## Wildcat Drilling Southeast of Here

Tom Bomar of Ballinger is drilling a wildcat 1½ miles south of Bronte. It is No. 2 C. N. Webb Jr., et al, and is scheduled to drill to 4,600 feet. Location is 5,350 feet from northeast and 471 feet from northwest lines of William L. Coulson survey 326.

Drillsite also is on location southeast of Bomar's No. 1 Webb, a re-entered 5,600 foot failure in J. P. Moore survey 327, which is currently shutin. The latter project originally was drilled by J. D. Wrather Jr., Dallas, as No. 1 Mrs. J. B. McCutchen and was plugged Aug. 15, 1955. The test is more than two miles from the Bronte Field.

Linehan & Stoltenberg No. 1 A. N. Rawlings was bottomed this week at 3,830 feet and waiting on orders.

## Basketball Games For Bronte High

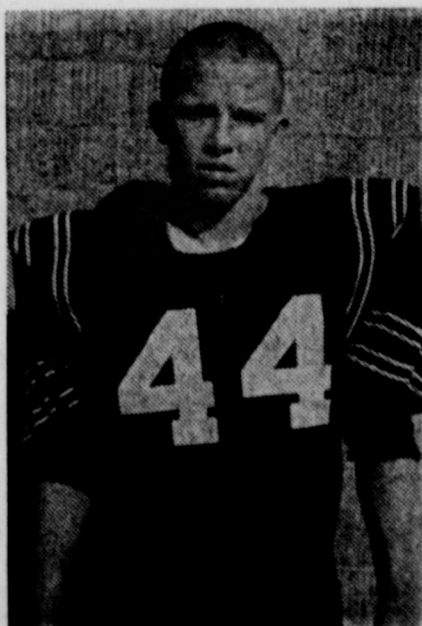
Both A and B girls basketball teams of Bronte High School played in Ballinger Monday night with the A team winning their game 66-13 and the B team losing 24-38.

Peggy Corley was high scorer in the A team game with 25 points to her credit, while Georgia Owens was high on the B team with 12.

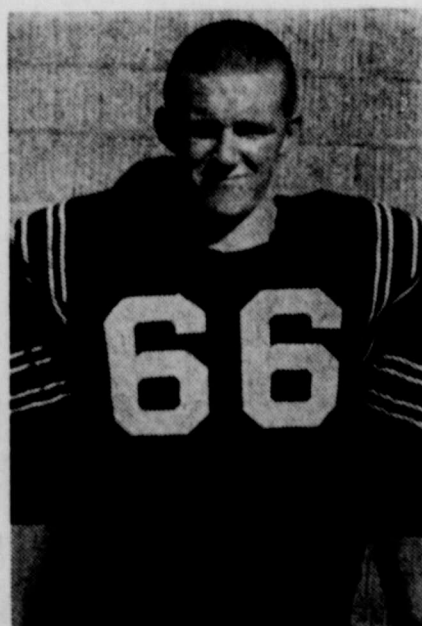
### Boys Play at Roscoe

The A and B boys teams went to Roscoe Tuesday night for contests, and the A team lost 56-36, while the B lads won their game, 37-35.

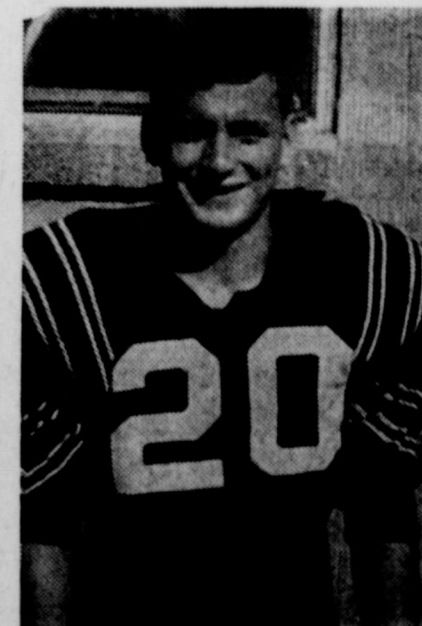

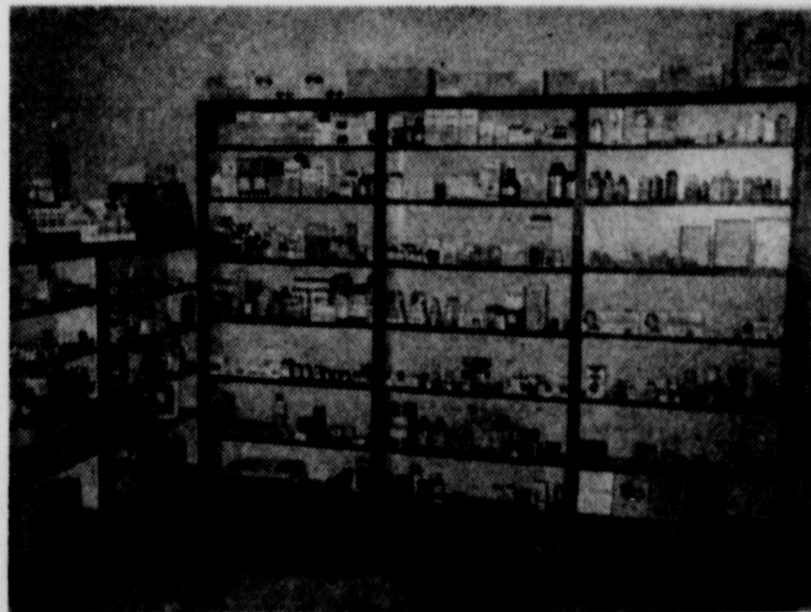

We do not have a late official report on the State-Wide move to complete the fund drive for the screwworm control program; however, the Foundation president gives an optimistic report. Locally, we are in a favorable position as we are nearing our goal.

Again, we want to pay tribute to the county animal health committee members for conducting the program work locally. They deserve our thanks for their devotion to the task at hand.

And the Foundation has expressed in their reports a word of thanks to all who have made the screwworm control program possible. They and we still believe your generosity was a good investment as well as a contribution.

If there are some that have not contributed that wish to do so, the contributions should be mailed to William H. Allen, Robert Lee, Texas.

Dec. 11 has been set as the date for a referendum on whether or not to keep cotton marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop. If the quotas are approved, penalties will be in effect for overplanting cotton allotments and price supports will be set at 65 to 90 per cent of parity. If quotas are not approved by a two-thirds majority of those voting, allotments will still apply but no penalties will be placed on those overproducing and supports will be only 50 per cent of parity.

J. E. Quisenberry, ASCS Office manager, will send out more information on the election.

Pussic acid can reach a high leveling the first frost of the year. Certain chemical changes take place in the plants that are wilted and the poison works quickly, killing a short time after the animal has eaten it. Don't allow animals to graze on wet pastures following a freeze. Usually silage is free of the poison, but if in doubt, have it tested by a veterinarian.

## Cotton Quota Voting Dec. 11

Polling places where Coke County farmers may cast ballots in the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop were announced today by Clarence E. Arrott, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. The referendum will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 11.

Polling place will be located at the courthouse in Robert Lee and at the city hall in Bronte. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Arrott explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allot-quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those engaged in the production of upland cotton crop in 1962. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if the quotas are to go into effect.

Issues to be decided in the Dec. 11 referendum are (1) quotas or no quotas, and (2) the level of price support to be available for the 1963 upland cotton crop.

If the vote is favorable, quotas will be in effect for the crop — with penalties on any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support to growers who comply with their farm allotments will be available at a level of from 65 to 90 per cent of parity. If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1963 upland cotton crop, and price support to cooperators will be at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Department of Agriculture officials have pointed out that, while the Administration plans to recommend new cotton legislation early in 1963, it is anticipated that such legislation would supplement rather than substantially change the basic program choices in the Dec. 11 referendum.

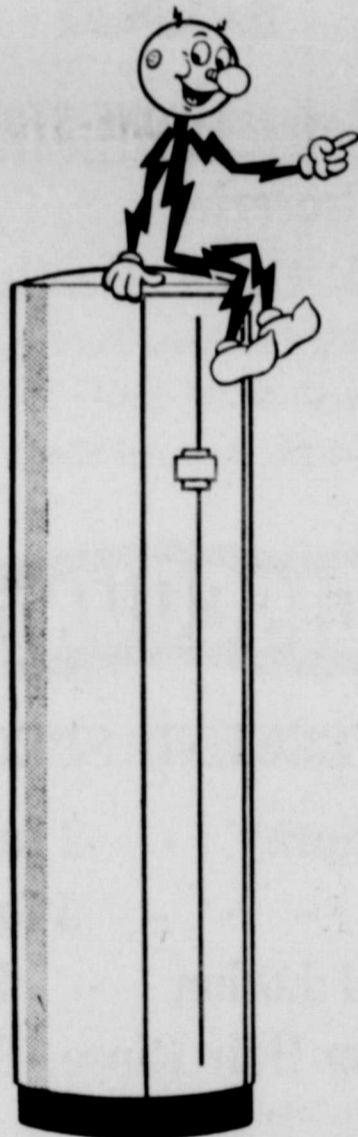

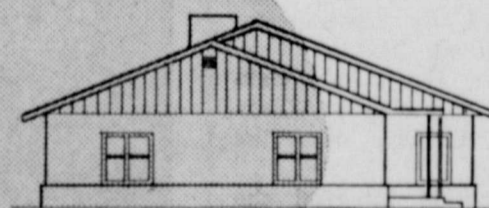

### Chili Cheese Logs

1/2 lb. American cheese, grated  
1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese,  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. instant minced onion  
1/8 tsp. cayenne pepper  
2 tsp. lemon juice  
3/4 c. finely chopped nuts  
3 T. chili powder  
Soften cheese at room tempera-

ture; mix until well blended. Add salt, onion, pepper, lemon juice and nuts.

Mix well. Shape into 4 rolls, 4 inch long, 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Chill 30 minutes. Roll each in chili powder. Wrap in foil or waxed paper. Chill. Store in freezer or refrigerator.

To serve: Slice and serve on round crackers, corn chips or small rounds of sandwich bread.

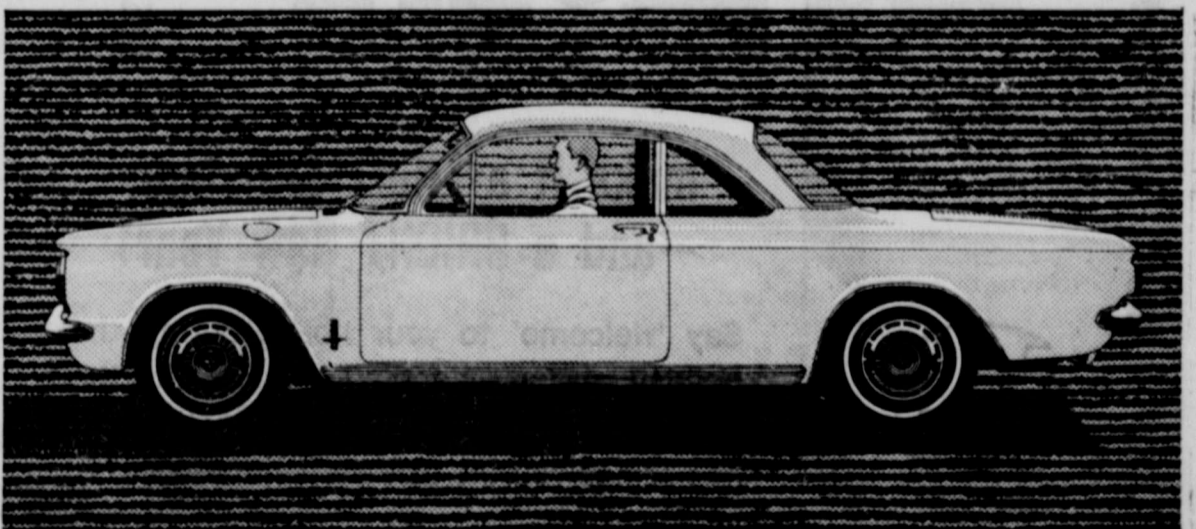
