Type 2 Polio Vaccine Will Be Given Jan. 10 at Bronte School

Type II Sabin polio vaccine will be administered on Thursday, Jan. 10, according to an announcement from Dr. John R. Harris, city health officer.

As before when type I was given, the place for conducting the mass vaccination will be the Bronte School.

AD-LIB-BEN

Our trip to Mexico the five days after Christmas was most enjoyable. We received nothing but the most courteous treatment at every turn. The Mexican people are a good bit like residents of the U. S., except more so, in that they are easy going until they get into an automobile. Then they, like us, are apt to be in somewhat of a hurry.

Accompanied by friends, the Bob Weddle family of Menard, we went across the border at Laredo and drove approximately 140 miles down the Pan American Highway to Monterrey. The road was okay except for about 25 miles which were under construction. The detour was about as rough as a road can get.

We found our Spanish dictionary an invaluable aid in traveling down there, particularly in reading road signs and directions.

Monterrey is a thriving city of almost a million persons, located in a beautiful setting, surrounded by mountains. It is known as "The Pittsburgh of Mexico" because of the great amount of industry located there. The city has a steel rolling plant and an automobile factory, as well as the largest brewery in Latin America and hundreds of smaller industrial establishments. It has a modern school of medicine and an institute of Technology.

The downtown business section, like most Mexican towns, has narrow streets and many statues honoring heroes of the country; also there are plazas scattered around with benches in them where people can sit and rest.

We made a trip up to the famous Horsetail Falls, about 25 miles up in the mountains. The weather was so foggy that we couldn't see the scenery as well as we wanted to, but it was a beautiful sight, and the falls almost seemed to be cascading out of the clouds.

Monterrey is a city full of old, picturesque and beautiful Catholic church and cathedrals. The work that went into their construction is almost unbelievable.

We also went to Saltillo some 50 miles southwest of Monterrey. It is even more typically Mexican than is Monterrey, not being such a great tourist center. In Saltillo we visited a place where they were making serapes and rugs in what must have been the same fashion as hundreds of years ago. Their work was beautiful. We also visited a place where they make all kinds of silver flatware and jewelry. This work, too, was lovely to look at, but their method of shaping the articles requires lots of handwork and time.

Saltillo, like Monterrey, has beautiful churches. One Cathedral, in particular, was outstanding. Built in 1724, the altar is hand carved and then covered with gold leaf. It was most spectacular.

Children who had type I vaccine will not be required to have another certificate signed by parents. However, if a child did not take the first shot, and wishes to take Type 2, he will be required to have permission from his parents.

The serum will be given under the supervision of Dr. Harris, with Mrs. A. R. Bagwell, office nurse directing the day's program.

Mrs. Bagwell said that anyone who wishes may take the vaccine even though he has not had type 1.

In the event of inclement weather which might cause school to be dismissed on the date, the inoculation will be carried out on the first day that classes are resumed.

Dr. Harris urged everyone to take the vaccine.

An election to name three directors for the Coke County Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District has been called for Tuesday, Jan. 8. Balloting will be done at Bronte city hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., with Noah Pruitt serving as presiding judge.

Terms of Austin Sandusky, Preston Davis and J. A. Percifull expire this year, and they will be re-elected or their successors

will be chosen. Holdover directors who have another year to serve are F. S. Higginbotham and D. K. Glenn.

Persons eligible to vote in the election must be qualified voters of this state and must reside within the boundaries of the water district.

Main job of water district directors is to supervise the work being done on flood control dams now under construction north of Bronte. Finances for the million dollar project are being furnished through the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture. Upon completion of the five dams, Bronte and the surrounding area will be protected from disastrous floods, two of which have occurred in the past few years.

The couple took a wedding trip to Mamu Mountain, Calif. For travel the bride wore a gray double knit sheath with matching long coat and a white fur hat.

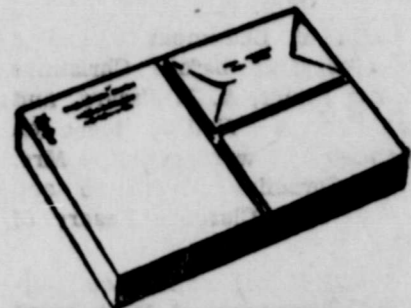
