### BITTER COLD **ENGULFS AREA**

Thursday night and sub-freezing temperatures had continued each night through Tuesday.

Coldest night of the spell was Friday, when local resident awakened Saturday morning to find the mercury hanging at about five degrees. A low of 10 was recorded Saturday night, but the thermom-Sunday afternoon and has continued to do so each day since. Bitter cold wind chilled everyone during the cold snap, but no moisture fell.

B. D. Mackey, Bronte water superintendent, said that none of the city water mains actually froze, but he did have several leaks in old lines, due to contraction caused by low temperatures. Many residents had water lines frozen around their homes.

Farmers and stockmen were not too enthusiastic about the weather. Some were heard to comment that the extreme weather was likely to permanently damage small grain crops and winter




