Melt 1 pound butter or marga rine, mix with $11 / 2$ cups brown su gar, $11 / 2$ cups white sugar, 3 we cinnamon, and juice of $1 / 2$ lemon Sift together 1 tsp. soda and cups flour. Add to mixture. Mix and shape into rolls, wrap in wax ed paper or foil, place on cookie sheet in rolls, refrigerate 12 24 hours. Slice very thin, bake 375 degrees. Note - Cookie dough may be wrapped in foil, froze and kept up to 3 months. Remove from freezer, slice and bake as above.
