Trustees Election Set for April 6th

An election to name three school trustees was set for Saturday, April 6, at a meeting of the Bronte school board Tuesday night at the local school. Terms of three trustees, C. O. Richards, Joe Rawlings and Bob Wilson, are expiring this year.

A report was received Wednesday that the incumbents are being petitioned to run for re-election.

Deadline for filing is March 6, which is 30 days before the election. Persons who wish to file for the offices must do so before that time at the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford. However, anyone who wishes to petition a candidate to run may secure the petition forms in the office of school superintendent, C. B. Barbee.

Voting places will be the City Hall in Bronte and Green's Store in Tennyson. All residents of the school district, who are otherwise qualified voters, are eligible to vote.

Cotton knitwear consumers can look forward to longer-wearing garments as a result of a recently-licensed shrinkage-control procedure that guarantees less than 1 per cent shrinkage. When compared with present knitwear shrinkage tolerances that run up to 20% or more when line-or machine-dried, this new development makes shrinkage control in knitwear comparable to that in woven fabrics. Not only will it allow customers to purchase the proper size for immediate fit, but it assures continued fit for the life of the garment.

Manufacturers claim that the garments remain fresh and new-looking through repeated launderings. To date, at least 19 manufacturers have been licensed to use the process. This develop-

ment makes it more important than ever to read the label to be sure of knitwear's shrinkage control.

Is your family one that enjoys hamburger in a number of dishes? It is a cheap meat and has numerous uses and can be prepared "fit for a king." Hamburger may be such a regular and popular visitor at your home that you forget to give it the attention it deserves. Ground meat needs the best care to maintain top quality. Remove the store wrapper, cover loosely with wax paper, put it in the coldest part of the refrigerator. And don't keep it too long. For best eating, ground meat should be used within 24 hours after purchase. If you want to keep ground meat longer, it's best to freeze it.

Frozen ground beef can be stored for two months in the home freezer at 0 degrees. The storage life is shorter than for solid cuts of beef.

If you shape the ground beef into patties before freezing, you can cook it from the frozen state without thawing. Hamburger may be an old friend, but don't forget to give it all the attention it deserves when it comes to your house.

I want to share a recipe with you which I am enjoying and can say the pie is easy to make, not very expensive, and is delicious. Mrs. Wayne Dunnam of Bronte Jr. Club had given the recipe to Mrs. John Boyles who served the pie at a recent meeting. I thought it so good I asked for the recipe. Hope you will try it soon and that you will enjoy it.

Cracker Tart Pie

- 3 egg whites
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 3/4 cup soda cracker crumbs
- 3/4 cup chopped pecans.

Beat egg whites until stiff. Add vanilla, gradually add sugar and beat until dissolved. Fold in baking powder, crackers and pecans. Spread into 9 inch pie pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 30-40 minutes. Remove from oven, cool. Chill in refrigerator at least 8 hours. Top with whipped cream and serve.

County Agents News Column

Several Coke County 4-H, Robert Lee and Bronte FFA members will leave for the big Houston show next Sunday. Jimmy Wells and Jim Morrow, Bronte FFA members, will exhibit breeding sheep and breeding cattle. Benny Boykin, C. L. Sparks, Dick Waldrop, Bobby Blaylock, Mike Malone and Rusty Dodson of the Robert Lee FFA will be showing lambs. Robert Wink will exhibit his short horn heifer.

Among the 4-hers, Bucky Sparks, John and Kathy Service, Ronnie

and Donnie Devoll will be showing lambs at Houston. James Bird Pentecost, Robert Wink, Roy and Linda Blair, Maxie and Jo Alice Evans will be exhibiting steers. The group will leave Sunday and will return at various times during the week. In all the three groups will take 7 steers, 3 heifers, 4 breeding sheep and 28 lambs to the Bayou City.

Authorities of the screwworm control program repeatedly inform us or emphasize upon us the importance of accurate reporting and immediate reporting as well as control if screwworms crop out here. In fact, Mr. Forrest Smith, field man from Sterling City ask-

ed me to call in any cases as soon as they are reported to me, then mail in the sample to verify the outbreak.

The reason for such haste, accuracy and complete observance is that one female screwworm fly lays an average of 400 eggs. If half her eggs hatch, are allowed to complete their cycle, within three generations there could be more than 16 million screwworms produced. On the other hand, with the control program in the position that it maintains now, one reported and controlled case could save an entire area from screwworm damages.
