## Longhorns Travel to Roby for Friday Tilt

Bronte Longhorns will travel to Roby Friday night for a football contest with the Lions of that city. The Lions have a strong team this year, and the Longhorns are expecting some difficulty with them.

Coach N. M. Curlee said early this week that two of his starting backs, Tommy Glenn Sims and Malcom Johnson may not be going this week. Their absence will hurt the Longhorns, but it is hoped they will be in shape to start.

The coach said the Longhorns have looked good in practice this week. They have been showing more speed in the backfield and more blocking in the line, he said.

Robert Lee continues to be the powerhouse in District 8-B. The Steers downed Hermleigh last Friday night by a score of 37-14. Loraine also showed its power last week as the Longhorns fell to the Bulldogs 44-13. Loraine appears to be the only school in the district with a chance of beating the powerful Steer eleven for the district title.

In other 8-B games this Friday, Robert Lee will take on Trent and Hermleigh will meet Loraine.

## Longhorns Lose To Loraine, 44-13

The Bronte Longhorns lost another ball game last Friday night when the Loraine Bulldogs invaded the local stadium and went home with a 44 to 13 victory. The local lads, still licking their wounds from the previous Friday, were not operating at full strength but looked better than the score indicated. Bronte's two touchdowns came on passes from Jimmy Wells to Barry Curlee, who, on both occasions, was able to outrun his pursuers.

### First Quarter

James Linder kicked off for Loraine from the east end of the field. The ball went to Royce Lee who brought it out to the 35 yard line. Wells and Tommy Glenn Sims made it a 1st on the 46 with the help of an offside penalty. In the next series of plays, both the Bulldogs and Longhorns were penalized for offside. The locals couldn't make the necessary yardage, so Wells kicked the ball into the end zone, giving the Bulldogs the ball with a first down on their own 20.

On the first play from scrimmage, Buster Jarnigan went over left side with no trouble and ran 80 yards for the first counter of the evening. Extra points were good, giving Loraine a lead, 8-0.

Linder's kick went to Tony Olivas on the 28. After an unsuccessful try by Olivas, Wells tossed an aerial into the waiting hands of Curlee. The local speed merchant took off and outran his Bulldog pursuers for a total gain of 72 yards and a touchdown. His try for extra points failed, however, and the score was 8-6, Loraine. The Longhorns got a break when Olivas kicked off to Jacky Narrel, who fumbled the ball. Olivas recovered for the Longhorns on the Loraine 47 yard line.

Sims ground out a 16 yard gain for a 1st on the 31. Curlee and Sims both picked up 3, then Sims added almost 4 more, lacking less than a yard for the 1st. Wells kept the ball and made the necessary gain, but fumbled the ball, and Loraine recovered near the 20.

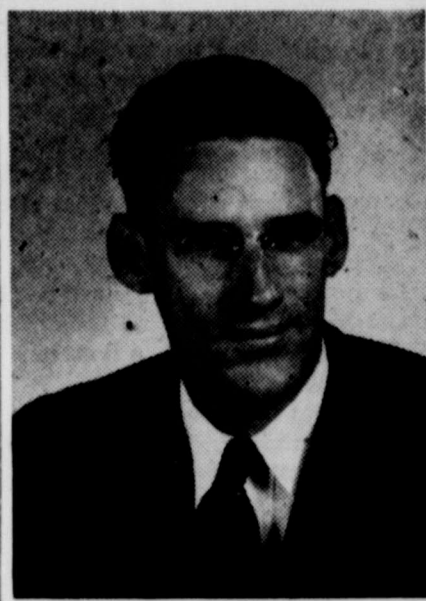
The Bulldogs went on the march again with Jarnigan, Larry Blair, and Stanley Moore picking up good yardage, to set the ball up on the 16 yard line of Bronte. From that point Jarnigan went around right end for another touchdown. The conversion run failed, giving the Bulldogs a 14-8 lead.

The Longhorns took the kickoff, ran three plays, and were faced with a 4th and 9 when the quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

Wells punted and the Bulldogs had a 1st and 10 on their 36. After a gain of 5, the Bulldogs were penalized 15 yards for illegal use of the hands. Faced with a 3rd and 20, Moore tossed a pass, but Jim Morrow intercepted it on the Bulldog 40. Unable to move, Wells punted for the Bronte team, the ball going out on the 18. Bulldog

Citizens of Coke County and the rest of Texas will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 6, to elect precinct, county, district and state officials. Only Democratic nominees are on the ballot for county and precinct offices and for state senator and representative offices. Republicans have candidates listed for most of the state offices and for congressmen.

By far the hottest race is for governor of Texas. The Democratic nominee is John Connally, while his Republican opponent is Jack Cox. The two gubernatorial candidates have made intensive campaigns, have spent much money in

## POLIO VACCINE TO BE GIVEN NOVEMBER 8

Type I of the Sabin oral vaccine will be given to Bronte area residents on Thursday week, Nov. 8, at the local school. Dr. John R. Harris, city health officer, urged everyone to plan to take the vaccine, regardless of age. No charge will be made for the vaccine but donations will be accepted to help defray the costs of the program.

The second dosage of the vaccine will be given in about six

weeks. Definite date will be announced later.

The vaccine will be given in the nurse's office and the adjacent hall at the local school. Mrs. A. R. Bagwell, office nurse at Harris Clinic, will be in charge of dispensing the vaccine. She said Monday that they had not learned whether the vaccine would be given on a sugar cube or as a liquid. In either case, the vaccine is tasteless and quickly given. Records will be kept of those who take the vaccine.

Type I inoculates against the most common varieties of polio. Everyone is urged to take it as a part of a nationwide program to eliminate polio.

Once again Jarnigan was the ball carrier and made 6 yards on his first try. On the second, however, he fumbled the ball again and Wesley Murphy covered it for the Longhorns on their 39. Possession of the ball was short lived as Epperson intercepted a Longhorn pass and went to the Bronte 2 yard line before he was tackled. Jarnigan went over on the next play. Rankin ran the conversion to make the score 22-6.

Linder's kick off hit a Bronte lineman but Royce Lee was in the right spot to recover for the Longhorns on the 31. Four plays later Wells was forced to punt. It was partially blocked and went out on the Longhorn 41. The Bulldogs started on another touchdown march, which couldn't be stopped until Jarnigan crossed the double stripe. Blair ran 2 extra points and the score was 30-6 with 3 minutes and 15 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

This gave the Bulldogs the ball for another touchdown drive which ended when Jarnigan ran over right tackle from the 12 for the counter. Rankin ran two extra points to make the score 44-13.

Bronte took the kickoff and three plays later the Longhorns were out to midfield, when the final whistle sounded.

Sanco, Silver and the rest of the rural area on the west side would get in communication with the mayor's office in Robert Lee for immediate help. Likewise, Tennyson, Oak Creek, and other rural people on that side of the county would clear through the mayor's office at Bronte.

General responsibility for the county would still be at the court house.

(December 22, 1961) After Connally's victory over Yarborough, Time said "His mentor Lyndon Johnson thus tightened his grip on the Texas Democratic organization." (June 8, 1962)

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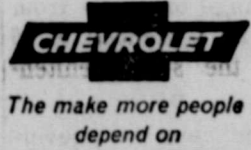

**Trial Moved to North Texas, Set for December**

New trial for four Sweetwater men on an indictment charging them with rape of a woman near Blackwell on June 25, 1961 has been set for district court in Wichita Falls in December, District Attorney Weldon Kirk of Sweetwater said Tuesday.

The men were found guilty on the charges in a trial at Colorado City after a change of venue from Nolan County and sentenced to 15 years each in the state penitentiary.

On appeal, the case was reversed and remanded for new trial.

**EDITORIAL**

Election is only six days away. It is an election held in a time of national crisis. The eyes of the Kremlin will be upon Texas and every state in the nation, and we cannot get away from our responsibility to vote.

One question the rulers of Soviet Russia, of communist-ruled China, of Cuba and the other satellite-slave states will be keenly interested in is: are Americans going to use fully the privilege of voting that is one of the rights that only free men enjoy? All the others represented in the United Nations, neutral or wavering, will be watching our election returns. A half-hearted turnout of the voters will spell political apathy. Do Americans really value the right to vote, which they want to be extended to the people of all nations as soon as they are ready for it? Popular elections are basic to democracy — but not what the Russians call democracy, which in their language means government of the people by self-chosen and self-perpetuating rulers, for what they tell the people is best for them.

Representative elective government depends for its continued existence, as Thomas Jefferson pointed out, on having "an enlightened electorate." It also depends on the right to vote being used by the most enlightened part of the electorate, who otherwise surrender their privileges of self-government.

So we say: study your opposing candidates' ability, integrity and their platforms. Go to the polls as well informed as you can make yourself. Go and vote as your head, your heart and your conscience tell you to do.

Even in presidential elections, few more than half of American registered voters cast ballots. Of all crucial times, this is no time for indifference. Vote on November Sixth, a red-letter day of our destiny.

campaign on opposition to Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. Connelly admittedly is a friend of, but not subject to, both the vice president and of President Kennedy, in whose cabinet he served as Secretary of the Navy until he resigned to make the race for governor. Mr. Cox' main contention seems to be that friendships of this kind disqualify a man to be governor of Texas. This is a rare political philosophy, particularly from a man who has held public office and has run for the highest office of the state as a Democrat. Sounds a bit like sour grapes.

Mr. Cox is gambling that his "hate Lyndon Johnson" campaign will get him votes, but he should remember what Abe Lincoln said that you cannot make the weak stronger by trying to make the strong weaker.

We'd like to put in a good word for a couple of West Texans, both from Lubbock: Preston Smith is the democratic nominee for lieutenant governor and Waggoner Carr is the nominee for attorney general. Both of these men are ably qualified to serve this state in the offices they seek. They deserve the vote of all of us West Texans.

Another item to be carefully studied before the election Tuesday is the 14 constitutional amendments which will become a part of our constitution or be rejected. Frankly, we haven't yet had time to study most of them as we should have; therefore we have no recommendations to make on that subject. We do invite you to come by The Enterprise office and pick up a free copy of the amendments to study for yourself.

We would like to recommend that you vote against No. 14, the De Novo Amendment. As, we understand it, this amendment

would allow an appeal in court from any decision made by the administrative bodies of cities, counties, schools, water districts, and other public agencies. Opponents say that this amendment would wreck administrative decisions of all these governing bodies, and would mean that city councils, school boards and other officials might as well be prepared to spend a good part of their time in court.

Regardless of how you vote, be sure to make a special effort to get to the polls. We Americans have the sorriest voting record in the world, a situation of which we should be ashamed. This great privilege of free elections by secret ballot, is ours and we should keep it strong by exercising it.

county judge and the sheriff. The county judge is the officer in charge for the county and the mayor is in charge of his city.

U. S. Department of Agriculture personnel will be in charge of securing food supplies and checking them for safety. J. E. Quisenberry, office manager of the the Agricultural Conservation Service, is chairman. Sterling Lindsey, county agent for the extension service, is a member of this board along with Jake Jacoby, member of the local soil conservation service staff.

Those experienced in first aid work should have their names listed with their mayor, County Judge Thetford and Sheriff Melvin Childress.

In addition to their usual duties, the sheriff's department will be in charge of emergency communications. Any individual who has a radio sending set, along with company owned radio equipment may figure in this and should have their names on file with the sheriff's department. Likewise, anyone who has available portable power equipment is asked to list it with the sheriff.

In the event of an alert, all persons are advised against getting out on the road. All families are advised to have battery operated radio sets where feasible, for use in the event of power failure.
