Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wylie of Bronte were jointly honored Friday night as citizens of the year at a banquet given by the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce. The award is presented annually by the chamber to some one who rendered outstanding service to the Ballinger community.

Mr. and Mrs. Wylie, who live on their ranch northeast of Bronte, have been generous in their contributions to many institutions in Ballinger, Bronte, Abilene and other places in Texas.

Both natives of Runnels County, Mr. and Mrs. Wylie were married in 1904, and moved to the ranch, headquarters of which are at the site of old Fort Chadbourne, in 1908.

A rancher and oilman, Mr. Wylie operates the ranch which was settled back in 1876 by T. L. Odom and his son, G. G. Odom, who was the father of Mrs. Wylie.

During recent years Mr. and

Mrs. Wylie have contributed sizeable amounts to such institutions as the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, West Texas Boys Ranch near San Angelo, McMurry College at Abilene, and many others.

It was brought out at the Ballinger meeting that Mr. and Mrs. Wylie, along with Mrs. Wylie's sister, the late Mrs. J. F. Currie made possible the First Methodist Church in Ballinger, as a memorial to their parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Odom. They also made a large contribution to the new hospital which was recently opened in Ballinger.

The Wylies presented a large gift to First Methodist Church in Bronte prior to the addition which was built onto the church in 1957 and have helped with many other charities here in Bronte. When plans were being made and money pledged to build a Golden Age home here, Mr. and Mrs. Wylie pledged a large gift to it.

ers on hand.

BITTER COLD ENGULFS AREA

The coldest spell of the year descended on West Texas last Thursday night and sub-freezing temperatures had continued each night through Tuesday.

Coldest night of the spell was Friday, when local resident awakened Saturday morning to find the mercury hanging at about five degrees. A low of 10 was recorded Saturday night, but the thermometer rose above the freezing mark Sunday afternoon and has continued to do so each day since. Bitter cold wind chilled everyone during the cold snap, but no moisture fell.

B. D. Mackey, Bronte water superintendent, said that none of the city water mains actually froze, but he did have several leaks in old lines, due to contraction caused by low temperatures. Many residents had water lines frozen around their homes.

Farmers and stockmen were not too enthusiastic about the weather. Some were heard to comment that the extreme weather was likely to permanently damage small grain crops and winter grazing.

A low of about 25 was forecast for Wednesday night, with the prediction that the mercury would rise into the high 50s Thursday.

Rites Held for Joe W. Callaway

Funeral services were held Jan. 6 in Odessa for Joseph William Callaway, 37, Fort Chadbourne native and son of Mrs. H. M. Stevens of Bronte. Mr. Callaway was killed Jan. 4 in a highway accident about ten miles from Odessa.

Mr. Callaway was a deaf mute and was honored by his Silent People's Sunday School of the West Park Baptist Church where the funeral was held. They attended the services in a group.

The fatal accident occurred after Mr. Callaway had stopped to work on the lights of his automobile. As he was stepping back to the side of his car to get in, the rear view mirror of a truck caught him, sending him about 50 feet down the highway. He was killed instantly.

He was born June 19, 1924, on the old Callaway place in the Fort Chadbourne community. He went to school at Austin and studied the dry cleaning trade. He was employed by Kemp's Cleaners of Bronte in 1946 and 1947. He was an outstanding bowler and had won many trophies.

He is survived by his wife; three children; his mother, Mrs. Stevens of Bronte; a brother, Jim Callaway of Odessa. Cousins were pallbearers.

Gymnasium and Dressing Rooms Get Paint Job and Other Improvements

The Bronte School gymnasium has recently received a complete face lifting and the appearance and usefulness of the facilities have been greatly improved.

Joe Bush, local paint contractor, was in charge of the painting. He painted the bleachers and lower part of the walls gray, and the top part of the walls a mint green. The ceiling is an off white. School officials said the colors will make the lighting in the gym much better.

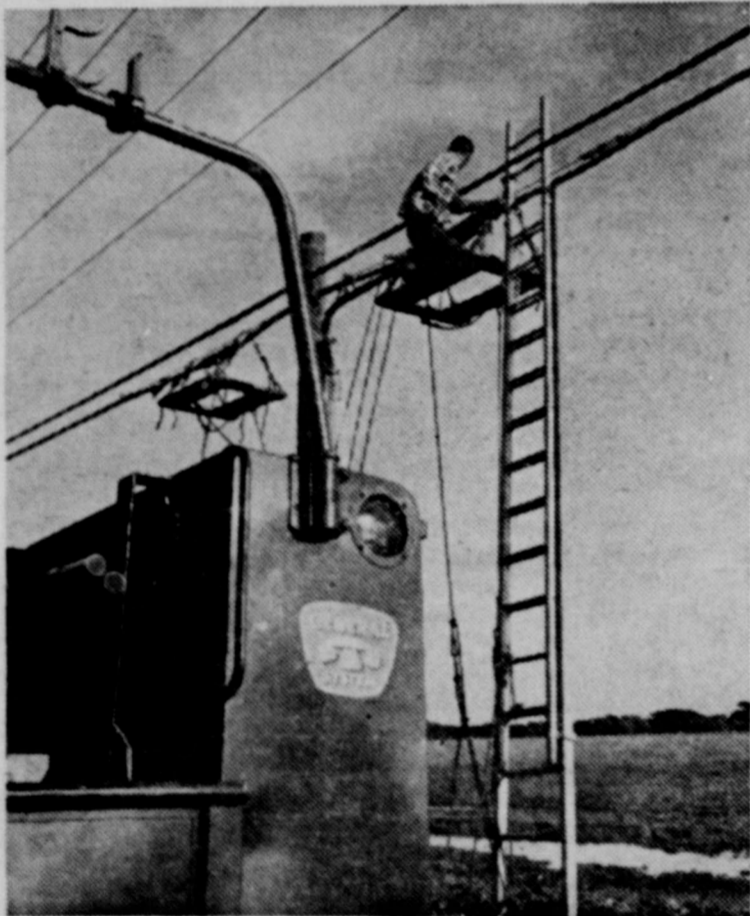

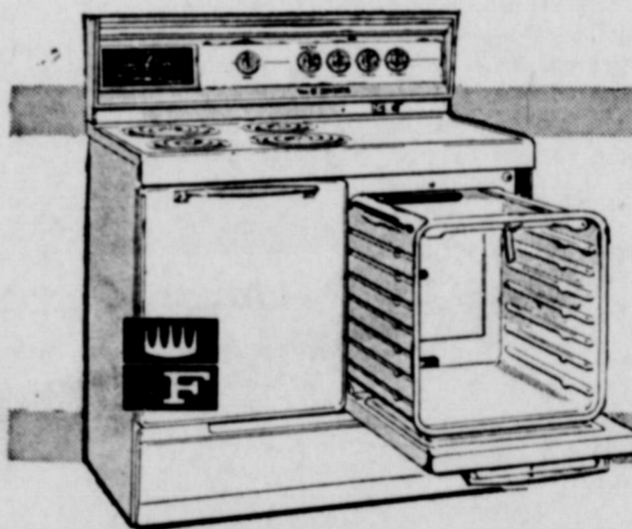
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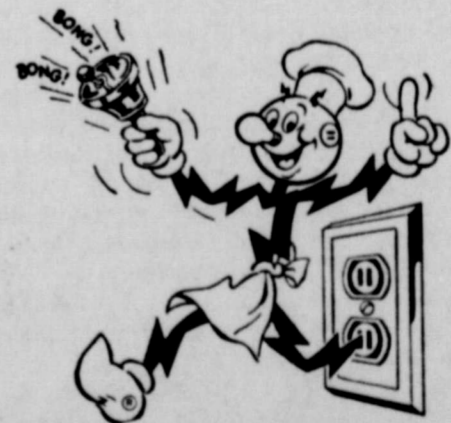

UNCLE HUIE from HOG CREEK says

And it's fer the same reason that I ain't never invested in a Encyclopedia. Any feller that studies real good all the information they put in the pamphlets from the Department of Agriculture, the Government Printing Office, the U. S. Information Agency, to name a few I git regular, knows about all they is to know about anything important.

Fer instant, I received notice last week that the U. S. Information Agency has got four new booklets ready fer the taxpayers. They is entitled, "Space Exploration," "Trade Expansion," "Mending Men's Suits," and "Growing Ornamental Bamboo." 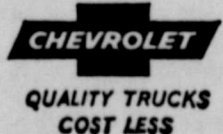

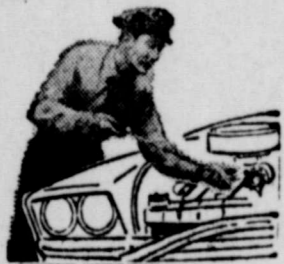
