

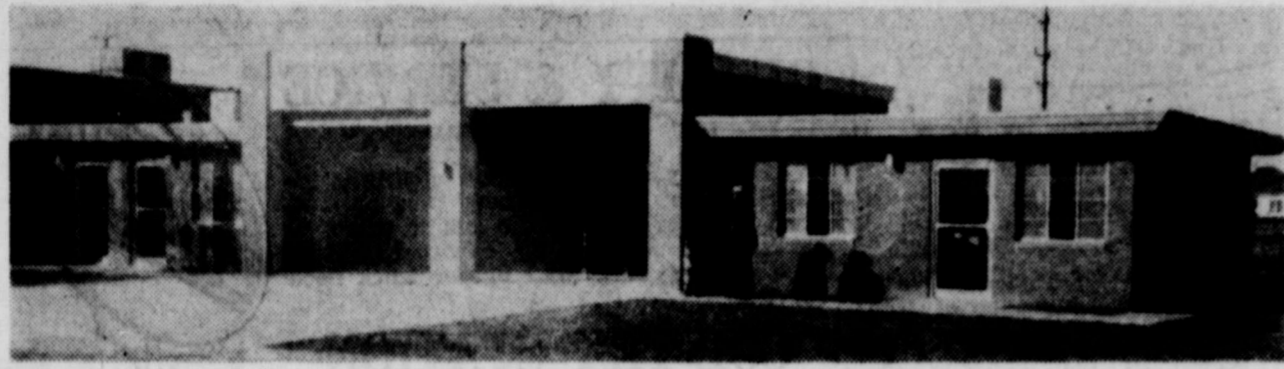

Bronte's New City Hall



City Office Moved Into New Building

Bronte's City office was moved the entire space available for large meetings. The wing also has an office for Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker, two holdover jail cells, and a small kitchen.

The north wing contains the office of Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, a foyer for customers, an office for Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles, an office for Mayor Norman R. Kiker, and two rest rooms.

Wall panel heaters have been installed in various places over the building to provide heat for the entire structure. Air conditioners have been installed on the roof and ducted into the building's interior.

The city hall was built by May Bros. Construction Co. of Sweetwater, under supervision of S. J. May of Oak Creek Village. The firm was awarded the contract for \$19,700 after the city rejected nine proposals at an earlier bid opening. Bonds voted to build the structure amounted to \$18,000. The balance of the cost was made up of money on hand.

Coke County is renting space in the new building to house the offices of the deputy sheriff and the justice of the peace. Furnishing the two jail cells is also considered as part of the rental.

Science Fair to Be Ready Next Saturday; Everyone Is Invited

Bronte School's annual Science Fair will have its initial showing next Tuesday night when the PTA meets in regular session. Another showing will be given for students Friday, and the fair will be open to the public Saturday, Feb. 16.

Mr. and Mrs. Youngblood Return from Trip Covering Thousands of Miles, 3 Continents

Sunday night found Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Youngblood back in Bronte after being gone for almost a month and covering thousands of miles over land and sea. The Bronte banker and his wife have been on a tour sponsored by the American Express Co. and guided by Porter Randall, well known Fort Worth radio commentator. The main part of the trip covered countries in Europe, Africa and Asia which border the Mediterranean Sea.

Leaving San Angelo Jan. 10, the Bronte couple went to Dallas, where they boarded a Braniff jet which took them to New York City in three hours. The big plane cruised at 635 miles per hour at 35,000 feet.

Flying at 40,000 feet at 580 mph, they went non-stop from New York to Rome. The next stop was Cairo, Egypt, where they spent a couple of days, before taking a

train up the Nile River to the City of Luxor and the nearby Valley of the Dead. Luxor is a small city of 35,000 persons and Mr. Youngblood said it has only 35 privately owned automobiles.

The famous tombs of ancient Egypt's rulers are some nine miles out in the desert from the city. The pyramids are engineering marvels, especially when it is considered that they were built 4,000 B.C. Some of the stones in the structures weigh as much as 20 tons and they are contained in walls 75 to 80 feet high. Mr. Youngblood said their group was given a demonstration on the procedure used in elevating the big building stones. They were placed on wooden rollers and pulled by about 70 men up an inclined mound of dirt piled around the building.

The tombs are carved out of a hillside and of white limestone and their almost perfect state of

preservation is due to the lack of moisture in the area. The Bronte banker said he asked a resident of the area when it last rained and was told that it came a light sprinkle in 1948.

From Luxor the Youngbloods flew back to Cairo. After a short stop they boarded another plane for Beirut, Lebanon. After landing at Beirut, they toured by bus the area predominantly mentioned in the Bible. This area today makes up the countries of Lebanon, Jordan, Syria and Israel. Other prominent Middle East cities toured included Jerusalem, Haifa, Jericho, and Damascus.

Special points of interest visited which will be familiar to Bible readers included the Dead Sea, the Jordan River at the spot where John the Baptist baptized Jesus, the manger in Bethlehem, the place in Jerusalem where Je-

Mrs. Bill McKown Seriously Injured In Auto Accident

Mrs. Bill McKown of Bronte was seriously injured late last Friday when the car in which she was riding with her husband was in a collision with another car. The accident occurred in Norton, as the McKowns were returning from Ballinger to their home east of here. Driver of the other car was Jamie Valerio, 16, who lives near Norton.

McKown suffered cuts and bruises but was not nearly as severely injured as his wife. She had cuts and bruises over her entire body and 27 stitches were required to close a laceration on her head and face. Mrs. McKown is hospitalized at Ballinger.

McKown said the Valerio car struck his new Falcon toward the area and the force spun it around several times. Sometime during the spin his wife was thrown from the car. Some canned goods in the floor board of the back seat were found as much as 100 yards from the place of impact.

The Bronte ranchman said that he and his wife felt extremely fortunate to come out of the collision as well as they did. Mrs. McKown was reported Tuesday afternoon to be "doing nicely."

Both cars were badly damaged. Occupants of the Valerio automobile were not seriously injured.

Bronte Takes 2 From Robert Lee

Bronte high school won a pair of basketball games from Robert Lee Tuesday night. The contests were staged at the local gymnasium. The boys took the Steers by a score of 42-33 and the local girls stomped their visitors, 63-38.

Winning the Tuesday night tilt gave the girls a 6-0 district record. High scorer was Marla Rees with 31 points. Linda Thetford was high for the visitors with 16. Roy Wayne Stout was high pointer for the Longhorns in their game with 19. Phil Loudder hit 15 for the Steers.

Bronte teams also took two games from Wall here last Friday night. The girls won their game, 51-37, while the boys belted the visitors, 63-43. Peggy Corley was high scorer for her team with 20 and Jim Morrow's 25 points was high in the boys contest.

The next two contests for both the boys and girls will be away from home and will wind up district play for this year. They will play at Christoval Friday night and will go to Miles next Tuesday night. The girls are leading the district and their Tuesday night win cinched them for a tie in district competition. One win in the final two games will give them the district title.

Poll Tax Payments Light This Year

Payment of poll taxes in Coke County was much lighter than last year. An off-year so far as electing county, state and national officials is concerned 1963 will see elections for school and city offices plus any special elections that may be called. O. B. Jacobs, Coke County tax assessor-collector, reported this week that only 770 poll tax receipts were issued. This is almost 300 fewer than the 1060 issued in 1962.

Jesus was tried before Pilate, the tomb belonging to Joseph where Jesus was buried, the Sea of Galilee, Mt. Olivet from where Jesus made His Ascension, Mt. Beatitude from which He spoke the famous Sermon on the Mount, and many other places where Jesus lived and worked.

The Youngbloods walked the path that Jesus walked to Calvary where He was crucified. They also visited the spot where David killed Goliath with his slingshot.

Mr. Youngblood said when they went into the Arab part of Jerusalem they had to show their papers which proved that they were not Jews, as no Jew is permitted to cross the line from their part of the city. He said it reminded him of the wall in Berlin.

After their tour of the Holy Land the couple flew to Rome once more, this time spending two days in the Eternal City. Rome is a tremendous city with many fine places to shop, the local banker said. Their party spent considerable time visiting in the stores there.

The next leg of the long journey took the Youngbloods to Madrid, Spain. He said that in spite of the age of that city, it has hundreds of modern buildings and stores. Prices in the stores there are most reasonable. For example, a pair of ladies kid gloves which sell for about \$5.00 in this country can be purchased for \$1.95. Mr. Youngblood also was deeply impressed with the beauty of the old cathedrals in Madrid. The sculpture, paintings and other works of art in the churches there are magnificent and are perfectly preserved, even though many of them are 500 years old.

A short side trip took the Bronte pair across the Strait of Gibraltar to Tangier in Morocco. As in the Middle East this country is predominantly Moslem. Tangier is a city of heavily robed and veiled residents, and Mr. Youngblood said he had difficulty getting pictures which showed any part of their faces. In the old shopping district called Souk, the streets are as narrow as six feet and are filled with people, but no automobiles are to be seen. They stayed in an ultra modern hotel, however, called the Riff.

A boat trip was taken back across the strait to Gibraltar. The famous rock is the most imposing thing about the tiny British protectorate. At the base of the huge rock is a modern city and air

field and all merchandise is available tax free.

Leaving the warmer climate of the Mediterranean countries, Mr. and Mrs. Youngblood flew to London where they were met by some of the coldest weather to hit northern Europe in many years. Snow covered streets and icy sidewalks made travel difficult, but they managed to visit quite a few historic spots in the capital of the British Empire. Among them were Buckingham Palace, Westminster Abbey, Trafalgar Square, Piccadilly Circus, and the Parliament Building.

Emplaning from London to New York, the Youngbloods once again boarded the latest in jet aircraft flying back across the Atlantic.

From London, the plane made the trip in 1:15 actual sun time, lacking only that amount of time keeping up with the sun as they headed westward.

After making the Atlantic crossing in such a short time, however, the plane was unable to land at New York because of bad weather, and was ordered to land at Boston. Coming in for the landing there, the plane was caught in a severe surface wind current and the pilot gunned it to a higher altitude as quickly as possible. Circling around Boston, the plane was ordered to fly northeast to Halifax, Nova Scotia, for landing. Spending the night there, they got off to New York the next morning. There they had to go through customs and passport inspection.

Leaving New York at 2:30 p.m. they once again flew Braniff non-stop to Dallas, landing there at 5:15 p.m. The next plane from Dallas to San Angelo left at 7:30 and the Youngbloods were on it. They arrived in Angelo at 9:26 Sunday night, where they were met by members of their family. They were home in Bronte before midnight.

The party consisted of 30 persons, all of them Texans, except one woman from Kansas.

The group was very congenial, Mr. Youngblood said, and they thoroughly enjoyed the association, as well as the many sights they saw.

"I've always been glad I'm an American and a Texan," he said, "and making this trip and seeing all the many things we saw made me doubly proud of my American citizenship."

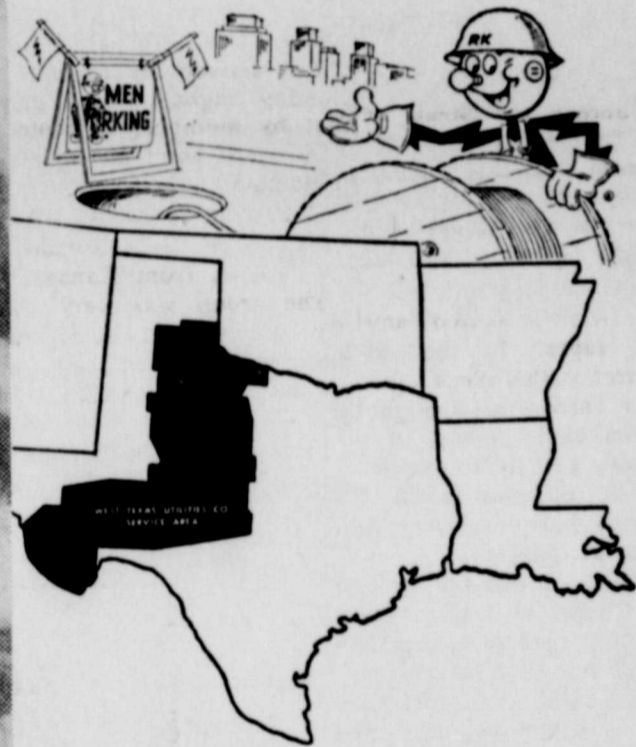
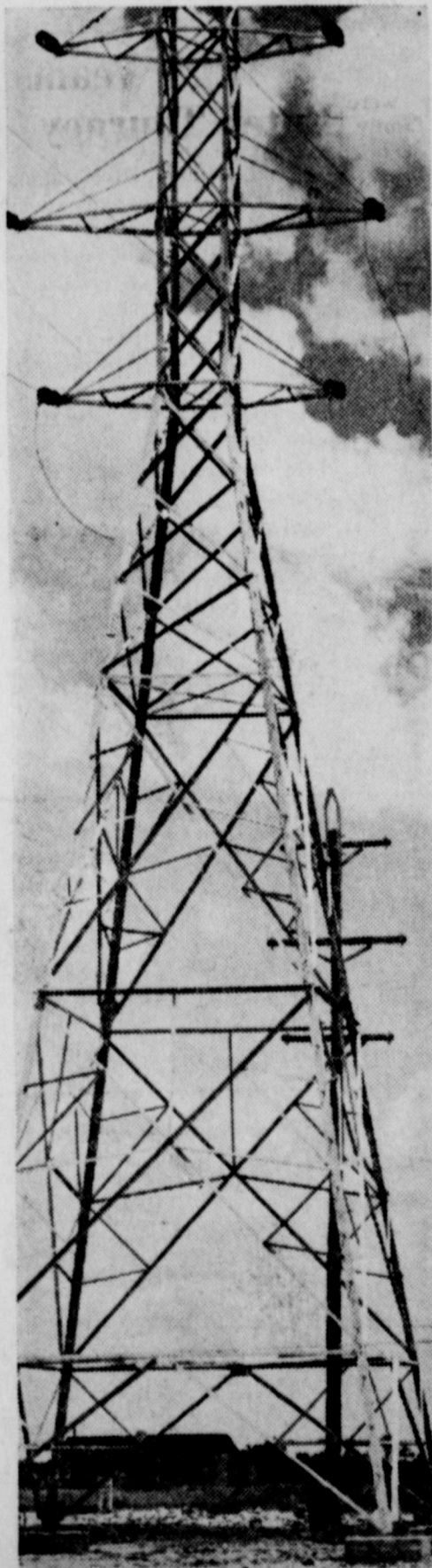

Unmold on lettuce covered plate, or serve as individual salad on lettuce. (I sometimes add fruit cocktail or fresh apples.)

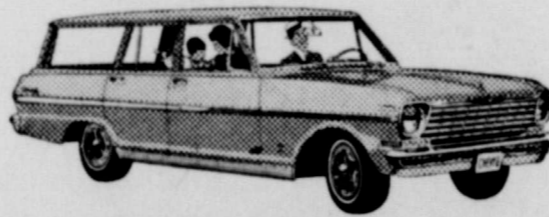

Bill Introduced to Regulate Game

A bill has been introduced in the Texas Legislature by Rep. Ed J. Carpenter of Big Spring which will provide some local control over the taking of game and fish in Coke County. The Coke County Game Management Association has been wanting such a bill passed for some time, and Rep. Carpenter stated in a letter that the type bill he is sponsoring will have the desired effect. The bill also covers several other West and Central Texas counties.

Wording of the bill states that season on hunting and fishing will be closed in this county, but then it states that the season may be opened when the Game and Fish Commission feels that the supply is sufficiently great to warrant taking of various game and fish.

The bill would allow opening and closing of hunting seasons when local authorities feel that the supply demands it. Under present law when a hunting season opens, hunters may take game whether or not the local supply is good.

Hurley to Head Heart Drive Here

A. J. Kirkpatrick of Robert Lee and Elmer Hurley of Bronte have been appointed chairmen of the Coke County Heart Fund. Each will serve in his respective community for 1963.

Dr. John McDaniel of Robert Lee will serve as medical advisor, the appointment being made earlier by Dr. Dwain Dodson, president of the 15 county San Angelo Heart Association.

In accepting the appointments, the new campaign chairmen pointed out that local Heart Fund contributions make possible the support of cardiovascular research in Texas and aid scientists in clinics and university laboratories throughout the nation.

Just 15 years ago a relatively small group of heart specialists decided that heart and blood vessel diseases were too great a threat to the nation's health to be handled without the help of the people of the country. The American Heart Association was organized into a voluntary health agency supported by contributions from people in all walks of life.

Research has had top priority in the Heart Association's program and in the past 15 years has been responsible for great progress in saving hearts through new methods of diagnosis, treatment and prevention.

"Heart Fund dollars support broad programs of public and professional education and community service which bring the benefits of research back to all of us," they said, "and we are proud and happy to work with this organization to continue to accomplish this purpose of the Heart Association."
