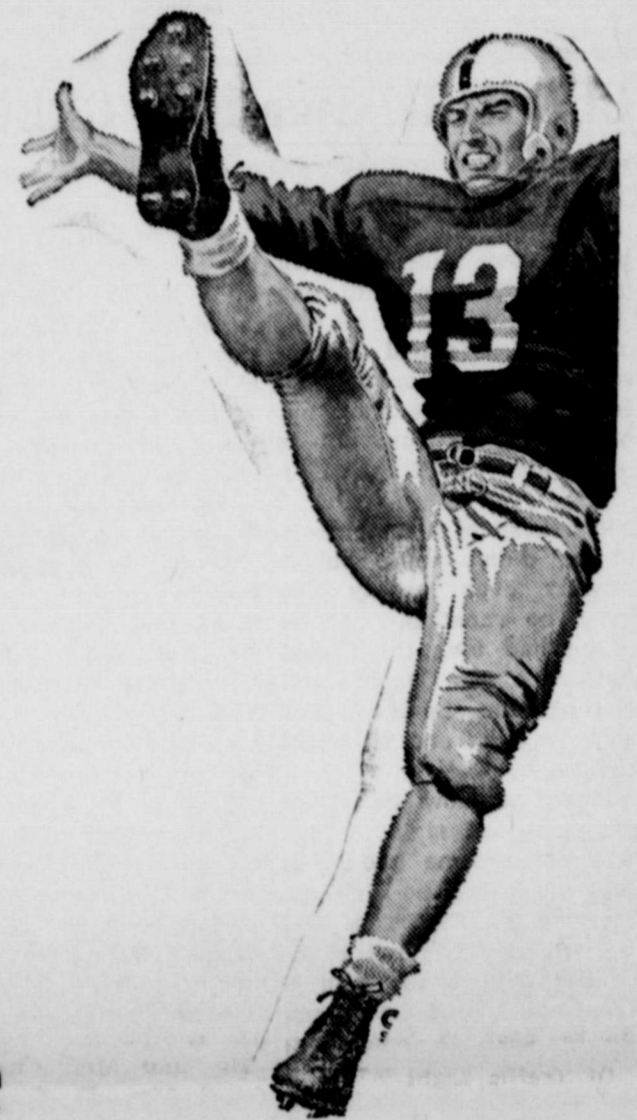
