The Bronte Longhorns started out with a bang last Saturday night against the Hermleigh Cardinals, but injuries to some strategic players made the going tough and allowed the Cardinals a 30-6 victory. Bronte's lone counter came after only 1 minute and 55 seconds had elapsed, with Tommy Glenn Sims going from the 18 yard line across the double stripe. Hermleigh managed to get counters over during each of the first three periods.

First Quarter

Tim Winter kicked off to Jimmy Wells on the 35. Eleven plays later Sims made a TD after good yardage was racked up by him and by Wells, Malcom Johnson and Barry Curlee. Try for extra point was no good.

Sims kicked off to Terry Smith on the 15 who ran it back to the 40. The Cardinals did a little better than the Longhorns on their first effort, requiring only 9 carries to reach pay dirt. Their conversion run was no good.

After Hermleigh's kickoff, the Longhorns once again started a steady march downfield, and Sims had made 18 yards for a 1st down on the Hermleigh 34 when the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Johnson, Sims and Royce Lee all made the effort, but they wound up a yard short, so the ball went over. Hermleigh, however couldn't move the ball 15 yards after being penalized 5. Jimmy Kubala punted to the Longhorn 38. Lee, Curlee and Sims carried and made a 1st down on the 48, but then a fumble cost the locals the ball. After 4 tries, Hermleigh punted to the Bronte 21. The Longhorns couldn't make enough yards, after a 15 yard penalty for clipping and Lee punted to the Bronte 43. From there Kubala and Smith took turns carrying the ball down to the 29. On a reverse play, Kubala made the entire yardage for the second Cardinal touchdown. A pass from J. B. Robertson to Dane Hudnall was good for two extra points. Hermleigh got a kickoff and Bronte ran two plays before the end of the first half.

Third Quarter

Olivas kicked off for the Longhorns and the Cardinals started another touchdown drive. With a 2nd down and goal to go on the 11, Smith took the ball the entire distance to another TD. Paul Kimsey ran for 2 points and the score stood at 22-6.

On the first play after kickoff, the Longhorns suffered a fumble, and Hermleigh recovered and started goalward again. In spite of heavy penalties, the Cardinals moved the ball for a 1st on the Bronte 11. Kimsey carried twice to get over the goal line. A pass from Robertson to Hudnall was good for two points, making the count read 30-6.

Fourth Quarter

The final stanza saw no scoring in spite of some pretty exciting football. The Longhorns stopped the Cardinals one time on the 1 yard line to end a scoring threat. Also in the closing minutes of the game, Tony Reyes intercepted a Cardinal pass on the 8 yard line.

Frank Burns Death Ruled Suicide at Fort Chabourne

Frank Burns, who died Sunday from gunshot wounds ruled self-inflicted by Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles, was buried Monday in the old Decker Cemetery north of Blackwell.

Sheriff Melvin Childress was called to the scene, along with Deputy Jess Parker and Justice Liles. A son, W. D. Burns of Bronte, and others of the family were at the Burns home on the McDonald place in the Ft. Chabourne community.

Officers were told that, soon after breakfast, Mr. Burns left the house, and soon a gunshot was heard. Going to investigate, relatives found the body of Mr. Burns near an outbuilding not far from the farm house.

Frank Burns, 81, was born Aug. 31, 1881, at Athens and married Daisy Weather Oct. 5, 1904. A farmer and rancher, he lived in Coke County about 75 years.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, W. D. Burns of Bronte and Jesse J. Burns of Mount Vernon, Mo.; three daughters, Miss Zola Burns and Miss Edna Burns, both of Bronte, and Mrs. K. J. Brusenhan of Rockwood; and two grandchildren.

SPINAL CURVATURE...

County Agents News Column

The screwworm control program launched last spring is in danger of collapsing. We are proud of Coke County's efforts to see this program continued. The Coke County Animal Health Committee, individual operators, ranchers and stock farmers have displayed the support that will see the move completed if all areas respond with the same eagerness. The County Animal Health Committee deserves special praise for shouldering the program locally and for their contribution of time and effort to see that we do our share.

The Coke County Animal Health Committee was informed a short time back that the screwworm control program would fold in the near future unless local funds are secured to support the program. The operators' contributions would be matched by federal funds.

Coke County had contributed \$8542.20 or 72% of its quota when the Southwest Animal Research Foundation reminded us of the situation. We lacked \$3233.00 reaching our goal.

In the first week of the new campaign, 22 operators have already signified their support of the campaign by sending in their contribution. Their support totaled \$952.65. Other operators will have pledged their support by the time you read this. This kind of action will see us reach our goal. We hope it prevails in other counties as well.

Dawnie and Benny Boykin exhibited a Hampshire lamb at the State Fair last week. The competition was keen and their results dismal. The "new look" in sheep judging left their entry wanting. All was not lost as Benny and I received a good demonstration and education on what makes up the type lamb desired in this day and time.

The Coke County Livestock Show Directors, in a meeting a couple of weeks back set the date for the 1963 County Stock Show. The show will be held on Monday, January 14, unless this date conflicts with the Sterling County Show.

With winter just around the corner and the nights getting cooler, thoughts are turning to closing off the cooler and installing the heaters. Much of Coke County uses LP gas or liquid petroleum gas as their heating fuel. It, like all combustible fuels, needs to be recognized for what it is, and handled with precaution.

The Extension engineer, Henry O'Neal, gives some notable remarks of value for us to consider as we move into the winter season.

One important precaution he gives, is to locate the tank at least 50 feet from any major building and 20 feet from other tanks containing flammable liquids. Also, the tank should be located so that it is isolated from open fires, sparks and other sources of ignition.

If a pump is used on the tank, erect a low fence around it to prevent accidental damage to the pump, hose connections, and the pipe fittings which may cause dangerous leaks.

Low spots and holes around the tank should be filled because LP

gas is heavier than air and gas that leaks from the tank will settle in these low spaces and become a fire hazard.

If leaks are suspected in the tank they should NOT be detected by using a flame, he warns. Keep away from the tank and call the local service man.

LP gas is a fuel and should never be used for cleaning purposes or to inflate tires.

According to O'Neal, LP gas is a safe fuel and can be used without fear of explosion or fire if proper care and safety practices are observed.
