I want to give you my favorite Ice Box Cookie Recipe. It is one that has been in my family some 25 years and as yet I've never found one I like any better. It makes a quantity of dough which the field, in camp and at home. makes it even better since it is a timesaver!

ICE BOX COOKIES

Melt 1 pound butter or margarine, mix with 11/2 cups brown sugar, 11/2 cups white sugar, 3 well beaten eggs, 2 cups pecans, 2 tsp. cinnamon, and juice of 1/2 lemon. Sift together 1 tsp. soda and 6 cups flour. Add to mixture. Mix and shape into rolls, wrap in waxed paper or foil, place on cookie sheet in rolls, refrigerate 12 to 24 hours. Slice very thin, bake at 375 degrees. Note - Cookie dough may be wrapped in foil, frozen and kept up to 3 months. Remove above.
